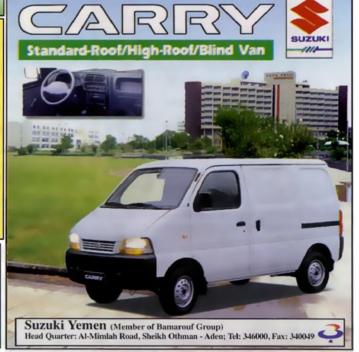

Time to Wake up to Globalization

Globalization is that word that is widely being mentioned these days.B ut it in in fact not well understood in Yemen. Many Yemenis see globalization as a dangerous phenomenon that can destroy the nationalism of countries and make the whole world ruled by a single power.

Globalization did not come out from space. The telecommunication technologies of today are getting people closer to each other. One can talk with a person from Germany or a person from Japan with a simple click on a computer mouse. We are living in an era where country boundaries are slowly beginning to lose their effects as the ultimate separator between nations. The world is nowadays beginning to understand the importance of market economies. Today, countries have begun realizing the benefit of dealing with other countries in a broader sense.

China for example, which was once seen as an isolated, conservative country is going through tremendous changes due to its transition to a market economy. Just two days ago, I watched the CNN World Report about China on the occasion of its national day. They mentioned things that were indeed referring to the fact that even the most conservative nations are slowly integrating with the rest of the world. They mentioned how the media is able to criticize government officials and reveal scandals within government offices. They showed how talk shows are getting popular on TV. In conclusion, they explained how China is beginning to permit activities that were once thought to be completely western, and hence shows that it is affected by globalization. Countries have come to the conclusion that staying isolated is not the proper answer. They realized that the integration with the world is the appropriate answer. In other words, we should realize that the world is getting smaller and smaller, and we must cope with it if we are to develop and have a country with strong relations and a bright future. We can begin by opening the way for investment into our land, offering all kinds of facilities and dismissing taxes. We can get experiences form other nations on how to deal with security problems and know how to overcome economic difficulties. Many countries have undergone similar conditions as ours. A tribe leader from Aal Ali Ben Falah tribe told the Yemen Times that the security forces in Marib had arrested one of them which would intensify the conflict between Director of Marib Security and his tribe.

A Bosnian Passport for Ossama Ben Laden

According to the Bosnian dependent Dani newspaper, a passport bearing the name of Osama Ben Laden was issued by the Bosnian Embassy in Vienna in 1993. The newspaper said the passport wasn't handed to Ossama himself and it did not mention if it was handed to a mediator. In addition, the newspaper confirmed the Bosnian government having stopped relation with Ossama, who is charged by the USA for bombing its embassies in Tanzania and Kenya; But it added that according to Muslim sources, nobody in the Bosnian embassy in Vienna knew who Ossama Ben Laden was six years ago. The same sources said that the Bosnian government was in touch with a lot of important people in the Arab world during the Bosnian war of 1992-1995.

Egyptian Fishing ships in the Yemeni Regional Water

The Yemeni Authorities have recently licensed 240 Egyptian fishing ships to fish in the Yemeni regional water following the record-

ing of many cases of illegal fishing by a number of Egyptian fishing ships. Many cases of trespassing the Yemeni water by Egyptian non-governmental ships have been recorded in the recent years and some of these ships have been captured. This decision by the Yemeni government follows an Egyptian request to allow the Egyptian fishing ships to fish in the Yemeni regional water as a part of brotherly relationships between the two countries.

It is worth mentioning that, about 2600 km of the Yemeni water is prone to illegal activities by Chinese, Egyptian,

Indonesian and other fishing companies. Unfortunately, the Yemen Navy does not move a finger to bring about an end to such illegal practices except some few cases when such events are done near the sea shores. Otherwise, trespassers are free to play havoc with the

Islah Asks for Changes in the Government

Yemen Times contacted Dr. Abdul Rahman Ba Fadl, the President of the Islah Caucus in the parliament and asked him two questions; the first one is about the stands of the Islah towards the situation of the Empirical Research and Women studies Center. The second one is about the credibility of the news that the Islah Caucus at the Parliament has asked for the change of the government of Dr. Iryani. This is the reply

"Concerning the last conference held in the Empirical Research and Women Studies Center in Sana'a University, the most dangerous thing is that they approved for the second time what is called "gender", a phrase that has no location in our culture or language. In China, people were divided in reference to its meaning for those from Latin America, Vatican, the Catholic and many countries from Western World were against so "why Yemen should take the leadership in supporting and propagating this world of gander?!" Other three women from Egypt, participated in the conference, said that they have never heard about gender but in Yemen. So why Raoofa Hassan is trying to push this in Yemen with its dangerous meaning for the mankind not only for Yemen. It insults our constitution, our religion, culture. This will finally lead us to go to a new relation between women and men which is different from the family which we know. IN china, they recognized more than six or seven relationship between man and women different from the family. So a woman can marry a woman, a man can marry a man and a group of men and women can have a free life together. Can

We can instead give them." Concerning the news that the Islah has asked for the change of the government of Dr. Iryani, Dr. Ba Fadl said: "This is something I came to know only from you. I was in the parliament from the early morning till the end and nobody talked about this issue at all. Moreover, the whole session was announced today on TV and no one talked about this issue.

What I stated to Al-Bayan Newspaper when they asked me about the President's Program is that the presidential elections are a victory to Yemenis. For this is the first time ever. This will also eliminate the possibilities of Military coup d'état, or power by heritage which will never happen again. I also said that the program of the President is magnificent for it is rich of things that will help a lot in the economic side, fighting corruption, reinforce power and security, take care of people and improve the standard of living. But I also said the question whether the program of President Saleh will be applied or not will depend upon the executive power and if no changes take place in the government, it will not succeed in applying this program as it did not succeed to apply its own program which was declared in the Parliament before. So what we hope is that the president will reinforce this government with new qualified staff as well as cadre from

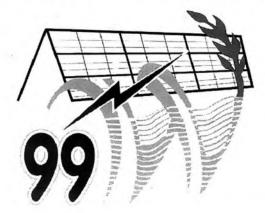

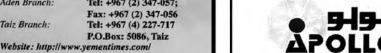

2-Saleh sworn in as Yemen's president

Ali Abdullah Saleh, who has ruled Yemen since unification in 1990, was sworn in on Saturday as the impoverished Arab state's first direct elected. Saleh, re-elected with more than 96

percent of the vote last week over his only challenger Najeeb Qahtan al-Sha'abi, took his oath of office before a packed parliament. Onlookers included Sha'abi, a member of Saleh's ruling General People's Congress who ran as an independent, and members of the opposition parties who boycotted the polls after their candidate was rejected by parliament. In past elections, the parliament elected the president but in this year's poll, parliament vetted the candidates for the election that was decided by the 66 percent of Yemen's 5.6 million registered voters who participated. After being sworn in for his five-year term, Saleh told the crowd that each of Yemen's 16 million citizens had a civic responsibility. Saleh, who ruled North Yemen for 12 years before unification, also encouraged parties from all sides of the political spectrum to participate in the Yemen's politics. There is no ban or threats against any person or political party" to prevent their participation, Saleh added.

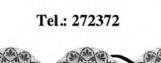

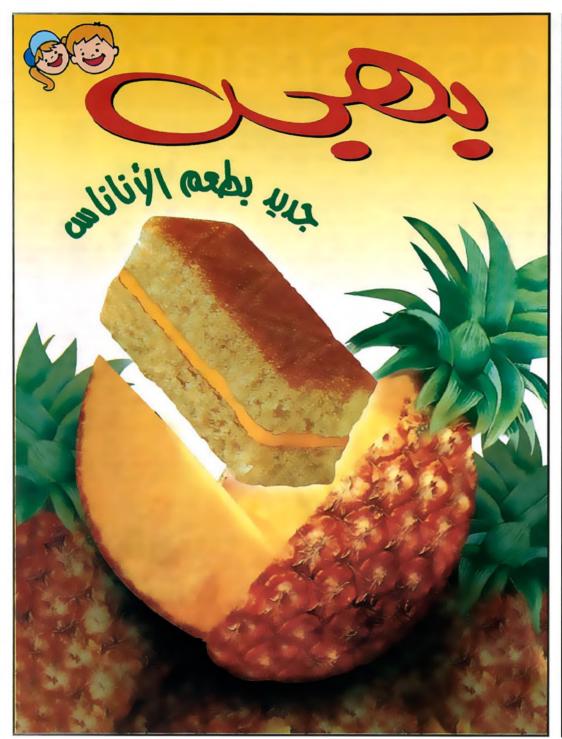

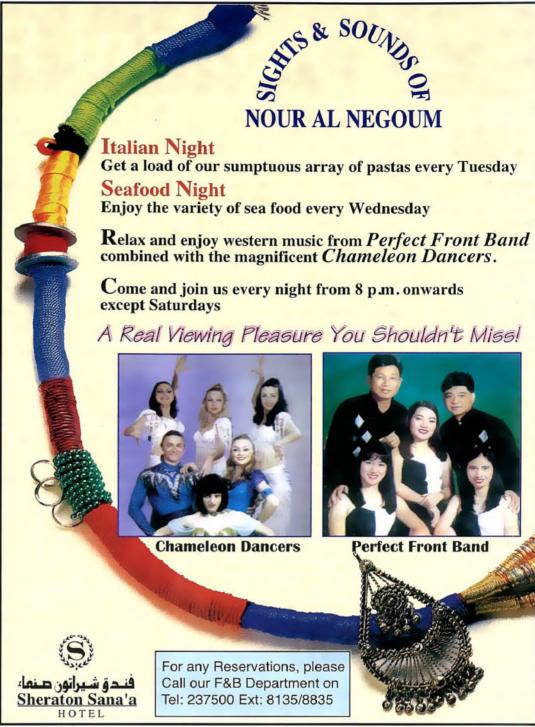
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Opposition States its view on the Elections: "Our Call to Boycott Elections Has Been Heard!"

Like many other Arab, Asian and African countries, Yemen hardly seems to witness any fundamental changes in the official performance after any parliamentarian or presidential elections. What happens is that, the elected president becomes

bounded by the power centers that supported him in the election and their heavy demands. These demands are among the main reasons for corruption, eating away the public funds.

On the subject of the future of Yemen after the presidential election that took place on Sept. 23th, 1999, stating an accurate picture is a matter of impossibility, especially in a unitary government, like Yemen. However, according to a number of facts, the great amount of money spent on the election process and the demands of the related parties have effected the general budget. Unless a real policy for economization is applied, the country will witness a disaster in the upcoming months. Moreover, about 90% of the people will be in a deplorable condition that may culminate in a real threat to the social security. Many countries in the arena deprive their peoples of their political rights, but in return they provide them with the best living standards. The catastrophe takes place when the peoples are deprived of both freedom and "food". In this way the peoples find themselves compelled to take to the path of revolution.

Go back through the Arab history and you will find few exceptional cases in which the Arab leaders kept their words, and Yemen is not an exception. However, being given the Yemeni people's mandate, President Ali Abdulla Saleh still has a unique opportunity to immortalize himself. In my opinion, President Saleh has two choices: the first one is possessing a real desire and determination to implement real economic and political reforms. In this regard, he will need a new administration other than the existing one which is supposed to be the reason for the present discouraging situation of the country. Keeping even few individuals in the present administration means that the President has backed out in his promises. This does not mean necessarily that he has to open fire on everything wrong, but the people must feel there are some changes. If the President does this, he will gain the support of at least 90% of the Yemeni people. The second choice is to surrender to the demands and pressures of the power centers which will lead to

ignoring the people's demands, as well as the promises he has made. If this is the president's choice, he will lose the people's support and the country will be led to a future that I can simply describe as DISAS-TROUS.

The Presidential election came at a difficult time. The country still lives the aftermath of the 94 Summer War, the national opposition has abandoned the political life. The ruling

party refuses to hold dialogues with the other parties for a national reconciliation that will help create an atmosphere of political stability in the country.

The election could have been more interesting if the ruling party abided by the Constitution that calls for real competitive elections among the existing political parties.

The election lost its national and political values by rejecting the opposition nominee, Ali Saleh Obad Moqbel, let alone the loss of any political guarantees for holding fair and just elections and refraining from deleting the repeated names of voters in many electoral districts. These facts, along with the result of the election which showed that only 65% of the total voters enrolled in the voting lists participated in the election reflect the fact that the election was not as it should be. In fact, the election result reflected the public's general attitude towards the election, disregarding their response to the opposition's calls of boycotting the election. The ruling party should realize that solving the political and economic problems will never be reached through removing the "others". However, I think the President now has got a "historic" chance to reform the discouraging condition of the country. The election did not establish a "constitutional or public legislation", as the ruling party hoped. It rather confirmed the public's refusal of the present situation, as well as their refusal of those in charge reform the country's condition. Therefore, the future of Yemen is bounded by the ruling party's reconsideration of its calculations, polices, as well as the way it intends to reform the bad conditions of the country on the basis of the election result. In fact, I can say that, the country is in a cross road. The opposition has to seize this "historic" chance to take the initiative to call for a national dialogue and reconciliation, not through meetings and circulars of appeals, but through depending on the people who have given a strong signal on Sept. 23rd, 99.

Stuck Promises

t is easy for officials in Yemen to give promises and speak loudly about development, achievements, reform, democracy, human rights and many other issues of such stuff. Our country is amongst the first countries in passing laws and decisions. Our country is one of the first countries to ratify international agreements and treaties like that of human rights, children rights, torture, freedom of the press and so on and so forth.

Unfortunately, we speak more and work little. To drive the point home, these agreements, laws and decisions do not see the light of day. The question of human rights has not got the satisfaction of the Amnesty International. As a matter of fact, the latest report issued by the Amnesty concerning human rights situation in Yemen shows a lot of violations are still taking place. Torture, a heinous and prohibited crime, is still existing in the country, though Yemen ratified the treaty to combat torture. Yemen also signed in favor of the Children Rights Treaty which generally prohibits the work of children. However, our streets are full of such helpless people who are bogged down in an endless struggle to keep their body and soul together. Children alms-seekers are found everywhere you go, particularly at streets intersections. What is more worse is that 45% of Yemeni children are out of school.

Concerning the press freedom, Yernen is one of the claimed countries that respect the press and honor the position of journalists. However, violations of the press freedom and attacks on journalists, newspapers and opinion makers are numerous and are sometimes viewed by observers as an insidious trend towards censorship of the press. What is happening right now with Al-Shora newspaper is a vivid example.

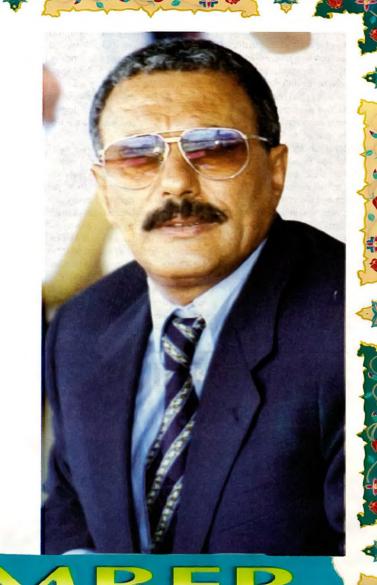
The Ministry of Interior's procedures to prevent and stop arms-carrying in the major cities have been hailed by many people. Of course, that major has done much to limit the number of people wandering with different kinds of weapons in the streets of the major cities. The confrontations that occurred between the police and some law-breakers as

a result of the application of that decision made people feel that this time it might be serious and that the government will show its muscles against law-breakers and trouble makers. We, in the press, interacted with mopping-up operation of weapons very positively and boosted it wholeheartedly However, we were asking whether that would continue or not. Well, now it seems that the fever has gone and we will be back to our old hated practice of arms carrying because the operation is no more working However, the decision has done much to limit the number of people carrying weapons in the main cities. Therefore, the people in charge should not reiterate and give up. Rather, they should go on till they get people believe that the government is serious in implementing its decisions.

Kidnapping is a new evil practice that has been introduced to the Yemeni society recently and most of the people do it to exercise pressure on and blackmail the government to get development projects. In the beginning the government dealt with the problem very carelessly and showed it its back to it. That made the problem get tensified and get worse and worse. Then, the government passed a law, imposing stiff measures against kidnappers. Everybody felt happy. The government was serious in implementing the law only in the case of the Abyan catastrophic fiasco which claimed the lives of three tourists. As the law dictates, the penalty of kidnappers is death. Since that time no kidnappers have been punished with the same penalty. Rather, the government always resorts to negotiations. This state of insecurity has led to the decline of the tourist drive in Yemen.

To conclude, the question is not that of talking much, issuing decisions, giving more promises, signing agreements and international accords and treaties. Rather, it is that of following up the decisions, implementation of promises and enforcement of laws. These stuck promises, agreements, decisions and laws should all see the light of application. Is there somebody listening?





UNEMPLOYMENT OVERPLUS (THE SURPLUS OF MANPOWER)

Background, Reasons, Reflections and Influences

n the beginning of the 1970s, Yemen became fell into a bad condition, especially during the period that extended from 1962-1970. Yemen was suffered from underdevelopment as an after math of colonialism. In addition to this, Yemen faced lots of problems caused by some mercenary forces that worked to interrupt the process of development in Yemen. There were no economic foundations which are the main resources of development. Moreover, Yemen had established its administrative framework after the declaration of the Republic in the North and the achievement of independence in the South. All these factors did not affect the process of development in Yemen. It began to find suitable ways through which it can ensure development by any means. The first general budget in 1973 that came along with the first triangle developing program; 1973/1974 - 1975 / 1976 (in the North), and the developing project in 1971 / 1972- 1973/ 1974 (in the South).

These developing projects concentrated on the following points:

- developing infrastructure (roads, ports, airports and the different projects involving transportation, water and electricity
- projects of social infrastructure namely education and health, that increased social requirements. It lately, got an importance represented by the inauguration of some faculties, which were the cornerstone of Aden and Sana'a Universities.
- implementation gave further of welfare to measure the first census in 1973 in the South, and in 1975 in the North.

In view of the limitation of trained and qualified human resources, governments of the two divisions; South and North had adopted the policy of complete assimilation of the university and the other professional institutes graduates, who have completed their studies abroad. They were installed in the high administrative jobs and in the supervised jobs, while the students occupied the specialized and management jobs in the different professional levels, which are available in the country. The lack of adequate number of teachers through contracts with Arab teachers. So, in-spite of the heavy financial constraints triggery by a big increase with social demand in educational and healthy services, there were a positive factors which helped revive relationship between Yemen and the other neighboring countries, which substantially help reducing economic and social disparities as well as the problem of unemploy-

The positive factors which helped to establish the economy can be represented as follows:

1-Immigration of a number of Yemeni laborers to gulf countries, to various projects concerned with building in those

2- Increase in the volume of the donations and financial assistance to Yemen from the Arab and foreign countries and some of the regional organizations,to help complete the different projects.

3-Cover up a big part of Yemen's existing fiscal difficulties through loans from the Arab and foreign countries or through different associations and funds.

- 4- adopting self financial projects for building a number of schools and health centers by people's financing.
- 5- Achieving the aims of the triangle developing program and project speedily, which contributed to the activity of development in the two divisions the South and the North.

Inspite of the fruitful development that was achieved during the 1970s in the South and the North, Yemen had faced an interior difficult interior problems as the

1- clash ideologies capitalism and socialism and its consequences. All these conflicts instability in economic and social

These political problems caused the continuous change of the high official leaders and the installation of unqualified workers in important occupations. In addition to this, we faced the problem of demobilization of soldiers, who lost their jobs had to be enrolled in civic institutions. There was no systematic relation between work system and country insti-

- 2- Dependence upon flow of foreign funds,through immigrants and foreign loans that affected national economy by the passing of time.
- 3- Absence of the conditions to encouraged investment of the national wealth.
- 4- Immunity from foreign employment, which interrupted the productive opportunity of the country.

5- Mismatch between education and training towards the developing fields. During the period of 1980s, Yemen had

faced lots of economic problems which were aggravated in course of the problem was accepted by the weakness of performance and production in the official economic sectors, and inflation.

Yemen had devoted its energy to reform economic and administrative corruption in low and legislation. It also witnessed an outstanding development in terms of confined renewal of work technologies. Added to this the dependence upon the foreign expertise, and mis-construal of the cultural, political and social importance results in the continuity of the foreign pressure.

By the end of the 1980s, there were many differences in the international system and economy leading to serious problems including a transition from from the restricted economy to free economy and to market mechanism. These changes played important roles of the economy of the developing countries such as Yemen. So, there was no way to overcome these crises except resorting to Unification, which was declared on May 22, 1990.

Now, we are attempting to draw a full picture of the condition of Yemen during the modern period. The new changes of the world facilitate Yemen to review of

plane new ways of social and economic development. But the interior conditions of Yemen needs economic and financial reforms, which was recently approved by the Parliament on December 15, 1991. In spite of difficulties reform had faced of implementing for a outer and internal reasons, it got a courage during that early period of Unification

Regarding the administrative the economic and civic sector, the integration between the different corporations of the South and the North led to elaborate the administrative net work . The fiscal condition before the unification was marked by shortfall and the weakness of incomes and productions. This condition went on till the declaration of unification because economy needed urgent restructuring of a number of productive corporations which were suffered a lot from shortfall. In addition to this, the recent events which represented by the Gulf War caused the return of about a million immigrants to their country, Yemen. They created an economic and social problem. All of a sudden, they found themselves without jobs, and this is what caused the problem of unemployment. The problem increased more as the prices of oil went

In view of these changes, the economic condition witnessed a down ward trend, and the incomes of the country went back because of the weakness of the productive sector. On the other hand the foreign loans, and assistance which were offered to Yemen did not continue any more.

The problems that appeared since the beginning of the 90s in the administrative field, which can be summarized as fol-

- absence of the accurate limitation of reconstruction's aims of reconstruction.
- escalation of the trend of inflation at the central level.
- Absence of accurate stipulation for public employment and qualifications and experience.
- Absence of the proper infrastructure for evaluating performance and of discovering the faults so as to find the way of correcting them. This led to increase in corruption practices bribe, wasting of work time and the administrative corruption.
- Low of the performance of projects launched involving citizen's affairs.
- Absence of the integrated phenomena and concepts, which systemize the relation between central local sectors and corporations.
- Lack of coordination between executive corporations on the local and central lev-
- Misuse of planning, programming and supervision by the central frameworks because of its involvement in the executive affairs.

Unemployment; reasons, reflections and influences:

in view of the continuos changes which took place during the recent years because consequence upon political upheaval, serious steps were contemplated to overcomes these changes sparked of problems in the economic and financial sectors with the following consequences:

A-The problem of unemployment : put-

ting the unskilled in new occupations in specific projects such as directly all the graduates of the universities and the other professional institutes to fill in the big void of the lack of teachers in the rural areas. There was wrong decision to assimilate a number of immigrants who came back from the Gulf. Members of political parties occupied important positions in the government, while they had no background in these occupations. In

addition to this,the

huge spendings by the members of the Parliament have made the public exchanger poorer . A number of employees had been enrolled in the services of health sector during the war of 1994.

- B- Massive expenditures on account of salaries and privileges:
- the high costs of salaries.
- giving employees additional bonus immediately after the financial and economic reform.
- different demands for bowing to pay by the employees have inevitably.

The government took upon its shoulder the entire salaries component of employees and some of the workers of the economic restricted sector as well as responsibility of those who resigned after the process of privatization.

Unemployment overplus:

At the time of the declaration of the Unification, there were a number of integrated corporations, which consisted of (37) member of the Cabinet. The number of the employees which appeared in the official administrative sector and private sector during the first period of the unification was approximately 250,000.

The final figures issued by the Ministry of civic service and administrative reform illustrated that the number of the employees increased during the last seven years from June, 1990-June, 1997 to become 400533 according to the final statistics published on June 6, 1997. Here we find that the number of employees, which were added during the seven years was 150, 533. The average rate is 8,6 % during the aforementioned period, but this figure went down during 90-1995 to remain at 3,1 % because of the new policy of the government.

Additional employment:

It was influenced by two factors, the first one is called the additional employment. It represents those persons who lost their jobs. The second one is called surplus employment, which refers to having more employees than needed.

Causes of the Problem:

The causes of this problem relate to the conditions which appeared in the in the government during the first periods of independence in the South Yemen. There was a big extension in the policy of the government during that period which has two aspects.

- 1- Economic and developing policy based upon the concept of monopoly by the government for most of the economic and social activities, and the negligence of the private sector in all fields.
- 2- Employment policy concentrated on the social factors and some of the traits of the economic factor. The above factors caused inflation on the economic sector of the government.

The results of these policies were being realized through the protection offered by the government to the public sector, and the new vision adopted by the constitution of the Republic, which based upon economic and the freedom of competition in all fields. The decline in all sectors aggravated problems which made the problem of unemployment, culminating in weakness of means to compete in the new conditions, and the returning of the properties to their owners after the nationalization and the agricultural reform.

Characteristics features of the overplus employment:

- Sex: Male 90 % - Female 10 %
- Age: the average age of the unemployed is between (20-40 year), but the high rate pertained to the youth.
- -Educational status: it relates to discrepancies in educational levels of the universities, and the secondary schools. Most of those employees who occupied strategic and professional administrative occupations were in the Southern governorates. Solutions:

The government had worked to implement a number for procedures of reducing the suffering of the affected and to find a helpful means which can contribute solving their affairs. These include following:-

1- Seeking the help of the public budget

to cover salaries of employees, and provisions must be made so that the Ministry of Finances must transfer these amounts to the Ministry of civil services.

2- Giving additional employment to the Ministry of civic services to carry out administrative reform to take the in terms of responsibilities as the regular exchange of money of the salaries, the true distribution of those employees on the different departments of the administrative phenomena and demobilization. In addition to this,the government took steps for solutions and arrangements of the employment conditions in the agricultural corporations. But all these solutions just help in reducing the suffering of those affected. In fact it does not represent the final solution for this problem because it did not go to its real and inner reasons.

Hence, we can illustrate the real current condition through the fol-

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Yemeni Terza Rima Its Characteristics and Concept for Tehamian People

he Yemeni Terza Rima in Tehamah is one of the main features of art that formed Yemeni Terza Rima in general, which is an inseparable part

distinguished taste of Tehamian Terza Rima. We will also recognize the important constituents which formed the basic frame of Terza Rima in general. I have talked with Sheikh Mansour Wasel, a member of the Parliament and the advisor in the cultural forum in Al-Jarahe in Zabeed, and reached this conclusion.

First of all, I would like to point out that that Yemeni Terza Rima,

Mohammed (all pray upon Him), or by mentioning the Glory of God's Names and some of His Features. They like this kind of poetry because they want to polish their hearts and sharp their minds and behaviors. Sufism has come from this art. So they are called ' Al- Makhsodeen'. They gave it this name because it has a special intention. It also has another meaning for Tehamian people, which is 'Al-Shallal', which represent the

wise men come to interpret the ambiguous meanings of poetry, which describe two things either "Holy Ka'abah" or some times they have different meanings which are difficult to be understood by any one. There is a proverb which say: 'let them guess whatever they want, we have the meaning'. We find that they always project through their poetry the beauty of women, but it seems that they talked about religion.

Sheik Al-Harfash has mentioned on his traditional book 'Al-Kafek' the different ways of poetry. There is mention about the features of Terza in Tehama like the song of Sheik Al-Badae, and also of Nasser Al-Zabedi. Through Terza, they mentioned two kinds of clouds. The first one represents the rainfall cloud, and the other represents some kind of woman's beauty.

So, we find so many features in the songs which describe flirtation, desertion, nature, praise and so forth. All these kinds are very close to the poetical classics, but in-spite of its multiple kinds, it is a Sufi Terza. There are a number of classical schools as Gaber Rizkh, which become one of the famous Yemeni Terza in Tehama. There is

also another classical school which is called Omar Barakat school, the supreme Sheik in Sama'ae area. This classical school has been called 'Al-Smee and Al-Maksood. This name was known as Al-Zaideah and Harad area in North

There are so many professional singers who have graduated from these schools, and who have different forms of this arts. We have to mention some of those people as Hassan Omar Abdullah Bokar, Mohammed Al-Halasabe, Nasser Heleil, Abu Al-Kaith and others. During my exploration, I have come across different skills of those singers. Some of them follow the traditional Terza Rima styles, while the others use their own styles. They took these feature from ancient traditional rhythm of Yemeni traditional songs. I urge upon those singers to follow the same traditional ways of their ancient grandfathers, and preserv it from fading away.

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of Arab Terza Rima. This art has a special taste through poetry and the different kinds of arts. The rhythm of Terza has taken from the classical folklore music that is based on the originality of orient. Its tune and rhythm do not differ from those of the Arab Teresa

which appears in Sana'a, Lahj, Hadramout and Tehamah areas were formed by their demarcating features, and by the classical ways that they follow as the traditional environmental frames. Terza Rima for Tehamian people is the songs praise our Prophet

waterfall. This waterfall reflects the real environment that they live in and their suffering.

"Shallaloon" is set in a high place in the marriage occasions 'Al-Aross' (like the waterfall), to sing and to make their sound heard by audience. On the other hand, the

ome historians say that the history of the Jews dates back to the age of the Prophet Abraham who migrated from a tribe in Aoor in Iraq to Palestine during 1920-1950 BC. He went through Euphrates River on his way to Palestine which was inhabited by Kananyoon as mentioned in the Holy Book "The Genesis"

Al-Kananyoon is an Arab tribe that migrated from Yemen and settled down on the side of Palestine. Since then these lands have been called Kana'an Lands. This has also been mentioned in the Old Testament and the old history of Egypt. The migration of this tribe from Arab lands to settle down in Arab lands is one of the common phenomena. Some historians as well as orientalists have made unfound claim that all the Jews were

Jews were, like other Yemenis, scattered all over Yemen. Some of them were found in towns, others in villages. There is a special place in the old city of Sana'a where the majority of them used to live. This place is called the "Caa'a of Yahood" which is now known as "Caa'a Al-Olefi". They also lived in different places in Hashed at Dolaymah district, a part of Al-Madayer and Haboor. They inhabited Ibb governorate in a zone called Al-Ga'ah located in the East South of the town. In Al-Syani they inhabited a special village formed for them called Al-Oodss. In Jeblah they inhabited a zone called Al-Maka'dah. In Al-Naderah they inhabited a village called Gahran. They also inhabited Hadramout and most of them were found in Crater, Aden as well. They

Perhaps, this was the reason behind the huge migration of the Jews from Yemen. Some of them used small catamarans to reach Palestine. The first as well as the second groups of these families reached Palestine in 1881. Immigration took place in small measures until the huge immigration phenomenon took place after the war of 1948 and until December 1950. At this time there was a huge immigration not only from Yemen but from different countries in the Arab Peninsula to Palestine so as to work in the agricultural field beside the Jews of Egypt. This period was considered to be the most fertile Zionist immigration to Palestine as the other



immigration were done under secrecy.

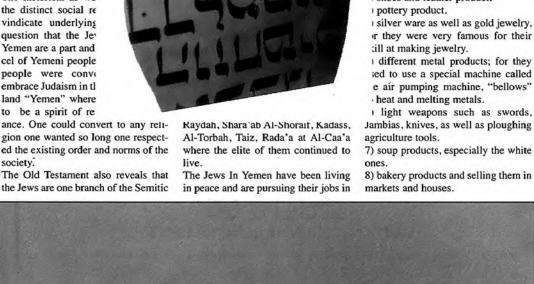

However, the Jews of Yemen are undeniably part of the Yemenis, very much similar in all aspects, such as origin, language including different dialects as well as physical appearance. One of the commonly held beliefs is that the Jews of Yemen are the oldest Jews ever. It is said that they were present in Yemen even before the destruction of the first structure in Jerusalem in 586 BC. Yemen was also their shelter after Palestine was conquered in 63 AC by the Romanian Emperor Toyotas. He destroyed the temple of Jerusalem for the second time in 70 AC. Historical events also assert that the Yemeni Jews had a great impact on the Yemeni society in the third century AC at a time Yemen was in its best prosperous stage. The Jews were treated like other Yemenis. They had all rights to travel abroad and make relations with Palestinians at the outset of the third century and the first quarter of the sixth century.

The strong dominance of the Jews became very clear in the earliest centuries of AC and until the date of our Prophet Mohammed's Mission during

tempted to travel to Palestine even though the way was open through Aden Port long ago. With regard to the number of the Jewish settlers in Yemen we have different estimates as there is no accurate statistics. They built their palaces on hills and they used to call them "Al-Ataam", castles built of stones and looked like forts. This is usually a habit of theirs to build houses in this way. These houses do still exist till now. As a matter of fact, the same ideas and beliefs about the Jews of the North are shared in the South of Yemen. They are not strangers in the region for they settled down in the area so long ago. They have obviously been affected by the economic situation and as a result they migrated from different governorates to Aden looking for jobs, especially after the colonization of Aden in 1839. At that time there was a highly prosperous trade as Aden was declared an International Free Zone. Those who used to get rich, used to encourage other Jews to work and improve their economic situations. This can be undoubtedly applied to other Muslims who traveled to differ9) Local as well as outside trade.

In the religious side we find that the Jews of Yemen preserved their tradition as well as religious conventions. There were no limitations or constraints that prevented them from practicing all their beliefs. They were taught these Talmud practices by their old rabbis in their temples and few special religious schools. They used to transfer their religious principles orally from one generation to the other. On their day to day dealings they used to speak Arabic. The old people used to recite the holy Qura'an admiringly and with full respect in reciprocation to Yemenis who used to show their respect to all the holy religious sects. The Jews of Yemen, like other Muslims, preserved their cultural heritage as well as their ways of life, language, arts, songs. They transferred this heritage as it was to Palestine and to other countries they migrated to. In general, the Jews and Muslims used to influence each other negatively as well as positively in different fields.

The Immigration of the Jews of Yemen to Palestine:

The first one hundred families migrat-



HADARAMAOUT Vast, Promising, yet Ignored..

Hadaramaout governorate is one of the most important historical cities through out the history of the Arabian Peninsula. Its strategical geographical location made it one of the most renowned cities for it is located on the cross-road of the commercial path between India and the Mediterranean Sea shores. There are many Pre-Islamic ruins which show that this path passed through which was at that time part of Shiba's and Hemiar's kingdoms. This city is also well-known from the stories of Aad and Thamood, Saleh, Hood and the people of Loot that are mentioned in our Holy Qura'an. Hadaramaout was also one of the first regions which embraced Islam in Yemen when the prophet Mohammed (God's mercy and peace upon him) send Ali Ibn Abi Talib to them in 631 AD. Its also known that the Mohammed (God's mercy and peace upon him) was engaged to Al-Ashaath's sister. Fotailah Bint kais, who was originally from Hadaramaout. However, she did not get married to the prophet (God's mercy and peace upon him). Later, she got married to Ikrimah Ibn Abi Jahl and her brother, Al- Ashaath, married the sister of Abu Bakr.

Historians stated that the original name of this land was Wadi Al-Ahkaf which is mentioned in the Holy Qura'an. Later on, it was named after the King who ruled that land in that epoch. One of the Islamic writers, Al-Masoudi, said in his book (Mourooge Al-Dahab) this name came from the king Hadaramaout Ibn Kahtan Ibn Aabed who established his kingdom 18 centuries BC. The name Hadaramaout was given to the old kingdom which extended all the

Oman. Yet, this name was also granted to other distinctions through out history for it once represented the big arid valley which is 160 Km far from the shore.

Hadaramaout had always been a target for invaders. One of them was Toran Shah Al-Ayoubi who set an army, composed mainly of Turks, under the leadership of Othman Al-

way from Shabowah to Dhofar and Hadaramaout became a site for battles for many years between Sultanate Al-Kathiri and Al-Taherieen and other tribes as well. Some historians had also confirmed that Hadaramaout was also unified during the epoch of Badr Ibn Abdullah Ibn Ali who is known by Abi Towairik.

During the era from 1853-1967 AD Hadaramaout was in its nadir. It was

Sultanate. He was able to conquer all Hadaramaout and he had brought a lot of scientists and rich people to his land. After his death his descendant Al-Hosain Ibn Ali Mansour succeeded him to the thrown. During this period the Sultanate started decaying and finally this latter was laid off by the socialists after Aden's dependence in 1967.

Al-Kaeytiah Sultanate was estab-



Zangebly. This leader conquered Aden and Hadaramaout in 1180 AD. There, he killed many of their scientists like the two famous Shaiks Yahva Ibn Salem and Ahmad Akdar. He also slew some of their Sultans like the Sultan of Aal Rashed, the Sultan of Al-Dagar and the Sultan of Ikbal and he arrested others and sent them to Aden. Then in 1194 AD the sultans came back to rule Hadaramaout but under the name of the Ayoubian kingdom. These Sultans continued to rule in Hadaramaout until it was subdued by Ibn Mahdi in 1220 AD, Years later Hadaramaout was unified in 1228 AD during the epoch of Masoud Ibn Yamani but, after that,

divided and ruled by many governments and in many cases there were cities which were ruled by two governments at a time. In addition to that, some tribes started ruling their lands and establishing their own government forcing the people to work for them. Therefore, large numbers of the inhabitants of Hadaramaout emigrated to India. South Asia and East Africa.

At that period of time there were two Sultanates, Al-Katheriah and Al-Kaeytiah. Al-Katheriah Sultanate was established by Galib Ibn Mohsin Al-Kathiri in 1865 AD who was a descendant of the previously mentioned Abi Towairik. He was one of the greatest rulers of this

lished by Omar Ibn Awath in the middle of the 13th Hijri century. He was one of the soldiers of Aal Yafi'i who settled in Hadaramaout after the Sultan Badr Ibn Towairik Al-Kathiri and his cousin Ali Ibn omar Ibn Jafar the Sultan of Shibam had brought them. This ruler was one of the elite of Haydar Abad's army and when he knew that his tribe was a target of attack for other tribes. He set an army with the aid of the British to face Al-katherieen. Unfortunately, he was defeated in Al-Mahayeil battle and then the British made both sides sign a compromise in Aden. This Sultanate kept ruling until 1967 AD when Aden gained its independ-

The Political Alliance in Yemen, with or Versus the Economic Reform

(Second in a Seriese)

The Second Influential Group:

This includes the individuals and groups affected by these reforms, for they benefit from bribes, mediations, rent seeking, customs protecting, monopoly, smuggling, and taking law into their hands. The individuals of this category are very much influential and it is natural that they will continue behaving in the same way. They will seek to destroy, as well as prove this program a failure. Therefore, if the political forces are unified, strong, as well as stable, they will be able to provide the political feasibility for economic reforms and to:

1) take reform decisions and protect itself from pressure groups so that these pressure groups will not be able to hinder the implementation of these deci-

2) protect the technocrat from the pressure groups.

3) carry out the compensation procedures for the benefit of the affected weak groups.

In this context, we wonder if the political coalition in Yemen is able to carry out all these tasks!

I will try to answer this by analyzing the nature of the economic and cultural levels and the performance of its individuals, its policies as well as deci-

4- Composition: The Yemeni society is still a political one, and not yet an economic one. This means that the primitive life does still exist in our country. For example, we have a "Subsistence Economy", very limited 'social learning", absence of political democracy, dominance of the primitive political parties as tribes and military

The conditions of this life reflect itself on the culture, behavior, performance of the individuals of the political coalition, especially proving that they belong to the 30s of this century.

The features of the political coalition performance:

a) Redistribute coalition which tends to form a "Predatory State". The subsistence economy means the poverty of the society along with the individuals of the political coalition before they captive power. For whoever reaches a strong position in power, he looks at the country as a prey and as a source for gaining a tempting income as well as having a comfortable life. He considers his position a springboard for a rich financial haul as they have no qualifications. Therefore, their passions safe-

guarding their personal interests and their living in the lap of luxury and opulent comfort. They also tend to make a strong military as well as tribal base for insuring sticking to power as long as possible and at all costs. Therefore, these corrupt individuals do not work to bring about development. The economic reforms that are intended to correct resources may face a lot of political resistance and come to nothing. b) The absence of the modern cultural economy: the primitivism of the society means the absence of social learning opportunities either by means of the education or by learning by doing. That is because the political coalition, like others in the society, possess a primitive culture that is not economic. Therefore, their economic policy is not aimed at privatization of resources in a productive way so as to provide encouragement as well as facilities to productive and hardworking businessmen. Most often their discriminatory policies lead to unpredictable economic crisis. They, furthermore, do not even consider the importance of the economic reforms and the importance of the local, as well as foreign economists to solve the crisis. They also tend to ignore the importance of participation, as well as support of the people to build the lawful, organizational framework necessary to carry out these reforms.

c) The absence of the political democracy for the primitive culture means that the society is dominated by chaos, inner political conflict, as well as incoherent bilateral relations. Therefore, the public participation becomes very low in the development process or reforms. The foreign assistance will also minimize dramatically. The local, as well as foreign expenses increase which will very much affect the success of the developing process and reforms.

5) Performance:

a) Short Horizon: This horizon is specified. The government interference in the economic process has an impact on the market, as well as the society. Indeed, that role will be restricted to levy of taxes, nothing more.

The economic process passes through different circles, such as, investment, production and distribution. That means the distribution of the produced wealth among the factors of production and redistribution of income shoud be in a way that assures fair and active distribution of income, giving a suitable chance for each producing factor in reproducing wealth and sharing wel-

In the investment circle, resources do exist in terms of producing factors such as, capital, work, lands and different contractual rights. The government has to intervene in this circle to make available an overall economic framework which allows using such resources in the next circle "production". The government has no right in tampering claims of any portion in this circle. Then, in the production circle the government has to intervene so as to provide the main physical, as well as social structure, that is education and health. Thus, from the production there is an increase in producing wealth so as to distribute it in the third circle in which the government intervenes to supervise distribution and redistribution of wealth and income. We notice here that the government has a long sighted view that it totally relates itself to the economy in so far as its income is derived from economy and its interest lies in increasing taxes. Therefore, it will support economy in terms of creating high development levels which will be reflected in increasing taxes ratio. It will also seek participation in the economic decisions so as to serve the developing process. To gain the political legacy as well as political feasibility, it follows the system of democracy. Therefore, we find that the government is always in a strong contact with economy and society in terms of supporting

its organization. However, in our case we can imagine that the government intervene to have its portion from the first circle. This is why it is controlling lands, states, donations, mediations, participating in the private investment, monetary issuing, speculations that may block investment, incurring public debt and getting involved in the market as a creditor with a high interest competing in t e arms of the quality and preventing those investors from necessary resources for their investments. The government also allocates a very small portion of its budget revenues for investment expenses: about 4% for the years 93-96, and spending the rest for the regular heads. The government does not also provide the lawful, organizational, and secure, political stability, protecting contracts and necessary rights for private investment. As a result of this some of the resources of the first circle are spent in combating bribes, mediation, monopoly, extending procedures. This is actually an unproductive use. Thus, there is no production, no development, no enough taxes. The level of taxes for the years 92, 95, 96 is about 48% of the general revenues of the country and 50% of its regular expenses. Indeed, the government should depend at least on taxes to cover its regular expenses. If it does not depend on that, this means that it gets its resources through its interference in the first circle. Thus, it does not depend on economy to finance itself, nor does it depend on the society to elect all its organizations. This goes to prove that it is totally separate from economy as well as society. This also shows the shortsightedness of the political coalition that leads the government which is not at all in coherence with the long

course of economic development. Therefore, we notice that the political coalition that exists in Yemen is short lived, transitory and has political as well as military objectives. Such a coalition frequently ends up in war or political conflicts. As a telling example, we can talk about the political coalitions that have taken place in the South after independence. We find that these coalitions were soon set off. On the other hand, the political unsuitability in the North and the political crises took place along with the occurrence and setting up of some political coalitions during the revolution of 1962.

b) A weak Political Coalition: As regards the development process and economic reforms we find that the political coalitions are weak vulnerable to the strong pressure groups that exist within these formed coalitions. Therefore, the current political coalition seems to be divided, for it was formed, from the beginning, of two levels: the first level is the coalition summit which is limited and restricted to a specific number of people who have the objective of monopolizing potentials and decisions. However, it is doubtless that this summit finds itself at a fix for it needs support from those below them. So they allow forming a separate supporting coalition. This separate supporting coalition is formed from those below and will consist of organizations and individuals from the military, administration, including party, media, some other organizations and some well-known socialites. So to solve the problem of financing this coalition and keeping it a way from the process of decision making, its members are inevitably those who have no conscience and who accept illegal money. As a result they resort to practices such as bribes, chaos, mediation. smuggling, rent seeking, violating rules giving security a cold shoulder. Furthermore, they do not show an interest to participate in the process of decision making. In course of time this inferior and low coalition has become dominant and influential. Hence, this coalition and its members have formed what is called the pressure groups and frame its rules. It may become dangerous even to the coalition summit itself. Amidst the political and economic crises the summit of the coalition will be exposed to the local as well as outside pressures so as to introduce the reforms. The summit finds itself accept such reforms, However, the lower level

democracy are two inseparable factors. Without press there is no democracy, and without democracy, there is no freedom of press and multiplicity of different points of view. All know that there are numerous ways, which are being used to forge the actual meaning of press freedom. They practice this fake meaning through a separate continuous work between freedom of press and democracy. For example, in order to be able to oppress press freedom.

We are in this age, of the integration with the international economy, 'Globalization', the age of Internet which has made the world as a single home. So, there is nothing which can be forbidden because everything is open and above board.

Therefore, we have to develop our press to show the right path to our generation. The press can deal with different standards that can have social degeneration. Hence, I can say that any point of view which may be offered by a human being will not be any better than the applied information that he can receive from the press in this matter.

If we want to establish society's support, we have to develop information, which is the unique factor that can supply our needs of information. It is the reflected scanner that reflects what is happening arround us in all fields of life.

Press should operate in three ways; awareness, fluency and skillful style. If we find all these factors in the press, we will witness a high standard of the press. In all countries press is a significant cornerstone of the political life of that coun-

If we look with a discerning eye analyzing the press and its style of opevation, we will find that it does not reflect the moorings of its editors, but it faithfully expresses the points of view and interests of different social currents and forces. Press is not worth its name if it expresses ambiguous and unclear views because it is an independent means that can protect itself by itself.

The assets of the press can put a constraint to follow the right direction. The case of the press in the Arab world is so different as such. We find the property of companies, that of private owners, parties property and the official property. Every kind of these properties has its purposes. So, freedom of the press has a special meaning in all cases that relates to the freedom of the journalist. Hence, we can say that the property can have a negative impact.

The volume of multiplicity of forces in the society according to the social and economic development creates the possibility of these forces to express their ideas. It also creates and formats the commitment of the regime, which embodies the close relation between these forces. This multiplicity helps in establishing parties, Parliaments and governments. Without any doubt, it is difficult for the press to f rankly talk out of the development and affairs of society's boundaries in any nation and country.

Some times we find that press is being asked that it must show its loyality to or opposition against the government. I can say that the relation between journalist and press on the one hand and authority on the other hand must be a normal and complete relation because press is the creative manibulater of news, and journalist wants to express his ideas through this channel.

To conclude, the relation between the press and journalist is that between the means and tool which can fulfill the needs of the Public. Therefore, there is a connected relation between the two main factors; press and journalist. Each one is always in a need for the other, and also being aware of the other.

is far from such pressures and will work to subvert these reforms to preserve its status quo. However, the summit could not force such reforms on it for this lower level will use its support as a threat to do whatever they want. It may even rebel against power. Therefore, the summit of the coalition becomes very weak. It is most often resorted to compromised solutions. This will lead to loss of its credibility. On the other hand, it is difficult to think of the lower level coalition as unified. However, its individuals may be in competitive conditions. Therefore, the whole coalition does not exist and is weak, too. Its weakness may go on and the main evidence to that is the losing of the government credibility and force. The coalition may appear so weak at the face of difficulties and new

missions. For the sake of example, we find that the ruling coalition in the South and in the North before the unification appeared to be very strong which was mainly because of the limited geographical area that it controlled. It is also so because of the foreign support as well as the absence of the political opposition. However, the political coalition appeared to be very weak which was bestowed to the great expansion of the country, political as well as economic crises, the increased number of the political opposition and because of pressures for reforms. For all these reasons the development process is hurdled and an increased public dissatisfaction is in evidence. Chances for new pressure groups by those influential people are also acces-

On Law, Order and the Dispensation of Justice

have sent our messengers with the facts, and sent down the Book and the scale them, in order that people will stand by justice."

(The Holy Ouran 57:29)

"...and if you were to judge between people, then it is by justice, that you should only judge/rule" (The Holy Quran 4:58)

Over the ages, mankind has toiled with the effort of organizing social order, in order that masses of people may live together coherently, with the rights of all safeguarded, and relations among people will be fairly established. Even absolute monarchs sought to have laws and ordinances set the guidelines by which their domains are governed and their subjects are controlled. God, Al-Mighty was well involved in this effort revealing to mankind, over time, the appropriate course for the achievement of a social contract, where the weak and the strong become equal and the rich and the poor are indiscriminate when viewed in the context of the laws He insists should be a part of the social order of the universe. In fact, the Lord Al-Mighty has "prohibited injustice upon Himself", and aptly gave himself the name of "Justice" to confirm that it is only with justice that man must live and it is only with justice that mankind shall be ruled and judged accordingly.

It never ceases to puzzle this observer how Islamic legislative guidelines and conceptualizations of social orders are the most advanced spiritual guidelines for a proper social order, yet Moslem societies are the last to set their communal lives in keeping with such Heavenly Wisdom. In fact, Moslems have so much been bogged down by ritualistic aspects of their religion that they have forgotten that such ritualistic elements are mainly symbolic regulatory elements, with the core of religious beliefs really being manifest in the social order ordained in the Koran, the traditions of the Prophet Mohammed (Peace of Allah be upon him) and the actual life he and his early disciples followed through.

We, in Yemen, have a long tradition of seeking to adhere to the important social dictates of this phenomenal social order which Islam brought to this world, and have painstakingly tried to avoid any corruption that seek to obliterate this deep inherent insistence that our ways of life should never deviate from the order that God Al-Mighty wants us to conform to for our own sake. But what has happened to us over the past few decades has been, to say the least, unforgivable in terms of coming up with the appropriate institutional framework that will give the people of the country a sense of comfort in realizing that their rights are duly safeguarded by the legal framework and institutional make-up of our social fabric. Regrettably, it is the forces of injustice and oppression which have been allowed to hold sway over all our interactions as a society, and Government, rather than being the guardian and executioner of justice has, become in fact the mechanism by which oppression and injustice are meted out, leaving those who stand for the proper convening of due process of law and those who look towards the Government for ensuring God's will of freedom and equality for all in the eyes of the law, as the very victims of Government impotency and disregard for its true obligations in the social contract that it is expected to abide by and enforce accordingly.

In looking at the legislative framework that our Government is seeking to regulate this society by, one cannot feel the inherent insistence in all such legislation of giving Government more powers than it is actually entitled to in the proper social contract that needs to be established to regulate the relationship between the government and the governed. Moreover, it is clear from the legislation that so far exist that there is an obvious paradox between what Government says it is doing and wants to do than what



these legislation state and how they are implemented. Moreover, there is also a clear divisible line between our declared adherence to modern democratic principles, which have their

roots in Islam, and the actual execution of due process and imposition of justice which totally stand in contrast to such principles and God's will. It is difficult for the observer to find the source of the blame for such social incongruities, but for sure there is much, in Government and in the due process of law and order, that is to be desired, with Government surely failing in many cases to provide the general population the feeling of comfort and security that, in the end, the law will take its proper course and justice and the rights of the oppressed will prevail. On the contrary, Government and the social order that has prevailed has acted to make a mockery of serious due process of law, and has turned the dispensation of justice subject to the whimsical and narrow-minded attitude of generally incompetent responsible officials, who seek to abide by the ambitions and the self-centered interests of those who have turned Government into a free-for-all, for those who believe in the rule of muscle and money rather than law and order and the treatment of all equally under the law.

In two cases that are known to this observer, one cannot fail to see that surely our legal framework has lost its senses in dealing with rather simple cases that involve the clear safeguarding of rights and the true imposition of justice as ordained by God and as declared by our new adherence to a modern democratic framework.

The first case is the one that is well known to the Yemen Times readers and, in fact, where one who has all along cried out for proper due process of law and dispensation of justice has actually become the victim, intestate, of the very form of due process that his heirs and the public are rightfully not entitled to, notwithstanding the obvious desire of the Government to get the case over with as quick as possible without raising too much hoop-la over the matter. We are here speaking of the "traffic accident" which the late Dr. Abdulaziz Al-Saqqaf was the fatal victim of and by which his heirs and the public at large have lost an important spokesman for their rights and entitlements under a true democratic society, with the laws that will never veer from the insistence that human rights and dignity are the core and substance of any legal framework and regulatory order. Yet, the Court reviewing the case has failed to understand its true duty to the public and its obligations towards the scale it holds in its hands, that was sent down by the Lord. Al-Mighty as a trust that should never be betrayed, notwithstanding whatever whimsical and self centered interests prevail in the incongruent social order that we have become subject to. It is the Courts, in the end that should make sure that such an order never be allowed to prevail and it is the Courts that can and should make sure that such an order never be allowed to exist!

The other case involves a simple citizen, without any criminal record or any sound basis for being accused as a major suspect in a major bank robbery case that occurred in this country over a year ago. For all intents and purposes, it is clear to the Courts and the Prosecution that the suspect is in fact innocent and could surely not have partaken in such a criminal act. It is also clear that what the suspect has been subjected to by the very executioners of due process of law, and the hardships that his family has had to undergo, clearly show that our Government is not the protector of human rights it claims to be. The innocent subject still remains in the Central Prison of Sana'a (for over a year now), without any clear indication that he will be allowed to get his due right of a quick and decisive ruling that will clear him from such a bad smear that was based on pure hearsay and personal attitude of his accusers, whereas those who know this person, cannot find any justification for such continued injustice to go on.

It is not fair that all those who can do something by deed, action or word can watch this kind of a mockery to justice, without having to at lelet the public be aware that hay, there is something wrong with our social fabric. It goes without saying, there are far more cases of such injustice outstanding in the Courts and the penal system that, as much as these two cases, warrant the immediate attention of the responsible officials in the Ministry of Justice, the Ministry of Interior, the sleeping Parliament and the President of the Republic, Ali Abdullah Saleh, to whom I propose that he decrees an immediate and just finalization of all the pending cases in the quagmire of the legal/judicial jungle that has firmly become a part and parcel of our decaying social order, as his first task after having received the mandate for another term in office from the people who look to him as a final arbiter with the Government.

ithout prior notice, arrived at Souk Madbah. poor fruit and vegetable sellers had not enough time to run away with their goods scattered in front of them and in a minutes, the Municipality campaign forcibly make everybody run away leaving everything behind them to be thrown on the ground and trodden by the feet of Akhdams, who run here and there collecting what was worthy to be eaten. Now I have lost all of this which cost more than 200,000 Rials. Some others lost about 600,000 Rials. All the fruits we used to sell were scattered on

the ground and trodden on by the Municipality men ,as well as the passers by who found it a good chance to have fresh fruits free.

The Municipality campaign arrived at 10 O'clock in the morning, threw the fruits on the ground and took some of them by large boxes into their cars. They even broke and destroyed the wheelbarrows. I saw the "Akhdams- working for the Sana'a Municipality" collecting the fruits and vegetables. I also saw a soldier pushing a man selling tomatoes and the Akhdams harried and took the wheelbarrow with the tomatoes in it.

The meeting concentrated on the decision of the Ministry of Information to stop publication of the Al-Shoura newspaper. They also discussed the danger to the future of democracy. Mr. Tariq Al-Ashwal, the vice-secre-

general of the People's Confederation Forces initiated the deliberation of the meeting focusing on the dangerous consciences of these decisions, which contravene the consti-

freedom of opinions, so the activity should not stop at this point." he called upon everyone to join hands to promote democratic values by strengthening the voice protest through the participation of students, syndicates and associations. From his own side, Mr. Abdulbari Taha urged upon the national press to take a serious note of this development.

Mr. Hassan Abdulwarith endorsed the sentiment expressed by saying: "the syndicate has showed its own opinion towards the Al-Shoura suspension, but the report has not been published yet". said that the Ministry of Information took this decision in the

ter to organize a demonstration and to sit-down at the Ministry of Information, while Mr. Ahmed Al-Sofei suggested that they should move to Sana'a university to organize a big congregation of students there.

Lawyer Mohammed Al-Mikhlafi expressed his sympathy on this matter. He said that as he pledged his solidarity with the Al-Shoura, he at the same time, declares his solidarity with judgment in favor of independence. As, Mr. Mohammed Al-Makaleh said the Al-Shoura newspaper has proved since the end of the war in 1994 till now that it is the first newspaper which left no stone upturned for defiance about Unity and

Along with these meetings, a number of governorates organized during last two days solidarity meetings to support the Al-Shoura in which they all requested for revoking these oppressive procedures against the Al-Shoura newspaper. The branch of the Opposition Coordination Council in Aden organized a meeting on September 25, 99 to deal with this problem. A number of journalist and cultured people attended the meeting. Unequivocally expressed their protest against this decision, and unanimously resolved that it was a dangerous matter which aimed at narrowing the informative and political net work of Al-Shoura in particular and of the opposition parties in general.

In Taiz a meeting was held in the presence of some civic social associations, syndicates, unions, human associations and a number of political and social personalities. This meeting reviewed the procedures leading to the suspension of Al-Shoura. They strongly felt that this decision was dangerous violation of the constitution, and showed the mutilation of democratic norms and infringement of human rights. It would, they felt, encourage incidence of corruption. They called all

humanitarian associations to condemn these oppressions.

There was another meeting on Tuesday September 28, 99 in Al-Dale governorate. It protested against the arbitrary procedures against Al-Shoura. They said that this decision went beyond the legal limits of the press liberty. They appealed to the authority to develop the promote and facilitate democratic processes which gives right to every one to express his own opinion.

The solidarity meetings were conducted in most of the governorates

of the Republic. For example, the solidarity meeting which took place on Sept. 28th 1999, in Al-Turbah, Taiz, expressed its condemnation for this aggressive practice which affected the reputation of democracy in our country, and doubted the real credibility of t he government's intention to protect democracy and personal liberties.

There was a number of journalists, cultured and writers who expressed their opinions on this matter. Faris Al-Saqqaf said that the attack on the Al-Shoura meant an attack on their liberties. Writer, Qadri Ahmad Haider said We shouldn't only defend the Al-Shoura, but we should defend our personal rights as well." He reviewed the suspension of the Al-Shoura as a dangerous phenomenon which threaten the human rights.

Journalist Hafedh Al-Bakari, Okaz newspaper's correspondent requested the newspapers of the Opposition Coordination Council to support the Al-Shoura by issuing additional supplements which focused on the Al-

A short talk was delivered by Mr. Nasser Taha Mostafa who said what happened was a sordid affair. he suggested that efforts should be made means to put an end to these violations.

About the Internet

Yemeni Intelligent Life on the WWW

Many unfortunately, think that because Yemen is a poor country, living with one of the lowest income rates in the world, there would be very few Internet literate Yemenis on the web.

The truth is that there is intelligent life of Yemenis on the Internet. These Yemenis have their own home pages, their own emails, their own programs, designs, and graphics. However, their number is still too low to be compared with many other Arab countries.

Most of the readers of Yemen Times Online for example, are Yemenis living abroad and foreigners. They consist of almost more than 95% of the readers. One can expect this rate, especially when realizing that computer usage in Yemen is far lower

than standard western standards. Since the Internet section in this page has started, a large number of readers in Yemen sent me complaints that this page is useful in general, but they could not make use if it because they do not have the means to practice and use the Internet. The main reason for that is the economic hardships the country is undergoing. Today, most Yemenis who use the Internet belong to two groups. The first belong to rich families, which can afford buying computers and subscribing to the Internet through Teleyemen's Y.net. The other group is consists of the employees in foundations that have these services, such as, Oil companies, Embassies, newspapers (including the Yemen Times), and virtually any company, even small scaled ones use the Internet services nowadays.

Unfortunately, even Sanaa university is yet to have its own Internet services through a leased line, or at least an ISDN connection.

When browsing through the Internet, you might want to know how well Yemen is known or mentioned online. An efficient and exciting way to have a rough idea about Yemen's popularity online, you can go to one of the main search engines and search for the keyword "yemen".

Then you can compare the returned number of hits with the number returned from searching for other countries. Perhaps one can start with Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Egypt, Lebanon, etc.

An interesting study online shows that Yemen is the least mentioned country online among the other Arab countries. Due to the fact that the Internet converts the world to a small village, you may encounter Yemenis online from different countries in the world, mostly developed countries.

I remember the first time I surfed the Internet, I wanted to know whether there can be other Yemenis online at that very moment. Later I realized that there are at least thousands other Yemenis online at the same time. I learned how to chat, phone, and even video conference with Yemenis living in the furthest areas away from Yemen.

I was impressed with many individuals who tried their best to get people online to know and learn more about the once called "Arabia Felix". They included pictures, articles, reports, and even pictures.

We are proud to say that Yemen Times Onlines is a pioneer in getting people to know Yemen.

After three years of online service for our readers absolutely for free, we get a lot of responses such as "We could not imagine that there could be such a wonderful vemeni site." "How can a Yemeni design such a great site."

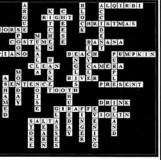

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Realizing One's Passion in **Traveling the World**

Sanaa Bureau Chie Yemen Time:

Russell Berenger was born in Sri Lanka. However, he left Sri Lanka 23 years ago, and started selling old cars. For ten years, he repaired cars. He did all this work by himself. He did not take the help of anybody because it

was his own guarantee in his private work in Sidney. He harbored a passion to challenge the world. Now aged 52, and an Australian citizen, he has the Christmas left to conquer 195 countries of the world in the shortest possible time. Papua New Guinea and other Pacific countries were part of the remaining 32 countries to be covered in three months time that is left. He has already covered 163 countries in a journey that

> Melbourne, Australia. From Papua New Guinea, he will slowly work his way back to the headquarters Guinness Book of world records to check how he has fared. But for now, he seems close to completing his world journey, if not close to realizing his passion. It started in Sri Lanka when his father bought his bicycle. In course of his marathon mission he has stopped only three



He claims to have broken three world records, subject to confirmation by Guinness Book of

36 planes in 56 days in the West Indies, he trav-

eled in 69 trains in 35 days in 25 countries inside Europe. The fourth record he is attempting is to write is the world's most powerful overland travel guide with the title: "An exotic world of sin, sex, crime, drugs and temptation". The fifth aim is to have a movie made on his life. He claims to have initial contact with film maker Stephen Spilberg at Universal studies in Hollywood. He has another aim of taking the risk of traveling around the world so as to become the master of disguise.

He was robbed seven times and attempted to be killed nine times. Some of the robberies were of a magnitude that forced his return to Australia to replenish his needs. In Turkey a man poisoned his drink to rob him.

The pacific leg of his overland non-stop journey around the world cost US \$ 10,000. The pacific islands are twice as expensive as the West Indies in terms at air-fares but on his first stop over in Port Moresby he praised the country

for the generosity and hospitality of its people. Well, for him it is a pleasant surprise having traveled around 155 countries, and some islands

Russell is very much impressed by the hospitality of Yemenis in comparison with the other countries. He describes Yemenis as "open and kind-hearted, while showing you places or giving you the details".

His mission in traveling the world through the 163 countries is to break records in the world, and that mission is still to be accomplished. Russell said that in Yemen he felt safe, not like in some other countries where he was forced to disguise himself. His concluding message was to thank the people of Yemen for their hospitality and readiness to offer help at





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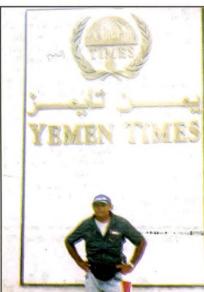
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
