Violent protests in Saada, peaceful in other cities

SANAA-Tens of thousands of Yemenis staged massive protests last Saturday against the potential US war against Iraq throughout the country.

A protest of thousands in Saada led to

the outbreak of violence between protestors and police after some armed protestors approached the Political Security Organization (PSO) building in the city demanding the release of some people

some time ago a visit paid by the US ambassador to Yemen Edmund Hull to the mosque of Imam Al-Hadi bin al-Hussein. Initial statistics say that one protestor died and injury of a dozen. In defense of the PSO building was the head of the PSO in Saada Yahya Al-Marrani whose efforts were instrumental in ending the conflict and preventing the protest from destroying the building. An eyewitness said that at least two people were wounded when police forces responded by firing at them.

police fired at the protestors when they wanted to enter the UN office along with those political parties representatives who submitted a message of protest to the UN representative. No injuries were reported but one of the protestors was arrested but was later released.

Protests in the rest of the country were mostly peaceful. Protests staged in Sana'a and other governorates came as a result of president Saleh's call to his people last Wednesday to protest the war which he

described as unjust and terrorizing. Senior political parties' leaders including Dr. Abdulkareem al-Iryani, political advisor to the President, Sheikh Abdullah al-Ahmar, Sheikh Abdulmajeed al-Zindani and others took part in the demonstra-

The protestors in Sanaa including school teachers and civil workers, who gathered at al-Tahreer Square in the city center. Al-Iryani addressed the crowd by condemning the war which he called an act of imperialism. He said that all Yemeni

people are against the war which threatens peace and stability worldwide. Al-Ahmar urged the Arab leaders to act in a responsible manner that reflects the wish and will of their people who oppose the war. On his part, Zindani called for Jihad (Islamic holy war) and demanded that military camps be opened to train young people who can take part in the war against the US. He also demanded that borders should be opened for those fighters to go to Iraq.

Massive arrest campaign in two main cities:

Hunt for al-Qaeda

Yemeni security forces launched last week a massive arrest campaign against al-Qaeda suspects in Ibb and Aden. The security arrested one al-Qaeda suspect in Ibb last Tuesday and over 20 others at different places in Aden. Reliable sources said that a suspect named al-Qasim was arrested in Ibb upon his return form a Gulf country. His family tried to get him released on

bail but to no avail. At the same time police in Aden arrested a number of people suspected of having links to al-Qaeda and Islamic Jihad. Among the arrestees were mosque preachers and religious personali-

Some of the arrestees were released but others are still in jail and have been charged with being affiliated to some terrorist net-

Meanwhile, over 50 detainees in al-Hodeidah governorate appealed to President Ali Abdullah Saleh and human rights organizations requesting them to interfere and get them released or at least presented to court. They were arrested more than a year and a half ago upon the launch of the war against terrorism campaign. They complained that there was no legal justification for their imprisonment.

According to official sources, there are currently 104 detainees in Yemeni prisons suspected of being members of al-Qaeda.


seen reason. The leadership is clearly keen to make this year's elections another success that would add up





YSP demands serious investigation into Jarallah's assassination

The Yemeni Socialist Party (YSP) demanded the government last Friday to conduct a serious, thorough and transparent investigation into the case of the assassination of its Assistant Secretary General, Jarallah Omar last December. The YSP said that the investigation should disclose the compliance of the assassin and that those who would be proved involved in the crime should be tried and punished severely.

In a statement issued at the end of its fifth round of the central committee, the YSP called to end the impacts of the 1994 civil war and that the national rally which Saleh called for be achieved through national reconciliation, confrontation of violence and improving the deteriorating living conditions of the people. The YSP welcomed Saleh's call for elections and emphasized that it would continue working with other opposition parties

The Yemen Times also learned from reliable sources that the party agreed to take part in the next parliamentary elections and that it would participate in around 60 constituencies out of 301. Among the candidates, the YSP revealed that it will have five females. This comes in a time the party suffers financial problems as the government continues to insist on not releasing its property since the 1994 civil war. The YSP female candidates are Shafiqah Murshed and Wahibah Sabrah who will run for the elections in Sana'a, Radhiyah Shamsheer and Khawlah Sharaf in Aden, and Salma al-Katheri, who will run in Hadramaut.

The government and the opposition reached last week an agreement in which they pledged to adhere to a fair, honest, free, and non-violent elections. It is expected that the political parties will debate the agreement and approve

Dr. al-Qubati wins awards...

Dr. Al-Qubati won two prestigious awards last week. The first was the Shousha Prize, named after Dr. A. T. Shousha who was the first president of the World Health Organization in the Middle East.

Dr. Al-Qubati won the prize for his contribution to fighting leprosy in Yemen, and his outstanding medical record in fighting endemic diseases.

This is the 38th prize of its kind, since the first one in 1966. And this is the first time a Yemeni wins it. The rewarded is selected through research and consultation among the Arab Health Ministers during the annual meeting of the committee members.

Dr. Al-Qubati has dedicated his practical life for curing leprosy and worked in several foreign countries such as Indonesia, Libya, Bangladesh, India and Pakistan.

In 1998 he established the National Program for Eradicating Leprosy, then he worked as a consultant at the Ministry of Health since 2000.

This is not the first award that Dr. Al-Qubati received in his practical life, for he has won many prizes and awards; he won the Hael Saeed award in 1996, and Yemen Times Person of the Year in 1998.

And he will be receiving his prize in a special ceremony to be attended by the Arab Health Ministers in September 2003.

The Saskawa prize is named after a Japanese businessman who served against the English occupation in his country, and exerted efforts for fighting smallpox. The prize is awarded annually to any establishment that is active in fighting a particular disease. The \$ 80,000 worth prize will be awarded partially to Yemen, for the first Time to an Arabian country, and partially to Philippines.

Dr. Ahmed Hael Saeed will be receiving the award on behalf of the society in Geneva next May.

On his part, Dr. Ghaleb Fadhl al-Eriani, Animal Wealth Director at the Agriculture Ministry told Yemen Times that there are more than 180,000 camels in the desert areas.

Laila's case needs to be reconsidered

A number of human rights organizations and international anti-violence organizations have recently expressed their resentment over Laila Aesha, a Yemeni woman who was sentenced to death by throwing stones at her in public after being found of committing adultery.

A number of human rights organizations told Attaggmo'a newspaper last week that the final decision against Laila has ignored a number of facts regarding

"We strictly adhere to the society's values and the justice of Sharia, (Islamic Law), but the final decision against Laila is unfair and will not be accepted by those who have a bit of conscience," the paper said.

Those organizations have demanded the president to interfere immediately considering the case as unfair. "She fell as a victim to adultery before even being 16 years old. She has been abandoned by her husband for about two year," the paper said.

In Sharia, a married man or woman who commits adultery willingly and with eyewitnesses present is subject to death by stoning. The situation becomes too unjust when some judged are not well-qualified and simply implement such extreme sentences too hastily.

Male chauvinism still dominates

he whole world celebrat-Day, International (March 8) and Yemen is among those countries. Women in advanced countries have been given an easy access to all walks of life. Allowing women to participate in all issues relating to life, is a signalling achievement of progress towards a full equality among all citizens in any community.

In a country like Yemen, women have actually made laudable strides in economic, social, political and cultural fields.

Women's increasingly active participation despite the considerable difficulties and obstacles of the past two decades is certainly attributable to the increase in educational facilities. That is, women are not simply restricted to housework but have started taking up roles in economic, political and cultural life of our society.

However women's increased contact with the outside world has created some difficulties for them which may, at many times, lead to their encountering with the law, either as a violator of the law or as a victim of crime.

In both cases, women are subjected a law which is written and implemented

The following are some viewpoints on the women's parts and how do men in particular perceive them at work or as a housewife.

Women in our country are perceived as inferior and sometimes they are treated scornfully. "People see that women should stay at home and to bring chil-

"She is the housekeeper, housewife and that her duty is restricted to nurture, educate, cherish and bring her children up," he said.

Hamdi has expressed his resentment towards some women and girls these days, "Nowadays, it a real eye-opener when the culture of tobacco pipes, cafe and mobile fashion have widely spread among women, particularly, in a conservative society like Yemen," he said.

He further give pieces of advises to such kind of women to discard being overindulged in unwanted things or panting after setting the fashion. "Don't believe it. It is all rubbish," he further commented.

"Make yourself a good example of a true mother and a true woman who has a vital role in educating children and bringing them up in a good manner based on the true Islamic principles," he


shown when female students got the best if compared to her classmates of male students. '

Fahd Hamoud Ahmed Sultan, English teacher, like Abdurazaq, shares the same idea that women through history have played a vital role since the beginning of man's civilizations and the creation of the universe. The first seeds of the man-women relationship was successfully represented by the father of mankind Adam and Eve

There has been a great controversy upon the role of women's attitude in building human civilization and information technology. This has represented itself by whether should women stay at home or go to work, studying at the university. Several questions pose themselves and in need of urgent solutions.

Since time immemorial, specifically during the Islamic era, women performed the role of a doctor and a nurse. She was entitled to bandaging up the injured warriors. This role is similar to the role of a nurse today.

Women's work outside doesn't constitute a problem if we do still adhere to the Islamic principles. She is the active half of community. It is shameful to deprive her of coping with every thing new. She has the talent and perhaps exceeds man in this respect. She is as sharp-witted as man. Why do we make her frustrated under pretext of being mixed with man. If the matter is so, why

don't we establish girls universities, or hospitals,? Why don't we seek for better alternatives where Islam is innocent and away from this?

Fahd in this regard sees that women in cities are exposed to the state-of-theart technologies and immoral urbanization, "Women in villages are not affected by the latest fashions as that in the urban areas," he said.

"But I want to suggest here that some of those women are indulgently diving in the new technology and this has negatively affected their way of life," he said.

Those who consider women as a matter of satisfying desires are without a shadow of doubt, beasts of burden and mentally backward.

To conclude, I want to point a significant point which is crucial and easy to be accepted by women. That is, they are exposed to the intellectual invasion because they are by nature docile creatures. This clearly manifests itself when the entire world has become a mini-village under such nomenclatures, as that of globalization," he highlighted further.

Eng. Adnan Ali A. Moghram, Geological Survey and Mineral Resources Board, placed great stress on that women have a leading role in building up societies and civilizations.


"More in sorrow than in anger is that some male employees are swarming around the female ones, which in away or another have greatly distorted their manhood," he said. "We in this case don't oppose women to be sociable but it should be within acceptable limits," he further noted.

That is not only enough, we have heard and perhaps seen that women are perceived as inferior as Dr. Mohammed has mentioned earlier. This is a tangled problem where our society has become unaware of. Efforts to deal with the crisis of male chauvinism or violence against women, in its many forms, have been fragmented by the boundaries of academic disciplines and professional allegiances. Academicians and clinicians are speaking to those most like themselves in relatively closed groups, not hearing the numerous voices that need to be heard if we are to develop a full understanding of the problem and a comprehensive strategy for addressing

Physiological studies indicate that one man's violence against one woman may seem to result from his individual psychological problems, sexual frustration, unbearable life pressures, or some innate urge toward aggression.

Though each of these "reasons" has been used to explain and even justify male chauvinism, they oversimplify a complex reality: Men have been taught to relate to the world in terms of dominance and control, and they have been taught that male dominance is an acceptable method of maintaining control, resolving conflicts, and expressing anger. When a boss harasses an employee, he exerts his power to restrict her freedom to work and improve her posi-

When a batterer husband uses beatings to confine his wife to hose and to prevent her from seeing friends and family or from pursuing outside work, he exerts dominance and control. Whether or not an individual man who commits an act of violence views it as an expression of power is not the point. The fact that so many individual men feel entitled to express their frustration or anger by being violent to so many individual women shows how deeply these lessons of dominance and violence have been learned. Countless daily acts of violence create a climate of fear and powerlessness that limit women's freedom of action and control many of the movements of our lives.

As for women working in the health sector as a doctor or a nurse, the society has a different point of view. This manifests itself when a women for instance offers medication services to a women. "In this case a woman doctor should in receiving treatment should depend on women," he added further.

al report for 2002 discussed several important population issues that were considered vital in order to answer development objectives put further for the century. These objectives are: decreasing the rates of poverty and hunger to the half by 2015, the reduction of mother and/or child death by birth, combating AIDS, reaching equality between the two genders and finally enforcing sustained development.

he latest UNFPA annu-

In the light of these objectives, Yemen produced its equivalent report but on a national level in September 2002. It was the first Arabian country to do so. The report contained statistics and costs in order to comply with the universal report of the United

This meant that Yemen should reduce the poverty and hunger rate by 50%, achieve primary education for all, decrease the gap between the two genders and aspiring for equality, reducing the death rate due to birth by 75% of what it was in 1990, combat AIDS and other contagious diseases, increase the access rate to pure water by 50%, and finally increase world partnership for development.

Therefore, the solution for population problems is a significant point that should be addressed seriously. Understanding this, the National Conference for Population was carried out end of October 2002 to revise the development which the country has reached so far and also to study the

future challenges the country would be facing in order to reach the international standards set forth by the UNFPA

Several strategies have been affirmed, of which are, the Strategic Vision 2025 and Poverty Reduction Strategy 2003-2005.

However, the massive rate (3.3) at which the population is growing in Yemen is aggravating the poverty problem, where studies link family size and level of poverty saying that poverty level could go below 1% for families consisting of 10 persons or

Another problem is the rate of non productive people in the country, more than 50%, making it difficult to provide essential services to all, especially women. Women are more liable to being poor due to their minute contriof traditions and social norms that prevent women from contributing in the market share.

As for the health sector, Yemen still suffers from various contagious diseases that hamper the public health. In spite of the many programs and health projects, the situation is still critical and these diseases pose as a threat to many lives or disabilities in many

They include malaria which infects 21% of the general population, Hepatitis B which infects 28% of children below 5 years of age, along with typhoid, and digestive worms and infections.

More than that, deaths due to birth or even pregnancy was reported by Ministry of Public Health to reach 800 case for every 100,000 births.

Media needs development

edia Center for Training & Qualifying Institute (MCTQI) is a scientific institution that aims at conducting professional training and rehabilitation of employees in all media; governmental and nongovernmental institutions and benefits from the scientific studies and field researches that the institute does, using curriculum of communication sciences.

Thus, MCTQI enables employees in all different mass media to raise their abilities and develop their professional and creative skills.

Mr. Ismael al-Ghabri, Yemen Times reporter, has an interview with the Dean of the MCTOI Dr. Abduallah Ali al-Zalab who has talked about the MCTQI policy, its capabilities and the nature of the program it renders as well as a number of issues.

Q: What prompted the establishment of the MCTQI, what stages it has passed through?

A: The institute was founded upon a decree in 1999 in which Khalifa institute for broadcasting and TV in Sana'a and the Media Training institute were incorporated.

Regarding the reasons behind establishing the MCTQI, there are many, however, but mainly the extensive speedy development in communication world and technology have greatly had effect on the mass media, generally, as it has created more power and more effect. So because of special channels and in the swift delivering and exchange the information via new means such as Internet, that helped media to be one of the main bases for any country development and progress.

Yemen has been experiencing many big changes, and democracy is one of the most important one. Democracy in any country needs efficient media in all political, social and economic fields. The media to become more efficient and effective does not need perpetration only, but also efficient minds having glamorous abilities to run the media work as well as to respond to updating

wants and to development needs in the country. Man is development-maker and its aim and the most investments in any country seeks progress in all fields is to pay attention to human. Thus, it has been necessary to establish the institute to train and rehabilitate all employees in official and private-sector media institutions, as it is high cost for training abroad.

Mechanisms

Q: What is the mechanism and policy that the training workshops for employees in media field based on and how do you choose the trainees?

A: The institute always cherishes to work on studied plans responding to reality needs as well as the media institutions'. So there is annual plan to meet the requirements, besides we respond to urgent requirements that media institutions need throughout the year.

Of course, the institute is open to all media institutions in the country as it is national institute receiving all the people without taking into account their political and party affiliations and rehabilitates all the interested, either in private or in governmental and non-governmental organizations and parties. The institute trains all workers in the media without exception.

Regarding the criteria of choosing trainees it is left up to the institutions but in special workshops we ask that the trainee has to have previous experiences and skills as the training is for a short time. And the goal of training is meant to acquire new and additional experiences. We do not accept anybody who does not fit, even his or her institute has nominated him or her. Because she/he will impede the training course so we address the institutions in advance about our conditions.

Q: Is the institute open for only institutions or individuals as well?

A: We do it for institutions and now we study the possibility of giving opportunity to individuals, but we haven't enough capability at the time being. However, we are looking forward to achieving this goal in future. That's certainly requires approval from the premiership and the ministry of finance.

Capabilities

Q: What capabilities and techno-

logical equipment do you have?

A: We have a training studio for broadcasting and TV and modern monitoring and montage units. In addition, we have two halls for distant training via Internet and satellites as well as there is a hall for electronic training and computer lab. Now we seek to prepare languages lab and training in press lab as well.

Q: It is known that training courses only would not create successful media men, to what extent they can serve him as a media man?

A: The goal is to refresh those employees memory and get them acquainted with the latest information and upgrade their personal abilities with the skills, experiences and new techniques. Working in media field is renewable world having no limit. The institute tries to get hold of the latest information and experiences. The training is not limited to certain category, it's continuous activity. There is the training targeting employees possessing previous experiences. This is called activating training. Another type of training is related to teaching new abilities and skills, technical, press or information. There are also programs set up employees fresh at mass media

Distant education

Q: Recently, We have read that the institute is going to establish workshops in media field titled distant training. Could you elaborate on this

A: The distant training comes as result of an agreement between the Yemeni government and the Arab organization for education and culture and science and the Arab countries broadcasting union. The distant training is starting in March. This agreement Yemen singed along with 15 Arab countries aims to benefit from this kind of training.

The training aims at to reduce the high costs for training outside those 15 countries. Therefore, workshops will be done in a certain country and the signatory countries will benefit at the same time via the Internet and satellites

Q:What are the fields that training will handle?

A:The distant training is theoretical and has wide ranges. Fields of training are requested by member states. Coordinators will be selected from those states and through them various kinds of fields wanted will be specified.

Taking care of human

Q: Many of our media institutions suffer from professional deficiencies, how can this be fixed?

A: The ideal solution is to pay attention to the human. We have to invest and develop the human mind as well as equipment and institutional construction. It is necessary to pay them due attention and benefit from others' experiences and experiments. It is not necessary to begin from scratch or go through all failing experiments they had experienced. We have to learn from and overcome them.

Equipment expiry date has to be checked as there are some with one or two years expiry duration. We know that there is a better technology to come. So we have to buy only hightech equipment. The important thing is developing the human mind that can give generously and continuously in different fields. The ultimate goal of development in any society is the human. Without developing and training of human mind, it will be impossible to develop the media work or any other activity.

Future plans Q: What are your future plans and


A: Our ambitions are limitless. But the capabilities are always impediment. However, the ambition is still existent. We are looking for meeting the needs of media institutions for raising media employees abilities technologically and professionally. New Turkey PM dashes U.S. hope of swift troop move

Turkish Prime Minister Tayyip Erdogan dashed any remaining U.S. hopes of a rapid decision to deploy U.S. troops in Turkey for an Iraq war when he said his government will not consider it until it wins a confidence

Erdogan's comments on Friday evening came hours after he presented a cabinet list to President Ahmet Necdet Sezer, who approved the cabinet lineup and appointed him prime minister. He formally took office at a ceremony on Saturday.

U.S. officials have already indicated they had little hope of Ankara approving a request to station 62,000 American troops on Turkish soil in time for any conflict with Iraq, which could be just days away. Opposition to a war is widespread in Turkey.

Parliament rejected a first resolution on the deployment -- which U.S. military planners say could speed a victory over Baghdad by forcing it to fight on two fronts -- two weeks ago.

Asked when a new motion might be submitted to parliament, Erdogan was quoted by the state-run Anatolian news agency as saying: "At the moment there is no such thing on our agenda. All of that (comes) after the vote of confidence

Parliament ruled that the government programme would be read in parliament on Tuesday, with a debate

dence vote after another day, pushing any new motion on the troop deployment back to the following week.

Barring a last-minute reversal on the issue, Washington has said a multi-billion dollar aid package vital to shielding Turkey against the economic impact of war is off the table.

The United States is still pushing for overflight rights in any conflict but officials are increasingly pessimistic. In a Friday evening briefing at party headquarters, Erdogan said it was up to parliament to decide on the overflight

Widespread opposition to war

In a ceremony at the prime minister's office on Saturday, Erdogan formally took over the premiership from ally Abdullah Gul, who resigned this week to make way for his party leader.

Erdogan led the Justice and Development Party to victory in November polls but was barred from the premiership until last weekend because of a conviction for Islamist sedition. He made Gul foreign minister in the new government.

Widespread Turkish opposition to an attack on a neighbouring Muslim state played a role in parliament's rejection of the initial troop resolution on March 1. More than a quarter of Erdogan's own deputies voted against the motion.

Iraq hands VX report

BAGHDAD, March 15 (Reuters) lraq destroyed three more banned ballistic missiles on Saturday, a day after handing the United Nations a promised report on the deadly nerve gas VX.

"Three al-Samoud 2 missiles, one launcher and some parts of warheads and tank components were destroyed today," Hiro Ueki, spokesman for the U.N. Monitoring and Verification and Inspection Commission (UNMOVIC) told Reuters.

The destruction of the missiles. which the United Nations says violate a 150 km (93 mile) maximum range imposed after Iraq's defeat in the 1991 Gulf War, took place at the Taji base, 25 miles (40 km) north of Baghdad.

A total of 68 al-Samoud missiles and 42 warheads have been destroyed since Iraq, facing a possible U.S. and British invasion, started dismantling the missiles this month to meet a March 1 deadline set by chief U.N. weapons inspector Hans Blix.

Iraq submitted a new 25-page report, half in English and half in Arabic, to the United Nations on Friday on VX, and whether it was able to produce it in sizable quantities, U.N. officials said.

Iraqi U.N. Ambassador Mohammed Aldouri told Reuters the report "will show reliable evidence that we have no more of these materials and that they have been destroyed."

"We are trying now our best to convince UNMOVIC that everything has been destroyed," Aldouri said.

UNMOVIC says there are many open questions concerning Iraq's VX production capability, including significant amounts in Iraq's past accounts of precursors for the gas.



Vowing to defend President Saddam Iraqis march in defence of Saddam

KERBALA, Iraq, March 15 (Reuters) - Thousands of Iraqis took to the streets in state-organised marches on Saturday, vowing to defend President Saddam Hussein from a U.S. invasion as the clock ticked towards war.

From the Shi'ite Muslim cities of southern Iraq, which rose up against Baghdad after the 1991 Gulf War, to Saddam's stronghold of Tikrit, men, women and children marched and chanted support for the Iraqi leader.

In Baghdad, the crowd burned a U.S.

"We are your soldiers, Saddam, where will America get through?" youths chanted in Kerbala, home of the Shi'ite shrine of Hussein, a grandson of the prophet Mohammad who died in battle fighting overwhelming odds.

"Lead on Saddam -- quitting is not an option" said a banner carried by one of the 3,000 or 4,000 marchers in Kerbala, which has a population of about three quarters of a million people. "Saddam is Iraq...Iraq is Saddam," said another.

Waving AK-47 assault rifles, chequered keffiyehs, Iraqi flags, tribal banners and pictures of Saddam, they paraded past Kerbala's governor, General Latif Mahal Humoud.

"These are the Shi'ite people," Humoud told Reuters. "If the evil (Americans) invade Iraqi territory, the children, women and men of Kerbala will fight them."

In a Kerbala cafe, religion rather than politics appeared the driving force behind opposition to the United States.

"America is the enemy of Islam, not the enemy of the government," said Ahmed, a shopkeeper sipping a cup of

"If the Americans come they will take the abaya (veil) off our women. We will not accept this. Death would be better," said Ghazi Husseini.

"We love Saddam"

Iraqi officials said marchers also took to the streets of Tikrit, Saddam's hometown, and the southern city of Basra. U.S. President George W. Bush's threat of force against Iraq sparked demonstrations in many nations on Saturday.

In Baghdad, a few thousand people, many carrying AK-47 assault rifles,

Hizbollah fires at Israeli planes

BEIRUT, March 15 (Reuters) -Lebanon's Hizbollah guerrillas fired anti-aircraft rounds at Israeli planes over south Lebanon on Saturday, and a dud shell landed in a street in a northern Israeli border town, security sources

"There was anti-aircraft fire, about 15 or 16 rounds," a spokesman for the U.N. peacekeeping force in south Lebanon

Security sources in south Lebanon said Hizbollah had fired the rounds at Israeli warplanes that roared over south Lebanon and the Bekaa valley. But one source said the fire may have been directed at an Israeli pilotless reconnaissance drone

Israeli security sources said a dud shell had landed in a street in the northern Israeli border town of Kiryat Shmona. No one was reported to have been hurt.

The United Nations said last month it was concerned at an increase in flights by Israeli warplanes, and worried that it could escalate into a more serious con-

Overflights slowed following the warning, but residents in south Lebanon have reported sighting Israeli reconnaissance drones overhead in recent weeks.

Prior to the warning, Israeli overflights were among the most frequent since Hizbollah helped expel Israel from south Lebanon in 2000 after a 22-year occupation.

Since the pullout, Israeli jets have often flown over towns across Lebanon drawing retaliatory fire from Hizbollah and the Lebanese army.

The United Nations views both the overflights and the retaliatory fire as violations of the terms of Israel's pull-

"By God, I am willing to be martyred in defence of Iraq, the sacred land of Iraq our beloved leader,"

cloth on his chest proclaiming himself ready to be a suicide fighter.

On the road to Kerbala, about 100 km (60 miles) south of Baghdad, several batches of anti-aircraft artillery could be seen, all pointing south. At one site, what appeared to be tanks had been dug in, surrounded by banks of earth.

Sandbags were piled on top of mounds of earth every few kilometres (miles), but seemed to be largely unmanned.

More than 250,000 U.S. and British troops are poised to invade Iraq. Washington and London accuse Saddam of maintaining weapons of mass destruction in defiance of the United Nations. Saddam denies the charges.

More protest, greater anger

Police imposed strict security measares on protestors who carried banners reading phrases condemning the war and both the US and the UK. These mottos indicated that the main purpose of the war is to support the state of Israel. Among the slogans were "death to US and Israel". They also carried photos of Saddam Hussein and Hassan Nasr Allah despite the fact that the organizing committee requested them not carry any pictures except those of President Saleh.

Other protests took place in Taiz, Amran and other cities. In a unique move in Hajjah, thousands of people who protested the war there declared their readiness to donate their own guns and ammunition to support the Iraqi people.

Postponement of elections resisted

Interestingly, the allocated military budget didn't exceed YR 7 billion, which signals the government's intention to allocating more money to tackle internal conflicts rather than to expand military capabilities.

Yemen has recently announced its olan to combat terrorism by ensuring better coordination among security bodies and enhancing security procedures around foreign embassies and vital installations.

New policy on security

Accordingly, the National Defense Council (NDC) decided in a meeting last week to implement the policy of security development across the coun-

This could be achieved by upgrading new security zones, to be fully equipped with human and technical

The decision of the NDC has come in a time tension in the country has been

greatly provoked by the current international developments amid fears of performing external intelligence activities in Yemen following or during the war against Iraq.

Such security procedures have been adopted to prevent possible terror activities, which may target US or foreign interests in Yemen when the war breaks

Elections to be held on time

Meanwhile, the closing ceremony of the registration process for elections wrapped up last week in the presence of president Ali Abdullah Saleh. The president emphasized the will to go with elections without any delay regardless of international events in the region.

During the ceremony, a speech was delivered by the president focusing on some key internal issues as well as

As for internal issues, the president called upon all political forces and Yemenis to gather together to bear the responsibility for the forth-coming parliamentary elections to be successfully performed.

"The negative practices, chaos, causing trouble to the security will not be repeated whether by candidates, political parties or social figures. We have to be civilized and bear the responsibility under such difficult circumstances," the president said.

He further noted that the parliamentary election committees selected the Supreme Committee for Election and Referendum (SCER) in coordination with the groups representing various parties to work together to make the elections a success.

"The significant point in this matter is that the supervision election committee is considered to be an unbiased national institution by all parties.

In order to carry out healthy competitive elections without bigotry, this supervision election committee has been set up," he added.

Worries about war

As for the regional as well as international key issues, the president has expressed his concerns and worries over the war against Iraq. "The Arab and Islamic nations are anxiously awaiting the unknown because preparations are in full swing on the war-path,'

the president said. He hoped that the war would not break out because it is "unjust" and will bring despotism and an absence of international justice.

Protests against old MPs

On the other hand, an incensed atmosphere was raised in some constituencies over the return of former MPs who had won in the last elections but failed to meet their promises. Around 3,000 protesters gathered in the capital of Sana'a last Tuesday demanding the president and the General People's Congress (GPC) not to allow those members to be nominated again because they were unable to render social services to their areas.

Challenge to the GPC

In this regard, some political observers see that the upcoming parliamentary elections will be a nail-biting phase for the GPC due to the relatively unified stance of the opposition bloc. In the same context, informed sources told Yemen Times that both the Islah party the second largest party after the GPC -

GPC itself will avoid returning some of their old candidates to be re-elected during the upcoming elections.

Despite the success those members will probably achieve in the coming elections, they will not be nominated because most of them have been known to have links with Islamic fundamentalist elements in Yemen.

On his part, Sheikh Abdullah bin Hussien al-Ahmar, speaker of the parliament, the leader of Islah, confirmed that the inclusion of all the political parties for the upcoming elections will enhance peace and security in Yemen.

In an interview to Al-Sahwah, organ of the Islah Party, the Sheikh has expressed his pessimistic point of view over the coming elections due to possible US-led war against Iraq.

He further demanded for carrying out healthy competitive elections without violations which might lead to inevitable political disturbances.

"Our primary mission is deterrence and influence," Navy Captain Richard B. Wren, the ship's commanding officer told a pool of reporters.

"Our presence in the region is not in direct response on North Korea, but certainly our presence can also be an influence." Wren said.

The crisis on the Korean peninsula has been simmering since October, when U.S. officials said North Korea had admitted to a nuclear weapons pro-

Tensions have escalated since then. Over the last month, North Korea has intercepted a U.S. reconnaissance plane patrolling international airspace and test-fired two short=range missiles, while a Japanese report said the North may soon test-fire a longer-range missile that could reach Japan.

The North's suspected atomic arms programme was frozen in a bilateral U.S.-North Korean deal in 1994, and Washington says Pyongyang's violation of that pact several years later is the reason multilateral diplomacy is needed to disarm the North this time.

As Singapore tightens border

Malaysia nabs militant

KUALA LUMPUR, March 15 (Reuters) - Malaysia said on Saturday it had arrested another suspected militant, a day after Singapore tightened border checks as a precaution against any threat from Islamic radicals crossing the causeway from its Muslim neighbour.

With a possible war looming in Iraq, Singapore, a staunch U.S. ally, fears it could be a target for militants.

Malaysia has kept a close eye on its borders and police have arrested nearly 80 suspected members of the Jemaah Islamiah (JI), a shadowy Southeast Asian militant group, whose top leaders are said to have links with Osama bin Laden's al Oaeda network.

A Malaysian security official told Reuters another JI suspect was arrested on Friday. He said the man was

detained in Muar, a small town in Johor -- the southern state across the causeway from Singapore -- and is being held under the Internal Security Act allowing detention without trial.

Singapore said on Friday it would check all trucks, cars and motorcycles making the short road crossing across the narrow waterway from the southern tip of the Malaysian Peninsula.

"They probably feel worried and afraid and they want to ensure the nation's security," Malaysia's Deputy Prime Minister Abdullah Ahmad Badawi told a news conference on

Singapore's police arrested more than 30 JI suspects after uncovering a plot to attack the U.S. and other western embassies with truck bombs over

Pakistan arrests top al Qaeda member al-Jaziri

ISLAMABAD, March 15 (Reuters) Pakistani authorities arrested a leading al Qaeda member, Moroccan national Yasir al-Jaziri, in the eastern city of Lahore on Saturday, the state APP news agency reported.

The arrest followed two weeks after the capture of another senior al Qaeda figure, Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, in the northern city of Rawalpindi.

Mohammed was a suspected mastermind of the September 11, 2001 attacks on the United States and authorities have said his arrest brought useful leads in their efforts to track down al Qaeda members in Pakistan.

APP quoted a spokesman for Pakistan's interior ministry as saying al-Jaziri was in the custody of Pakistan's law enforcement agencies.

On the other hand, Pakistan on

Saturday welcomed Washington's decision to waive economic sanctions imposed after General Pervez Musharraf's 1999 coup, a move that clears the way for about \$250 million in aid already approved by Congress. "We feel this was overdue by a few months," Information Minister Sheikh Rashid Ahmed said. "This should have come through in October when Pakistan was returned to democracy."

October elections restored civilian government after a three-year break, although Musharraf still holds sweeping powers as president, including the ability to sack parliament.

Pakistan, a key ally in the U.S. war on terror, is a member of the U.N. Security Council whose vote on a second resolution setting the stage for a war in Iraq has been hotly courted by the United States.

Gathering from all over USA

Anti-war protesters to surround White House

WASHINGTON, March 15 (Reuters) -Buses packed with thousands of protesters from more than 100 U.S. cities arrived in Washington on Saturday for what could be the last chance to dissuade the Bush administration from invading Iraq.

Students from as far as Wisconsin, Maine and Florida streamed to the Washington Monument on a sunny but crisp morning for a midday rally before their march to the White House and the Justice Department. They plan to surround the buildings in a peaceful "sea of humanity," organizers said.

Organizers at International ANSWER, a coalition of groups that have banded together to oppose a possible war, estimated that tens of thousands of people would take part in the events.

"Instead of a last-gasp effort before the bombs start to fall, we think there's still a possibility of affecting policy and stop-ping them altogether," said International ANSWER spokesman Chuck Kaufman.

First-time demonstrator Patty Crotau, 28, left her home in upstate New York on Friday afternoon and came to Washington by bus. The mother of two said she came because she believes the Bush administration's current stance is hypocritical.

"We're keeping everything we have in terms of weapons of mass destruction," she said. "I would hate to see it come to a point where this might come back to the U.S. and affect my children.'

President George W. Bush was to spend Saturday away from Washington at the Camp David presidential retreat in Maryland.

On Sunday morning, he heads to Portugal's Azores island territory for an emergency summit with the leaders of Britain and Spain in a final pursuit of a U.N. resolution on Iraq that would overcome opposition in the Security Council.

The three countries are sponsors of a

Security Council resolution that would set the stage for war against Iraq over its alleged weapons of mass destruction programs. That resolution is the subject of a bitter fight among council members.

Religious leaders have also planned a Sunday evening prayer vigil at Washington's Lincoln Memorial that will coincide with thousands of other candlelight vigils across the world.

Hundreds of thousands pays last respect to PM

BELGRADE, March 15 (Reuters) -Hundreds of thousands followed the funeral procession on Saturday of Serbian Prime Minister Zoran Djindjic, assassinated by a sniper believed to be acting on the orders of gangster boss-

It was the biggest crowd Serbia had seen since a mass uprising led by Djindjic and other reformers toppled Slobodan Milosevic in October 2000, after a decade of Balkan wars and international ostracism for the impoverished

The mourners joined the slow procession of the slain leader's body through

chilly streets from Saint Sava cathedral to Belgrade's New Cemetery, where it was laid to rest with military honours in the Alley of the Great Men.

Western leaders including European Commission President Romano Prodi and German Foreign Minister Joschka Fischer were among those who paid last respects, under tight security, to the

man they credit with ending Milosevic's authoritarian rule.

A funeral ceremony was held earlier on Saturday in Saint

Sava's, with black-clad anti-terrorist troops on guard outside.

Djindjic's widow and their two children, government ministers, blackrobed religious leaders, army top brass and other dignitaries filed by his coffin, which lay in the huge church draped in the red, blue and white Serbian flag.

It was the biggest funeral in Belgrade since Communist dictator Josip Broz Tito died in 1980.

Serbian Orthodox bishop Amfilohije said the reformist Djindjic had begun a renewal of Serbia and "reached out a hand of reconciliation and peace" to Europe and the world. "But he was killed by a brother's blind hatred," he told the congregation in the cathedral.

Djindjic, gunned down in the courtyard of the government building on Wednesday, was hailed by the West as a pro-democracy reformer but was a hate figure for hardline Serb nationalists.

Milosevic-era police accused

The government imposed a state of emergency after Djindjic, 50, was killed. Authorities have pointed the finger at a powerful Belgrade criminal gang and at Milosevic-era police.

Djindjic played a key role in the overthrow of ex-Yugoslav President Milosevic in 2000. He later enraged nationalists by sending Milosevic to the U.N. tribunal in The Hague to face

charges of war crimes in Croatia, Bosnia and Kosovo.

The reformist leader had promised to crush the crime gangs that flourished during Milosevic's bloodstained rule, and which were allegedly linked to his secret service.

Police said late on Friday they had detained more than 180 people and seized large amounts of weapons and drugs but that key figures remained at

The force issued a public appeal for information about eight suspects, including an ex-commander of a special police unit that fought in the Balkan wars of the 1990s.

Amid Iraq gloom

EU, defence policy drive

ATHENS, March 15 (Reuters) - The European Union trumpeted the advances of its defence ambitions on Saturday as it stood on the verge of a debut peacekeeping mission, setting its sights on a common arms agency and even a satellite surveillance programme.

Despite glaring differences over Iraq and a growing conviction that a U.S.led strike on Baghdad is imminent, the bloc's defence ministers emerged upbeat from a two-day meeting at a seaside resort hotel on the outskirts of

Greek Defence Minister Yannos Papandoniou conceded that disunity over how to deal with Iraqi President Saddam Hussein had shown the elusiveness of a common EU foreign policy, but he said common defence could come as easily as a common currency.

"After the euro comes defence, and political union will follow defence," he

The EU is putting the final touches to a plan to take over NATO's peacekeeping mission in Macedonia by March 31.

Although tiny, with just 320 lightly armed troops, the mission will be a symbolic triumph for the 15-nation bloc and is being seen as a trial run for a takeover of NATO's much bigger peacekeeping force of some 12,000 in Bosnia early next year.

The EU had hoped to take the reins in Macedonia last year, but was delayed because of a standoff over a pact guaranteeing access to NATO assets for crisis management operations.

One of the last pieces in a complex jigsaw of relations between NATO and the EU fell into place before the Athens meeting, with a security agreement making exchanges of classified information between the two institutions automatic.

"Fiction becomes fact"

The EU's goal this year is to create a Rapid Reaction Force of 60,000 troops with air and maritime support to deal with hotspots on the continent's fringes, although some ministers, heartened by progress, suggested it should also look for crisis management roles in Africa.

"The Rapid Reaction Force, which was in the domain of fiction, now becomes fact," said Papondoniou, whose country currently holds the presidency of the EU. "The defence integration of Europe is moving ahead despite

For all the optimism, there was no word in Athens of concrete initiatives to plug gaps in military kit that the EU needs, particularly for risky missions, including transport aircraft, commandand-control, helicopters and communi-

Papondoniou, apparently introducing a new item on the defence menu, said the EU also needed to develop satellite surveillance capabilities as part of its space ambitions.

Critics say that, with defence budgets stagnant or even declining in most of the bloc, the drive for a European Security and Defence Policy (ESDP) ardently championed by France — has generated more paperwork than

"We want to see it working," British Armed Forces Minister Adam Ingram told Reuters late on Friday. "But we will not deliver capabilities into the field on the back of committees. We have put a lot of capabilities on the table... We expect others to be moving along with

Not only does the EU as a whole spend less than half of what the United States spends on defence, officials say its military capability amounts to only about 10 percent of what America gets for its money because of kit duplication and incompatibility.

The defence ministers discussed innovative ways to make the best use of their limited budgets through multinational projects and leasing rather than buying equipment.

They also talked about Iraq European Commission proposal last week to forge a common EU arms industry to bolster

Multi-billion anti-poverty campaign Government moves



ther than its war on terror the Yemeni governis launching another kind of war, i.e. war on poverty through implementation of a strategy receiving support by donor countries. The campaign which is designed to take a duration extending over the period 2003-2005 is estimated to be costing around YR 413.4 billion. The strategy is aimed at reducing the present proportion of poverty by 13.1 per cent and by 35.9 at the end of the implementation of the plan.

Figures derived from the strategy indicate that the size of poverty among the population falling under the poverty line amounts to 6.9 million people. The plan on the other hand aims at raising the rate of those joining the primary education to 69.3 per cent at the end of

The strategy expects to raise the number of cases benefiting from the social care fund to 600610 cases at the of the targeted period and expanding the umbrella of social securities to cover 1529 thousand workers, in addition to training 5430 of the disabled at the centers for training the handicapped.

The plan has also given attention to rehabilitation of the handicapped by providing 4190 job opportunities and the accommodation of around 6750

accommodation for 2500 homeless and beggar children.

As regards facing the water crisis the plan seeks to develop services of the network to cover about 69 per cent of urban population and 65 per cent of countryside people along with increasing sewage services and raising the proportion of covering power services extended to 22 per cent of countryside population. The plan also intends to combat poverty by expansion in build-

orphans at care-offering houses and also ing paved roads to enhance traffic movement in addition to maintaining 3194-long km of existing paved roads.

> Cost of implementing the strategy is estimated at YR 413.4 billion. YR 18.9 billion for the new projects and 394 billion for programs and projects under

Proportion of local funding for the total cost is estimated at about 73 per cent while the remainder would be covered by foreign funding sources. The strategy considers development of human element as the most significant of its goals, giving priority to education, health and services projects.

Requisites for improvement of health services are defined by allocations of 2.2 per cent of Gross Domestic Product and by 6.6 per cent of the total general expenditure. The strategy expects a big increase in investment sector estimated at around 11.5 per cent. In dependence on the general lines of the plan the government seeks to achieve economic growth in order to tackle the real causes

of poverty and provide ways of living and strengthening the poor capability and increasing their income as well as improving the social, economic and social circumstances around them.

The strategy seems to be ambitious despite that poverty is in a state of spiralling up in the Yemeni society. It is feared that some sides would manipulate in the implementation of projects designed for combating poverty, a matter that would increase the people suf-

Expected war against Iraq leads to a drop in Yemeni expatriates remittances

conomic sources in Yemen have said the eruption of war against Iraq would impact on Yemeni expatriates volume of remittances and lower it drastically, specifically from the expatriates in the Gulf states. It would have a detriand living conditions of the Yemenis as well as leading to reduction in investment activity in the country.

Sources expect the drop in volume of money transfers by no less than 30 per cent. They say that it is expected that Yemeni expatriates living in the GCC countries, especially in the UAE, Bahrain, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait would most of them prefer to leave their jobs and return to their country, fleeing the atmospheres of war and its consequences.

According to official sources the value of present investments in Yemen is basically dependent on the expatriates in the Gulf countries and it is considered the most important resource of capitals flowing into Yemen for investment especially in the Free Zone in Aden or in other areas and ports. The government interest in Yemeni expatriates has increased after the September 11 events in the United States. The events have led to abstention by businessmen from investing in projects and abolishing some licenses by the investors. The official sources also confirm that the efforts for attracting expatriates to bring their properties for investment in vital projects have contributed to reduction of negative impact of 11 September events on the Yemeni economy because they came at a difficult time.

Despite that the number of expatri-

ates living in the GCC countries is not fully known up till now, estimates point out that there are around 900 thousand of them working at financial, trade, contracting and other private sector works. official sources put the volume of Yemeni money in the Gulf countries at about 75 per cent of total money of Yemeni expatriate all over the world.

With the aggravation of prospects o the U.S.-British war against Iraq, Yemen fears that it would cause the expulsion of Yemeni expatriates in the Gulf states, a consequence that would deprive them of their activities and jobs and would in the end affect the rate of gross domestic product due to drop in financial remittances.

In the aftermath of the Gulf war in 1991. Yemen's economy was hit with a setback it did not recover from it till now. About one million and a half Yemeni workers in the Gulf countries returned to their country and the government has so far not been able to solve their problems or alleviate their suffering while their money transfers dropped from two billion dollars to 300 millions. The same official sources say the expected American war on Iraq would have economic disaster on Yemen's economy, Its effects would exceed the issue of reducing money transfers to causing heavy losses to tourist sector, sea navigation, exportimport movement in addition to investment in the country. Fears have motivated the Council of

National Defence, the highest authority in the country, to convene and take a number of decisions. Among these decisions are offering new facilities to local, Arab and foreign investors and containment of consequences of the war on economy, security and develop-

Elections marathon

here are numbered days to go before the beginning of electoral campaigns for the parliamentary elections scheduled to be held in several weeks. Political parties, both in power and opposition, are competing, particularly with regard to the economic situation, the voters' living standard, treatment by government of implemented structural failures since 1995, as well as Yemen's opposition vision concerning the economic crisis, which the opposition ascribe to a package of economic reforms the government has been implementing.

While the government, led by the general people's congress party, confirms it has been able, during the past seven years, to curb inflation and keep stability of exchange rate of the national currency, opposition parties say the policy of economic reform has led to an increase in poverty proportion by around 28 percent, and rates of prices by over 187 percent. The parties say the increaseincluded electricity, water and telephone bill by 53, 15 and 32 percent respectively. Political parties' election forums are distributed according to these two opposing visions over several orientations. Mast important of these directions are:

1- Program of the GPC ruling party which enumerates achievements of its government, covering infrastructure, accomplishments of social security net, and educational, health, vocational and technical training, in addition to

other services. 2- Programs of the 6 member Joint Meeting Parties as being meeting at one vision, i.e., that the official policy of economic reforms has led to aggravation of problems in social life with increased poverty rates and rise of unemployment by 35 percent of work

Election programs of opposition parties are unanimous that social services, like health, education, water and electricity have retreated and their prices shot up. The program stress that in the health area, people have only services without medication offered by nominal hospitals. In the political context of the elections scheduled on 27 April, the 6-member opposition parties have demanded, in a memorandum to the National Alignment Committee, for halting the program of economic reform and creating other alternatives to deal with the crisis. The memo also called for critical revision of all attempts for economic, administrative and financial reform. The memorandum also emphasized the necessity of treating the economic crisis in a scientific objective way depending on understanding reality, addressing the causes, fighting corruption and its sources and passing a law on financial accountability.

These demands seem to be part of

the propaganda campaign accompanying the elections directed against the ruling party. They are difficult to realize demands, if not impossible, especially regarding the issue of financial accountability, because there is confusion between jobs and commercial businesses. Therefore, the opposition parties, by this vision, are aimed at politically winning the voters who feel tangible bitterness and deterioration of living condi-

Between these two parties of the government which boasts of accomplishments of the ruling party, and of the opposition that accuses the government of dereliction and deterioration of economy, there is a third party's programs enter the race. The third party's programs are characterized by ambiguity because they criticize the governments reforms policy in certain areas and support them in others.

This third party represents a group of programs adopted by small political parties, some are independent and the other some works under an alliance called the National Grouping of opposition, consisting of five parties.

The voters are to be the judge between the elections race rivals, in addition to a fourth group whose programs are be represented by the independent. The programs of these independents would derive from their local constituencies' woes. The question of who would win the race would be answered by the voters themselves.

- Is the world too naïve and stupid to believe that Iraq, in its current conditions, will attack the US with its 5km range drone and threaten the very existence of the superpower of the world within one week?

- Does the US administration think it could make the case when it had put itself in a position of attacking another country because of drones, or sentences like 'there was no immediate cooperation'?

- Does the Bush administration realize that it is waging a war without the approval of the UN and against the will of the world?

A critique Peace and war in Islam

he spectacular collapse of the twin towers on Sept. 11, 2001 in America highlighted the difference of opinion between the hawks of war and doves of peace (or the American version of it) in that country.

It created a polarization between the two groups. But the military invasion of Afghanistan, and now the planned invasion of Iraq indicated beyond doubt the supremacy of war mentality among the ruling elitists in America.

In the Muslim world, a similar, but a much sharper, polarization exists between those calling for war, and those pleading for peace. Not surprisingly, the Muslim hawks, and doves for this matter, are different from their American counterparts.

In America, both groups belong to the ruling elite. In the Muslim world, the doves are the ruling elite themselves. Included in this elitist class are the religious clerics. The hawks do not belong to this class.

They are mostly religious clerics who have a young following. They claim no association with the ruling class; in fact they strongly oppose it. Their followers are young lay people with some degree of secular and religious education. But they tend to propagate radical interpretation of Islam

They are non-conformists with an obsession of opposing everything said or done by their secular opponents - rulers or the religious leaders. Because of their unorthodox ideas they were persecuted.

Unabated by persecution, they engaged in under-ground operations against their local as well as international opponents. So far, they have kept their differences at an intellectual level with the religious elite among the doves.

Until now, the hawks have refrained form any violent or bloody confrontation with them. But, they managed, nevertheless, to differentiate themselves.

The two groups emerged with varying degrees of prominence in the Muslim world and internationally. What differentiates them from each other is the contradiction between them in almost everything: in their strategies and methods; in their understanding of Islam and interpretation of its teachings; in their reading of its history and their writing of its present; in their desire for moulding its future and influencing the opinion of the "other" about it.

In the following lines I shall only focus on the doves. I shall analyze their argument that the Qur'an promotes only peace, and 'war' is resorted to only for self-defence.

I shall, however, refer occasionally to the hawks, and briefly discuss their counter-argument. The reason I do it this is that the hawks' argument is more practical than the doves'. They prefer action to words. But their action, with its disastrous consequences, proves beyond doubt that they have got it wrong too. Another reason is that the doves have spelt more than enough ink in refuting their opponents' argument and watering down what they have achieved through their actions.

The differences

Throughout history of Islam, the two groups existed side by side. Their existence, however, was initially marred with intellectual conflict and theological differences. Later on, their sour relation took rather a violent and bloody turn. The persecutor always tend to be the group that sides with the ruling regime making them the only legitimate interpreters of religion, legitimizers of the regime and justifiers of his actions. Although both groups shared alternatively phases of power and weakness, it can still be safely claimed that the hawks of war enjoyed longer periods of

power and influence than their opponents.

This was the case during all the successive powerful Islamic states right from the First Caliphate to the Ottoman Empire. These states spent most of their military and political years in taking Islam further afield.

They militarily spread its authority, and expanded geographically its territory, thus fulfilling the prophetic promise of conquering the metropolises of the world. The last powerful Islamic state was the

Ottoman Empire, which collapsed in the beginning of the last century. Its collapse marked the end of the military expansion, as well as the end of the happy marriage between the hawks and their masters.

Since then a period of multi-sided weakness has started, militarily, economically etc. The ruling elitists have divorced the mentality of war against Dar Al-harb (the house of war - the hostile forces of Muslim State), and have embraced instead the philosophy of pacifism (towards them). Doves of [peace thus have become powerful.

Put briefly, the doves become powerful in time of political and military weakness, whereas the hawks become powerful in time of strength.

The unique phenomenon, unprecedented in Islamic history, lays in the emergence of the hawks, both in the Muslim world as well as globally, during the present time – the time of total powerlessness of Muslims worldwide. Unsurprisingly, their emergence was smeared with blood and violence; as if they emerged in the wrong time. Their untimely emergence lead them to head-collide with the ruling regimes and their Doves of Peace.

Pacifist Attitude

Despite the fact that the emergence of the two groups in the recent times seemed to take place concurrently, the emergence of the doves came about as a reaction and indeed an opposition to the actions of the hawks. The doves' apologetic explanation of Islam and compromising interpretation of its teachings on one hand, and their tactics of excluding and excommunicating the war promoters on the other, reflect this fact.

The doves' pacifist rhetoric can also be seen clearly in the way they interact with the 'other', namely the victims of the 9/11 attacks and those who expect to be next in the Islamic hit-list of vengeance!

So whenever an expulsion is heard, their love and peace-filled pleads can also be heard. The majority of these pleads can be heard coming loudly from the official Islamic media, notably "The Muslim World" a widely-read and respected Islamic newspaper published by the World Muslim League in Mecca . A dove of peace writes in this paper about the holy mission of his fellow pacifists as "...correcting and polishing the image of Islam" (Issue 1771). "There is nothing at all [sic] in Islam that causes fear or terror" he continues, " its teachings are free from any seeds of violence, terror, conflict, or confrontation.

On the contrary, they promote peace, security, cooperation, and co-existence." (ibid) The writer, with stroke of a pen, namely the use of one word "at all", tried to abolish a long history of wars, expansions, occupations, and colonization by Islamic states throughout the history of Islam that lasted more than ten centuries.

The Expansion of Muslim Empire

The issue of how the rule of Islam spread over the three continents of Asia, Africa, and Europe in such a relatively short time has never been a discontentious issue as it's nowadays. In this time of utter weakness the apologetic tone and defensive rhetoric is gaining the upper hand.

The heroes of this trend are the doves taking upon themselves the holy task of diluting the harsh teachings of Islam that relate to war (Jihad). Jihad is being redefined by them and made to mean self-defence only. In the same newspaper of the Muslim World League, Grand Sheik of Al-Azhar in Cairo, Sayid Tantawi, embarks on re-defining Jihad as "Self-defence to protect Muslims' lives, their dignity, and their land" (Issue 1752).

In the perspective of events, such trend is only expected from a movement propagating extreme pacifist views because itself was born as a reaction of another extreme violent-oriented movement —the hawks. To serve their agenda, the hawks opted for over- emphasizing the quranic verses commending war and commanding self-initiated jihad, while ignoring or reinterpreting those ones promoting peace. The Quran, therefore, was reduced to only few verses to support war or peace. The most quoted war verses are:

"Against them make ready your strength to the utmost of your power, including steeds of war, to strike terror into (the hearts if) the enemies of God and your enemies..." (8:6, Y. Ali translation);

"Fight those who believe not in God nor the Last Day, nor hold that forbidden which hath been forbidden by God and His Apostle, nor acknowledge the Religion of Truth (even if they are) of the People of the Book, until they pay the Jizyah(poll-tax) with willing submission, and feel themselves subdued" (9:29, Y.

Doves, on the other hand, quote only selected verses commanding tolerance and peace, for example:

"Let there be no compulsion in religion: Truth stands out clear from Error" (2:256, Y. Ali); and

"Say: O ye that reject Faith...to you be your Way, and to me mine" (109:1 & 6, Y. Ali)

Verse selectiveness is a preferable tactic used by both groups to validate their version of the concept of peace and war in Islam.

The tactic of selectiveness by the two groups when quoting the Quran, and the Sunnah, refutes their claims of representing the true teachings of Islam, or the authentic version of Islam. It is a tactic used only to serve their self-serving agendas and vested self-interests. The hawks' agenda is to revive, through violence, the militant past and relive its glories. In order to fulfill their agenda they have withdrawn from the present and tried to live in the past. They live in a self- denial of the reality of Muslims, their defeatedness and their sheer inability for any military confrontation or conflict.

The doves, on the other hand, are attempting to ignore and deny the past militeralism of Muslims and re-interpreting the Islamic history. Present status of Muslims is taken for granted and status quo is being maintained. Sufferings of Muslims worldwide is explained, and even justified, theologically. They argue that it's what God wills for them because of their collective impiety.

According to them, local tyranny and foreign oppression should not be taken for their face value. They should be taken as an expression of Allah's wrath against Muslims. Tyranny and oppression, therefore, must nor be fought by the sword (used here as a symbol of war only). It must only be fought by appeasing God through attaining the prophet's and his companions' level of righteousness! Fighting is out of question for them,

Ironically, the doves, like non-Muslims, especially the critics of Islam, tend to confuse, through ignorance or arrogance, the two distinct aspects of the Islamic concept of war and peace. The aspect of expanding the political and geographical boundaries of Islam, and the aspect of the forcing it on the conquered peoples. History, backed up by reality, confirms the occurrence of the political and the military expansion of Islam. But history and present really refutes the taking place of the forced mass conversion. The first is a historical fact, the second is a mythical fiction.

Although these two aspects are well connected, they are distinct and far apart. Territorial expansion of Islam should always be separated from its imposition on the inhabitants of the conquered lands.

If the Quran commands its believers to conquer and rule the un-believers, as hawks may claim, it prohibits, in the same time, the compulsory conversion of non-believers, specially "the People of the Book, namely the Jews and the Christians.

But in their zeal of defending Islam against the accusations of those who suffered in these attacks; and protecting it from those who caused, or hailed, these attacks, the doves either overlooked this distinction, or confused the two aspects and fused them into one.

The two aspects of the concept of Jihad forms the equation of war and peace in Islam. And as Quran is unambiguous on the aspect of prohibition of imposing the faith, it is equally so on the aspect of imposing its rule on the followers of other religion.

Islam, nonetheless, regulates the way of it being the dominant religion on earth, and all lands should be under the dominion of its followers. According to Islam, there are three rules governing the application of this command.

The first: the dominion should be sought peacefully, mainly through the voluntary mass conversion of the ruled; the



second: the total submission and involuntary surrender, but no conversion, of the ruled demonstrated by their paying the toll-tax (or *jizyah* in Arabic); the third: full scale war.

Regardless of which rule is followed in ruling other lands, the rulers, under no circumstances, should force the ruled, particularly Christians or Jews, to abandon their own religion in order to embrace the victorious religion. A delicate balance not always achieved.

Although the concept of military expansion is non-applicable nowadays, the geographical spread of Muslims over the old world proves that this was once the rule of thumb. A rule followed vigorously by Muslim rulers right from the Prophet (pbuh) and his Caliphs, through Umayyads, Abbasids, and finally to the Ottoman emperors. A historical fact and a factual reality too real for the doves to defy or deny.

Based on what's been said, it becomes obvious that the doves' rhetoric is lacking

all integrity, factuality and credibility on both historical and theological levels.

Balancing of the War and Peace equation

Seeking to balance the equation of war and peace in Islam is a difficult task, but it is not unattainable. Any attempt of balancing war and peace must be based on three pre-requisites.

The first: to attain a high level of honesty, integrity and courage with selves and with the 'other'. The second is to abandon the tactic of selectiveness and instead take Islam as a whole and look into its teachings as complementary to each other and not as contradictory to each other. The third, and the last: to accept the past with all its facts, and to deal with the present with all its realities.

This will be futile without agreeing on a definition of both war and peace which is in line with Islamic tenets and teachings. The true and real Islamic definition of these two concepts must be sought and made clear to both - Muslims and non-Muslims alike.

It's a better way than constructing arguments based on the definition of the 'other' for these two sensitive concepts. Such an endeavor should always be kept away from the political allegiances and the changes of politics.

In this way Muslim interlocutors will enjoy more freedom and independent to present the true teachings of Islam without feeling the need for apology, dilution or covering. The 'other' prefers this method and respects it because it forms part of their culture and psyche.

Muslim interlocutors must realize that they bear the responsibility of convincing, themselves first, and the 'other' with the credence of the Islamic ordinance that the ultimate goal of I slam is to establish peace (Salam) through peace (Salam), or, if necessary, through war (Jihad). The ultimate goal of Islam is to establish peace that is guarded by a canon and not by an olive branch."

Under the title of this article, I would like to share my ideas along with readers over the events in an attempt to link the Palestinian issue as a key issue to Islamic and Arab issues and what the September 11 incidents in Washington DC and New York.

First, immediately after the September 11, the Israeli prime minister appeared calm and didn't get affected by the horrible incidents and declared that 'all of us realized who carried out such suicide attacks."

He said Israel was still suffering from such attacks continuously and that the world and the US will fully understand the impact of those attacks on Israel.

Second, the image has been still blurred and has gone in the same route. The US president declared a crusade campaign between the Islam and Christianity.

At an earlier date he had mentioned that there must be an immediate solution to the Palestinian issue and above all he had committed himself to establish the Palestinian state.

(Of course, he doesn't intend to fulfill what he says, but he pointed the finger at Muslims in order to link between the September 11 attacks and the Palestinian issue."

The question which poses itself is," Was that statement for the benefit of investigating and searching for the 11 September perpetrators?"

Third, to make the evil intentions of the US president Bush crystal clear, an Arab leader, who is never been known to have any opposing stand towards the US, and "What has happened in the US was due to a feeling of despair resulting from the US unjust policy towards the Mideast region,". It was an unfamiliar courage, but rather greenlighted beforehand to indicate that attackers in the September events are from the Arabs and Muslims.

It is further regrettable is that the very same Arab leader was himself who

received a promises from Bush on solving the Palestinian issue after the September 11 attacks. The same Arab leader had also received the same promise from Bush for settling the Palestine cause, but after finishing the extermination of the people of Iraq. And finally it is no wonder to know that that leader asked for giving Sharon a chance for showing peace.

Fourth, after such hints and driving the issue towards the Arabs and Muslims, the September 11 events were attributed to Osama bin Laden, as a symbol of an extremist Arab Muslim, and all deserve to be punished because of him, from Iraq to Indonesia to Palestine.

Thus, in the name of September events and in retaliation from bin Laden, the actual blockade has already started against the Palestinian cause in particular and issues of the entire Arab and Islamic nations in general, labeling whoever supports the Arab national issues as, "terrorist" or "extremist" as those involved in the September 11 attacks, exactly as it was first declared by the former Israeli prime minister Barrack after those incidents.

Hamas movement, all Palestinian organizations and even merchants, princes, citizens and others have, in the eyes of the American judiciary, become terrorists deserve to be punished by imprisonment, killing and demolition of their houses on their heads without trial or constitutional and humanitarian rights.

Fifth, in one of the US festivals, the US president Bush asked the Americans to enjoy their time and saying the terrorists could not prevent them from enjoying their festivals. At the same time, an Egyptian citizen was killed under mysterious conditions and under the pretext of carrying a weapon and his attempt to kill an Israeli employees at the Israeli airways company.

Hence come analyses and attempts to convince the American people that targeting Israel at the American festival is targeting happiness of the Americans. The enemy is the same (Arabs & Muslims) and the victims are the same (US & Israel).

Sixth, In Yemen, a prominent Shiekh, Mohammed Ali al-Mouayad was arrested in Germany. He was charged with providing millions of dollars, weapons tant Palestinian groups, including Hamas. And in the person of Ashcroft, the U.S. announces his arrest as a financier of Hamas and al-Qaeda. Just mull over this linkage, al-Qaeda and Hamas, for whom the benefit is it?

Seventh, one of the strangest Zionist links between Palestine and al-Qaeda has been fabricated by Israel when a bombing incident was perfumed in Haifa 5 March. A piece of paper was claimed to be found in the pocket of the attacker praising the September 11 attacks. The Israeli allegation means to send a message convincing the Americans and reminding them that those who target Israel also gloat over those killed in New York.

So, after the review of these sinister attempts, don't we have the right to doubt the big role played by Israel and the U.S. intelligence in the 11 September events, the victim of which have been the American people and the Muslim peoples at the same footing? Aren't such attempts of connection indicate the absence of pain felt by the American government towards what happened to the victims of September?

Is the deployment of the U S soldiers and huge military fleets around the world for just to track down the September 11 attackers or is it an execution for pre-planned strategy for events needing to provide justification to implement? Is possible for the US government to breach the peace agreements and overlook human rights violations, and turns its back to what is going on in the occupied land?

At last, does the world notice the monotonous and continuous pretenses of the September 11 attacks where the US government violates rights and freedoms?

What I want to suggest here is that the September 11 attacks have been committed to be used for more than one operation and from one side.

I will not get surprised if they are carried out against an Arab or Islamic state as that of Yemen, Syria, Libya or Saudi

That is not only enough, it is probable to be performed against France, Germany, Belgium, and perhaps China.

I think it is a joint US-Israel terror operations performed jointly and not

Khor Umaira lagoon

Home to special wildlife

hor Umaira is located 60 km west Imran headlands (Ras Imran) and about 70km east of Jebla Swayda, in the entrance of the Gulf of Aden.

This lagoon is about 7 km from east to west and up to 3 km north to south, with an entrance width to the sea, at the western end of 700m. The southern area of the lagoon is of rock and coral outcrops of stable nature and unlikely to be overtopped by waves to any great extent the maximum water depth in the lagoon is of less than 3 m, according to Grinyer data, in the report prepared for the fishery development in the Gulf of Aden.

Khor Umaria enjoys high importance as a feeding ground of sea turtles, particularly the green turtle

(Chelonia mydas), and therefore, it is suggested, as one of sensitive areas along Yemen coast, to a special management and environment protection.

Science Resources Research Center (MSRRC) reports 15 localities to be declared by the government as protectorate areas. This proposal is given in the results of the beach pollution study along Gulf of Aden Yemen coast, executed by MSRRC with the cooperation of Sana'a and Aden Universities and this study was funded by EPC/ our consult, the Netherlands in 1996.

Hirth, Klikoff and Harper, report the importance of Khor Umaira as feeding ground of grass in a large number. Results of their investigation were demonstrated in "Sea grass of Khor Umaria, people democratic Republic of Yemen with reference to their role in the diet of the green turtle Chelonia mydas.

Center of Environment manage-

ment and Planing of UK identify Khor Umaira as a sensitive area, important for green turtle feeding, where at least three species of sea grass occur. They are Cymodocea serrulata, Halodule uninervis and Halophis ovalis.

A clear zonation pattern was evident as it was mentioned during the coastal habitats survey, in 1995; in deeper water (>1m). The assemblage was dominant by Cymodocea (70 per cent cover) while in water less than 1m the community was composed of Halodule uninervis and Halophia ovalis that them is considerable export of organic materials from Khor Umaira since sea grass little and detritus were observed on the strandlines up to Jebal Swadya.

The contribution of sea grass productivity to the marine ecology down stream of Khor Umaira may be considerable, particularly to detritus food chains and sea turtle population.

M - Oh Mus'idal Why did you make fun of the poor boy like that! You're normally so considerate! It's not right, and you know how you should behave!



We Are No Longer Willing To Sacrifice Health and Peace!

To that effect, the pharmaceutical lobby has been abusing the United Nation's "Codex Alimentarius" (Food Standard) Commission and many other national and international political bodies. Maintaining and expanding diseases, as the basis for the growth of the investment 'business with disease,' will be prohibited by law.

With the multi-trillion dollar pharmaceutical investment industry as the largest corporate benefactor behind the current 'war on terrorism' revealed and in broad daylight for the world to see, what are the options left for this interest group? When the first nuclear or biological weapons detonate - who will be blamed? Who will accept the arguments that civil liberties need to be abandoned and press freedom abolished?

This interest group and its political stake holders have to realize: Whatever they do now - including any military action - their goal is now publicly exposed and can no longer be achieved.



India beat New Zealand

CENTURION, South (Reuters) - Middle-order batsmen Mohammad Kaif and Rahul Dravid shared an unbeaten century partnership to guide India to a comfortable seven wicket win over New Zealand.

After India had survived some early scares on Friday, Kaif scored 68 and Dravid 53, taking their side to victory with 9.2 overs to spare.

Left-arm fast bowler Zaheer Khan took four wickets in yet another inspired showing by India's pace bowlers as the New Zealanders stumbled to 146 all out from 45.1 overs.

Then fast bowler Shane Bond briefly raised New Zealand's hopes by reducing India to 21 for three.

But Kaif and Dravid shared in an unbeaten 129-run fourth wicket partnership to steer their side home after both were dropped before reaching double figures.

"We have done very well so far," said captain Saurav Ganguly. "We lost a couple of early wickets but we have quite a few matchwinners and it's obviously good that all of them are hitting the ball well."

New Zealand are still half a point ahead of Sri Lanka but will be eliminated if the latter beat Zimbabwe in their last Super Six match on Saturday.

Bond removed opener Virender Sehwag (1) and Ganguly (3) in his first two overs, the latter yorked by a 153 kms an hour (95 mph) delivery.

Daryl Tuffey, at the other end, sent back Sachin Tendulkar for 15 after he had hit three consecutive fours as

Wicketkeeper Brendon McCullum spilled a big opportunity one run later when he dropped Rahul Dravid after Bond had induced an edge through

Bond almost dismissed Mohammad Kaif for six but a leaping Chris Harris at point could only get his fingertips to the ball before it fled to the fence.

Early edge

Khan put India on top in the morning after captain Saurav Ganguly had asked New Zealand to bat on a good pitch at SuperSport Park.

New Zealand never recovered from the horrible start as Khan, fellow leftarm paceman Ashish Nehra and Javagal Srinath reduced New Zealand to 38 for three and 88 for six by the halfway mark.

The Kiwis recalled Craig McMillan to open the innings but Khan removed him for a second ball duck when he flicked a half-volley to Harbhajan Singh at square-leg. He then trapped Nathan Astle leg before first ball to an uncertain forward defence shot.

Nehra, who bowled impeccably, then beat Scott Styris (15) with late seam movement to make it 38 for three in the ninth over. Styris, who hit Khan's hat-trick delivery for a couple down the ground and drove him through midwicket for his only four, was beaten by the bounce and movement to edge a catch to wicket-keeper

Khan, whose opening three-over spell went for 28 runs, switched ends to bowl Brendon McCullum (4) between


bat and pad, his 100th one-day wicket.

A LETTER TO THE TEACHERS OF ENGLISH: 17

Teacher differences and classroom teaching

Dear Fellow teachers,

n one of my earlier letters about the learner differences, I mentioned the teacher differences also. I pointed out that there are three kinds of teachers - the autocratic, the bureaucratic and the democratic. I will say more about these differences in this letter and discuss which of them will be more useful to the learners in your classes.

An autocratic teacher is one who follows his / her own ways of doing things without taking the learners into consideration; he/she may be an excellent teacher but most of what he/she does will not be useful to the students. A bureaucratic teacher is one who follows what is prescribed in the curriculum; he/she is a faithful follower of the curriculum 'in spirit and letter'; a slave to the textbook, even if it is not very useful to the learners in his/her class. A democratic teacher, on the other hand, is one who is sensitive to his/her learners' needs and gears his/her teaching to suit them; he adapts the textbook, if it is not suitable to the learners, by adding to and changing the content of the textbook; uses examples which are understood by them; modifies his/her language to suit them. In other words, he/she teaches the learners rather than the textbook.

What kind of teacher would you like to be? Obviously the third kind, because you teach the learners and your main objective is to teach English to meet their needs. You will have to adapt the textbook and workbook exercises to suit the learners' language level and also to meet their needs. I am sure all of you are aware of the basic needs of your learners of English able to read and understand simple English texts and able to write with legibility simple English texts. In order to meet these needs, you will have to make changes in the Course books and

workbooks, whenever and wherever necessary. Do make these changes without hesitation, as long as your changes are necessary to suit your learners. For example, in Unit 1 in CECY Pupil's Book 5, there is information about the Department store, where gardening tools and cassettes are sold in the same store; this may not be true of the supermarket in you town; in which case you may change the things available in the store. Or if you think your students of the Preparatory class 1may not find 'Anne' and 'Tom' comfortable in the very first lesson in English in CECY Pupil's Book 1, you can change the names to Ameen and Fowzia without any hesitation; after all the purpose of this lesson is to teach 'how to wish people in English when we meet each other' and not to introduce English names to Yemeni learners. These are just two examples; you can find more in the books.

The Faculties of Education should prepare you for this. The administration including the Supervisor should not discourage you from doing this. I am sure you will get necessary help from all the sources. But remember, what I am asking you to do need not get an official sanction; you are not changing the entire textbook nor are you throwing it out of the class. You are only adapting your textbook, by changing here and there for the benefit of your learners. You have to be sensitive to your learners' needs and be aware of their abilities and a bit imaginative. Your learners will find your classes useful and interesting; you will have greater satisfaction. Try your best. Good luck.

The blind four

e saw him whilst he was wandering through Al-Zaubari Street, almost trembling as he walked his uneven steps staring with vacant eyes into the bustling crowds around him. Actually it wouldn't have felt so strange if it wasn't for the four kids he was leading them to an unknown destination;

"Watch out there is a pole to the right!"
"Stick to the left, it's the main street

ahead of you!"


"Move forward, watch the stairs!"

The four of them were blind!

We approached him, partially out of curiosity and partially out of sympathy, we wanted to know the story behind the mysterious family, so we took him to the Yemen Times where he told us his story, or more accurately; tragedy.

Hamood Ahmad Hassan is one of the million laborers who build this country and in turn doesn't even have a home. Those whose daily routine is struggling under the merciless sun, or the unforgiving cold for food, and yet most of the time not getting enough of it. Those who can't afford to be choosy about the circumstances of their work and living, the not by choice, danger riders for a couple of hundred rials, no privileges at all, and not even respect.

Hamood is one of 10 million Yemenis living under the poverty line, having 6 young children to take care out of which four can't see. While I was watching the situation I was thinking of how cruel the world is, and I remembered Omar bin Al-Khattab (May god be pleased with him) with his famous say: "If poverty was a man I would have killed him!"

When I asked Hamood is something could be done for his kids, he said for the elder ones it's too late, but for the younger ones there is still a chance. The reason for the blindness was End-Stage Glaucoma, Corneal Edema and Corneal Opacity causing blindness. Yet the young ones Haifa and Haitham suffer from Optic Nerve Atrophy and total blindness, and all those reasons are hereditary.
