Yemeni, two Saudis commit suicide at Guantánamo **By: Yemen Times Staff** 

SANA'A, June 10 — The U.S. Defense Department (Pentagon) announced Saturday that two Saudis and a Yemeni national who were among Guantánamo Bay detainees in Cuba died Saturday morning, most probably from committing suicide.

A U.S. Army statement said guards found the three unconscious men had stopped breathing. Medical teams immediately intervened to try to save them, but in vain. The statement mentioned that a doctor announced the three detainees' deaths after all attempts to rescue their lives failed. The detention camp's administration did not disclose how the three committed suicide. The statement did not reveal the prisoners' names; however, the State Department informed the Saudi Arabian and Yemeni governments about the incident.

Although the U.S. Army announced the cause of their death as suicide, the U.S. Navy criminal investigations service initiated an investigation to determine the cause of death. These are the first deaths at the Guantánamo detention camp housing Taliban and Al-Qaeda detainees, established after the September 11, 2001 attacks.

Housing 460 detainees, the detention

camp has witnessed previous suicide attempts and acts of violence, with officials mentioning that 11 previous suicide attempts were conducted by 131 prisoners participating in a hunger strike.

A statement by Yemeni lawyer Khalid Al-A'nisi, Secretary-General of the National Organization for Defending Rights and Freedoms (HOOD), indicated that the group is skeptical of the truth of the U.S. story because it's known that the ideology of Islamist groups and part of Islamic ideology believe suicide contradicts such ideology.

Secondly, the statement noted that the case requires international and impartial investigation, as it's been proved that there have been criminal torture practices, crimes violating human rights and torture until death occurring in many prisons and detention camps under the U.S. Administration.

The statement's third issue was that the detainees have been imprisoned for several years while there is nothing against them and they are considered the responsibility of the United States and the U.S. Administration; thus, the U.S. will not be impartial.

Al-A'nisi said the incident calls for more pressure efforts by human rights organizations and human rights activists against violations committed by the U.S.

Administration in prisons Guantánamo, Abu Ghraib and secret prisons in various areas worldwide

He asserted that the Yemeni citizen's funeral must become a demonstration attended by human rights activists from various parts of the world and be a message about the U.S. Administration's human rights violations at Guantánamo and other prisons. "Yemen's government must demand an international investigation into the incident of the death of one of its citizens at Guantánamo prison," he added.

According to Al-A'nisi, as is its habit, the Yemeni government is remaining silent about the case and it at least should have complained to the United Nations, since Yemen is the Arab nation with the second largest number of citizens detained at Guantánamo. He demanded Yemen's government not play a role in hiding the crime by hastily burying the corpse without conducting a transparent and neutral investigation. "The strange thing is that the name of the dead Yemeni hasn't been revealed even up until now and that increases the anxiety of the Yemeni families," Al-A'nisi

statement demanding urgent action regarding the United States' ill treatment of Guantánamo hunger strikers. It said the number of Guantánamo detainees on hunger strike had risen to 75 as of May 29, according to a U.S. military spokesperson. Before that, the number had fallen to as little as three. Camp authorities allegedly have been mistreating striking detainees to pressure them into giving up.

Three detainees are believed to have been on hunger strike continuously since it began August 8, 2005 and kept alive only by force-feeding through a tube inserted into the stomach via the nose.

One of a new group of hunger strikers also is being force-fed this way, according to a Navy spokesperson.

The force-feeding method used at Guantánamo may amount to torture or other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment. Detainees reportedly have been strapped into restraint chairs and force-fed with a thick plastic tube with a metal edge and deliberately fed too much in order to cause pain. According to their lawyers, they were isolated in cold rooms and some were beaten to punish them for joining the

# Former North Yemen president Al-Arashi dies

SANA'A, June 11 — Yemeni official media announced yesterday that former North Yemen President Qadi Abdul Karim Abdullah Al-Arashi, 72, died in Saudi Arabia. His funeral was believed to have been held this morning in Sana'a, where he will be buried.

A statement by the president's office noted that Al-Arashi played an important role in the 1962 Yemeni revolution and in defending its goals. "Throughout the various positions he held, he proved to be steadfast and highly competent,"

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the statement indicated.

Born in 1934 in Sana'a city, Al-Arashi held numerous prominent positions. He was appointed chairman of the Presidential Council of the former Arab Republic of Yemen from June 24 to July 18, 1978 following President Ahmed Al-Ghashmi's assassination. Shortly thereafter, he was elected chairman of the People's Council (Parliament) as well as vice president in the same year.

Al-Arashi received his basic education in Sana'a and completed his studies at the Scientific School. He then embarked upon judiciary and administrative work while he was young. After the September 26 revolution, he

became more prominent at the political level, as he participated in various military campaigns in defense of the revolution.

Al-Arashi occupied various government posts, being appointed Minister of Finance twice, during which he established the state's first budget. He also was appointed Minister of Local Administration whereupon he reformulated the Local Governance Law.

In 1988, Al-Arashi unanimously was elected Shoura Council president. Two years later, namely on the occasion of reunification, he was elected a member of the Presidential Council. In 1997, he was appointed a consultant to the pres-

SANA'A, June 11 - Thousands of Yemenis have been able to watch 2006 World Cup matches being staged in Germany via three giant screens set up by the German Embassy in Sana'a and

In collaboration with the Ministry of Youth and Sports, the Ministry of Communication erected another 27 screens across the republic, particularly in major cities. However, most Yemenis expressed sorrow for not being able to see the matches with normal TV channels, asserting that the existing screens aren't enough to watch World Cup activities.

Though few in number, most hostels and motels with subscriptions to channels airing World Cup matches have

According to Al-Sahwa newspaper, one Yemeni citizen was able to find a satellite channel airing 2006 World Cup matches. With much effort, he managed to access SLTV2, adding that he was able to "break the pay-per-view basis and

watch World Cup matches for free with no need to go here and there." Those with large satellite dishes do the same, continually searching for channels airing the matches.

At a press conference, Germany's ambassador to Yemen stated, "Positioning such big screens to telecast matches in some towns is a sign of the depth of relations between Yemen and Germany." He continued, "We wish to share with our Yemeni friends the enjoyment of watching World Cup matches, particularly with those unable to view satellite channels."

He further noted, "During mutual visits between both sides, Germany presented 1,000 footballs to Yemen in order to develop athletic cooperation between both countries. There was also a German coach providing support and consulting to Yemen's Football League."

Additionally, "More Yemeni coaches are receiving courses and training in Germany and there could be more activities in the future. Sports are considered a tool for understanding and cooperation between countries and they participate in establishing dialogue between Europe and the Arab





# Larjani delivers letter to president Saleh, concludes visit

SANA'A, June 10 — In a press conference held at the Iranian Embassy on June 8, Chairman of the Iranian National Security Council Ali Larjani emphasized that "some are not content with good relations between Iran and Yemen and they want to arouse turbulence and problems between them [Yemen and Iran], for they [Yemen and Iran] are among the area's large countries and they can help achieve permanent and sustainable security there."

Larjani went on to say that "those who try to evoke turbulence and problems will not succeed as Yemeni-Iranian relations are too firm to stand [down from] such problems." Yemen is Larjani



a close and intimate friend to Iran and "both countries are connected by firm political, economic, security and cultural relations. Iran's security is Yemen's security," he added.

Carrying a letter from Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, the Iranian President, Ali Larjani met with President Saleh. The letter that he delivered concerned bilateral relations between Yemen and Iran and prospects for mutual cooperation. Additionally, the letter dealt with developments regarding the Iranian nuclear program, Iranian attitudes towards international developments, and other current issues in the Middle

# Yemenis students continue their protest in Mumbai

SANA'A. June 11 — Yemeni students in the Indian city of Mumbai (Bombay) continued their sit-it for the fourteenth day running despite harsh weather conditions, as the port city has been bombarded with monsoon rains. Protesting students said that the decision to continue the sit-in was a reaction to the Yemeni Ministry of Higher Education's ignorance of their predica-

Around 300 protesters demanded the implementation of the President Saleh's directive issued on 18 February 2005 that augmented financial assistance granted to the students. Yemenis studying in India live in difficult circumstances that have been aggravated by the state of India's economy. India's economic turnaround effected a retreat of the American dollar relative to the Indian rupee leading to a rise in the cost of rent, student expenses, and the general cost of living. Students say that they are unable to afford the costs associated with studying and research.

Protesters at the sit-in demanded payment of student fees to Indian universities, noting that grants originating from the Ministry of Higher Education are retained by the cultural attaché at the Yemeni embassy for years. Often, this practice has led students to terminate their studies due to lack of fund-

Nas Press published news that said a delegation of students met with Mustapha Noman, the Yemeni Ambassador to India, and discussed their demands with him. In turn, he referred the matter to the Ministry of Higher Education in Yemen. According to student spokespersons, the Ministry has ignored the ambassador's communication

Indian police granted Yemenis studying in India permission to hold their protest rally in front of the Yemeni Consulate General in Mumbai and have provided them with tents to protect themselves against the weather.

# Doctors, pharmacists posed to stage sit-ins

SANA'A, June 7 - Physicians and pharmacists have threatened to hold a series of sits-in to protest to what they consider is the government's lack of commitment towards the demands of health sector employees. The Union of Physicians and Pharmacists called upon all heath sector personnel to prepare to stage a sit-in as a first step in series of protest activities contained in their campaign.

The statement, issued by the Higher Executive Office of the union and published on the RayNews.net, pointed out that the protests must be carried-out in the interest of the people, the profession, and the future. The statement further mentioned that nothing substantial had been realized since promises were made a year ago by the prime minister suggesting that steps would be taken to create a degree of equity among physicians and pharmacists. Moreover, the Minister of the Civil Service hinted that their situation would improve when the new scale of wages and salaries went into effect.

Workers in the health sector demand the implementation of a just compensation structure for doctors and pharmacists along with the improvement of conditions that health sector employees work in. Additionally, they want to maintain their right to choose their

own representatives and the non-interference of the government, or any biased party, in this right. Their reaction is a demarche to the General People's Congress (GPC), which has lately been accused of interventions in professional and trade unions. Lastly, health sector workers also demand the return of their union's stolen posses-

The importance of the government's adoption of \$200 (USD) as the minimum salary level for Yemenis who have undertaken specialized studies domestically-as is currently case with Yemenis who have pursued their studies abroad—was stressed by the Union.

The Union also demanded the employment of all unemployed doctors, pharmacists, and technicians in all areas of expertise. The statement disclosed that Yemen needs upwards of 40,000 doctors, pharmacists, and dentists according to international standards. The number of doctors practicing in Yemen presently does not exceed 6,000 doctors, according to Ministry of Health statistics.

The Union of Physicians and Pharmacists demanded the immediate replacement of foreign personnel with nationals as the jobs reserved for foreigners amounts to double the number reserved for Yemenis.

# JMP holds symposium on reform

HODEIDAH, June 8 — Under the theme a "Comprehensive Awareness of JMP's [Joint Meeting Parties] Program for Comprehensive National and Political Reform," the executive committee for the JMP front held its first political symposium. Syndicates, civil society organizations, representatives from branch offices, and interested non-party members attended the activity.

Adnan Hajar of the Yemeni Socialist Party (YSP) presented a paper titled "Constitutional and Legal Reforms" that stressed the importance of peaceful and democratic action in order to achieve inclusive reforms of Yemen's governmental system. Furthermore, he said that Yemenis deserve a real parliamentary system as opposed to the nominal one that currently exists.

Hajar added that the legal system needs to be reformed by making it financially, administratively, and juridically independent from other branches of government. Likewise, the electoral system and the division

of power among local authorities also need to be changed. According to Hajar, government offices should maintain their impartiality and should not be corrupted to work in the interest of only one political party. Finally, Hajar demanded that the government rectify the country's water and electricity problems.

Dr. Taher Al-Mamari, a member of the Nasserite Unionist Party, spoke about rights and liberties that the Yemeni state should guarantee regardless of citizenship, political affiliation, or other attributes. Other rights that

should be guaranteed include the right to form associations, the freedom of speech, and to demonstrate. Al-Mamari called for the abolition of illegal prisons and a new law on demon-

Hasan Saghir, General Secretary Executive of the Islah (Reform) Party, noted the guarantees necessary for the holding of free and fair elections. Further, Saghir said that the electoral administration must be reformed. He emphasized that the media should maintain objectivity and neutrality when reporting on events.

protests-sometimes approaching riots—in the wake of an attempt by a government official to seize a cemetery in order to break-up the land and sell it as various private plots. Sources in Aden, who wish to

remain unidentified, said that residents in the districts of Al-Shaab, Al-Hassawa, Abu-Harba, and other nearby areas took to the streets in a demonstration that blocked the road to the area and burned old tires in the wake of Fahd Abdulaziz's-director of the Office of Endowments in Adenattempt to forcefully enter a cemetery in order to sell off the land.

Residents say that the seizure was an attempt by a 'land Mafia' to switch the status of the land to private ownership. Knowing what was brewing, citizens tried to prevent seizure of the land by

perimeter some months ago. Yet, their work was partially destroyed by unknown hoodlums who pulled down parts of the wall. Currently, the prosecutor's office is still conducting investigations into that act of vandalism.

One of the area's residents, A'rif Al-Halimi told the Shoura.net that the commander of the security sector of Buraiqa and the chief of police of the Al-Shaab district told local residents who were protesting that orders existed preventing the exploitation of the cemetery's land.

Al-Halimi, a lawyer, made it clear that the Office of Endowments in Aden is in the vanguard of those attempting to confiscate the cemetery's land. He indicated that the office has met with resentment from local residents who unanimously refuse the sale of the

### Japan funds disaster protection in Shuqra

ABYAN, June 7 — The government of Japan decided to grant \$90,000 (USD) to the Local Council of the Abyan Governorate under the Japanese scheme called "Grant Assistance for Grassroots Human Security Project" (GGP) which aims at supporting small-scale community-based projects in fields that concern meeting basic human needs such as primary healthcare, basic education, and

public welfare in developing countries. The GGP grant will contribute to the costs of construction of a series of walls that will protect the town of Shugra from flooding and wave action. One of the biggest fishing complexes in Yemen, the town of Shuqra has frequently been afflicted by natural disasters that have

caused many casualties along with the destruction of buildings. The erection of a new line of barriers is anticipated to save lives and protect property from future natural disasters.

Farid Ahmed Mogawar, Governor of Abyan and Chairman of the Local Council of the Abvan Governorate and Yuichi Ishii, Ambassador of Japan, signed the agreement on June 7.

This is the second project to be financed by Japan under the GGP scheme in the Japanese fiscal year running from April 2006 to March 2007. During the last Japanese fiscal year, Japan funded twenty projects under the GGP scheme totaling \$1,807,292 (USD).

# Workshop emphasizes building youth capacities

SANA'A, June 10 — The Ibhar Foundation for Innovation and Childhood and the Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung (FES), a German foundation, held a six-day training workshop on human rights for youth working with children. Local civil society organizations (CSO) also participated.

The course aimed to build youth capacities in general, those working with children in particular, by using the Itigahat Guide: a training manual on human rights. Other objectives of the workshop were to identify ways of suitably using the guide in relation to the capacities of youth, children's reality; to increase awareness of children's issues to CSOs and youth working with children; and to develop a work plan with up-to-date and effective ideas.

Maha Salah, Chairman of the Ibhar Foundation, said that the workshop was not planned in a vacuum as the Foundation has offered other activities in regard to children's rights in the past. According to Maha, the workshop intended to develop youth's abilities when working with children by making youth aware of human rights issues so as to enhance their effectiveness. She emphasized the importance of holding such training courses as they build capaci-

Eikendery, Felix Resident Representative of the FES, said such workshops and symposiums are very impor-

tant, particularly when they focus on human and children's rights as such workshops provide the know-how necessary to allow youth workers to operate

U.S. authorities previously downplayed the number of detainees involved in the hunger strike to avoid international criticism. They don't consider a detainee to be on hunger strike until he's refused all food for at least three days in succession. Lawyers say some hunger striking detainees have been accepting meals, but then throwing the food away to avoid being force-fed.

The spokesperson claimed that the increased number of hunger strikers is an "attention-getting" tactic and "consistent with Al-Qaeda practice." However,

Amnesty International has received consistent reports that the strikers' aim is to protest against their continued indefinite detention without charge or trial, camp conditions and mistreatment by camp The most recent communication from

a hunger striker was a note passed to his lawyer in March by Ahmed Errachidi, a Moroccan national and long-term UK resident. Indicating that he joined the strike out of desperation regarding his continued detention, he wrote, "Enough is enough. I have the right to protest peacefully. I'm not harming them [the U.S.]. I must be allowed to demonstrate peacefully. I don't want to die; I want to live, but I'm not living here. My struggle is not to die, but it's a struggle for the

# Funerals for Gaza beach victims

Thousands of people have attended the funeral of seven members of a Palestinian family killed in an explosion on a Gaza beach on Friday.

here were emotional scenes as the bodies of a husband, wife, four daughters and a son were carried to the cemetery in the town of Beit Lahiya.

Palestinian militant group Hamas accuses Israel of killing the family.

Hamas said it fired rockets at Israel for the first time since its truce 16 months ago, in response to the deaths. There were no Israeli reports of

damage from the Hamas rockets, but one reportedly fell on the Jabaliya refugee camp in northern Gaza.

In a separate incident, the vehicle of a senior Gaza general, Rashid Abu Shbak, was caught in a gunbattle between security forces and Hamas gunmen at the funeral of a security officer.

#### Militant flags

Israel, which has been shelling open areas of northern Gaza to prevent rocket attacks, promised to investigate the deaths but said their cause was not yet

"If innocent civilians have been killed by an Israeli shell, that is totally unacceptable," said government spokesman Mark Regev.

"It will be investigated thoroughly and if people have to pay a price with their careers because of negligence or some other factor, then that will be done ...'

Thousands gathered for the funeral at the central mosque in Beit Lahiya, with many praying on the road outside because of the crowds.

Later the mourners surged down the main street carrying the dead wrapped in white shrouds and green Islamic

Many flew the black and green flags of Palestinian militant groups, and armed men fired into the air in a last salute to the dead. Gunmen with loudspeakers called for revenge.

At the cemetery, seven-year-old Huda Ghalia, the last surviving family member, asked for forgiveness as she bent down to kiss her father's face. Reuters news agency reported.

Huda, who was asleep under a blanket when the explosion occurred, has been symbolically adopted by Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas and Prime Minister Ismail Haniya.

Meanwhile, there has been further criticism of Israel over the killings.

Jordan described the attack as a crime, and said it would further increase tensions, while Turkey said the killings were a severe blow to

efforts to bring peace to the region.

#### Symbolic attacks

Hamas government spokesman Ghazi Hamad told the BBC that Friday's deaths had changed what he called "the rules of the game", and that suicide attacks could resume.

The BBC's Simon Wilson in Jerusalem says that Saturday's rocket attacks appear mainly symbolic.

But a spokesman for Hamas's armed wing, the Izzedine al-Qassam brigade, said next time the rockets would be longer range and hit deeper inside Israel.

Under the ceasefire arrangement agreed with Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas, Hamas has enjoyed enormous political success, taking power with a landslide victory in parliamentary elections in January.

So far this does not amount to a complete change in Hamas's position but if it were to return to widespread militant activity, the question would be how Israel might respond, our corre-

In the past, it has refused to differentiate between political and armed wings, assassinating a number of Hamas leaders, including its wheelchair-bound founder, Sheikh Ahmed

formance in their opening match. "We are delighted," Klinsmann said. "It is looking positive after this.

The 1990 World Cup winner was confident his side was ready for such a performance.

"You could see the energy in the changing room," he said.

The hosts are also set to receive a further boost for their next group match against Poland with the return of captain Michael Ballack.

"We hope Michael will be back for the Poland game," he added.

Meanwhile, Germany and Costa Rica also set a new record for the amount of goals scored in the opening game of the tournament. The hosts' tally was the first time a side has

scored more than 3 goals in the opening match of the tournament since 1962. Between 1966 and 1978 not a single goal was

scored in the opening match, while between 1982 and 1994 no side scored more than one goal in the curtain raiser. Germany's efforts were also the first time

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# The role of media in society

ress history shows that it was born to educate people about happenings that affect or were likely to affect them, as well as agitate on their behalf to resolve their grievances and protect their interests.

The press also assumed a certain code of private and public conduct which those in authority were expected to follow. Any deviation from assumed norms came in for a severe rebuke from the press. This not only helped keep those in power in check and on the right path, but it did something more.

By discussing the standards of private and public morals, it also held before the public at large a set of ethical guidelines and indirectly influenced their pattern of private and public behavior. The press became society's mirror for all purposes, focusing on news making individuals and events.

The press can inform all those concerned about achievements in agriculture, industry, education, health, medicine and science and technology, carrying into every home the fruits of research in these and other fields in as simple and plain a language as possible and help individuals in self-advancement. The press also can bring to public attention the achievements of individuals and organizations, including non-governmental organizations, in various fields.

As a mass communicator, print media can achieve what a nation-builder can by educating, motivating, exhorting and rewarding individuals. Media can foster and promote the good and expose and condemn evil. Media can hold before the public an ideal and castigate the deviant. It can promote tolerance, brotherhood and unity and root out intolerance, divisiveness, enmity and hatred. It can prevent conflicts and violence and build up peaceful relations and respect for rule of law. Media can curb confrontation and help

solve problems amicably.

The press also can move a nation to progress, ushering in prosperity and happiness for all. To this end, it can focus attention of the public and the powers that be on areas and individuals needing development and betterment, discuss and suggest necessary measures, as well as the best ways and means of implementing them. It can highlight measures, schemes and projects planned by authorities at various levels, depicting their gains and failures, pointing out their non-implementation, as well as delays, waste and malpractices in their operations.

The press also can invite policy-makers' attention to the need for social welfare schemes for weaker and vulnerable sections of society. The need to democratize the press by inducting in it representatives of the have-nots and making it a voice for their grievances and aspirations can't be overemphasized.

To qualify as society's watchdog, the press must represent society as a whole and monitor the interests of all sections. The press's social audit can't ignore this vital aspect of its structure and functioning. Communication no longer remains an incidental service; rather, it has become a primary service and as such, an essential institution of modern society.

In a truly democratic society, communication constitutes its foundation; therefore, mass media rightly have come to be regarded as the state's fourth organ. As a unique means of written mass communication, the press was the fourth organ's sole constituent until the advent of radio and television.

Though electronic media now holds sway, the press has not lost its hold on the public, continuing to play its powerful role as informer and educator and the purveyor of news and modern views.

Today, the press has become a more powerful institution than the state's other three organs, as it can comment

on and criticize functioning of the executive, the legislature and the judiciary. It can make and mar individuals and institutions, as well as mobilize public opinion and overthrow governments.

Vast sections of the public, both as individuals and members of certain groups, are victims of exploitation, discrimination and of unjust and inequitable social and economic order. They have unarticulated grievances that go unheeded even if articulated, so they urgently need relief.

Can't the press act as a tribune – a kind of day-to-day Parliament of the people – presenting their grievances to authorities and pursuing them until they are redressed? Not that the grievances of those who can articulate aren't published, but even those aren't picked up as a cause to be pursued.

Corruption, nepotism and many other malpractices in the functioning of those vested with public power, as well as non-implementation and faulty implementation of various schemes and projects, can be exposed legitimately via press columns.

Investigative journalism must not be only an occasional phenomenon, nor must it concentrate only on major scams and scandals, nor is it is undertaken by large newspapers alone. Even small newspapers must act as society's watchdog. Large newspapers can and should assist small ones on this behalf and secure their services for this purpose. Large newspapers also can extend their protective umbrella to small ones by ensuring security for them on such occasions by highlighting their precarious condition and pressures exerted upon them.

As a catalyst for change, the press has a considerable role to play because it's an input into development itself and into social change, which, when occurring, is accelerated by the development process. Society is in the process of modernization – of transitioning from

traditional to modern – and this produces tremendous pressures and a great deal of strain on the public, which we are witnessing today.

One of the problems with reporting on development and change is that it's not an event but a process. Therefore, it's something that doesn't necessarily catch the eye, so it's relegated due to not being an event. It's not time-bound therefore, it can be done tomorrow, which becomes the day after and so it continues.

Many events later occur due to unnoticed and unanticipated social change because things come to a boil, then there's an explosion and the event makes news. However, the preceding chain of events that built up that pressure went unnoticed, which is something newspapers must look at more carefully.

Editors and journalists must make development news and news about social change newsworthy and such stories must compete with sports, political news, scams, sensations, high society news or whatever else. They should relate development to the public's mind to see how such change and development processes impact their lives, if such happens. When it does happen, the whole web opens, but it's equally important if it doesn't happen. Very often, there's a big story in relating what happens as opposed to something that doesn't happen.

As the fourth estate, the press is accountable to the people as a wielder of power over them, as an exerciser of freedom of expression for and on behalf of society and as a recipient of the people's patronage. Practices of misinformation, disinformation and suppressing news and views can continue unchecked on a very large scale because most individuals don't exercise their fundamental right to obtain or receive correct information from the press.

# 'Normal operating procedures'

ccording to U.S. military reports, the troops who participated in the deaths of Iraqi civilians in the town of Ishaqi in March were found to have followed 'normal operating procedures' when they attacked the house. This is not the only incident of its kind, and U.S. forces in Iraq still face scrutiny for the actions of marines in two other incidents in which civilians were killed. Last November, 24 civilians were slaughtered in Haditha, a town located in north-western Iraq. On April 26, an Iraqi man in the Baghdad suburb of Hamandiyah was killed by American forces. According to media reports, the victim was dragged from his house, shot, and a firearm was planted on his person. Two weeks ago a pregnant woman in labor and her cousin were killed by gunfire in Samarra when their car failed to stop at an American checkpoint on their way to a hospital.

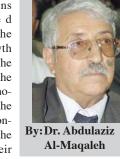
A rule of thumb in the media industry has it that if one incident is reported there are many others of the same kind that have not yet reached the public. I believe this is the case in Iraq, particularly when actions known to result in civilian deaths are treated simply as 'normal operating procedures'. If these are normal procedures, I can not think of abnormal ones, or rather I do not dare to. Perhaps the lectures that soldiers will be required to attend on battlefield ethics in June will make a difference and lessen the possibility that American troops 'snap" when they wage war on Iraqi civilians.

I am glad that the Iraqi government finally found that its limits of toleration had been reached concerning what constitutes acceptable action on the part of coalition forces occupying its land. At least, this is the impression that Baghdad seemed to convey to the world. With journalists reporting from the field, it would be difficult to try and turn the usual blind eye on the occupiers' conduct... or was it liberators?

We fear that any bullets held in reserve may be used to kill friends instead of enemies and occupiers whose modus operandi is to kill and capture natives, demolish homes, and spread terror across Palestine, which adversaries would like to transform into a cemetery for Palestinian natives. Maliciously, enemies exploit the lack of discretion among

Palestinians currently, which previously was

the foremost quality that typified strugglers throughout years of confrontations and bloody clashes with the occupiers that have not ceased since the occupation began.

Many Arab, Islamic and global issues are provoking discord presently making observers feel endlessly perplexed. This perplexity only worsens with the Palestinian situation as internal and external factors continue to

exacerbate the conflict. The Palestinian issue and its effects has been, and still is, the primary reason for what happens politically in Arab and Islamic nations, as well as to what happens to local Palestinians who are primarily concerned with the issue. Relationships between locals has raised concern, particularly as the Israeli whip of terrorism has inflicted casualties-both civilian and combatant—on the Palestinian side.

Differing viewpoints on issues like this are bound to occur and these issues necessitate increasing political and intellectual awareness among people and the establishment of a new era of proper democracy from which positive stands and sound viewpoints stem. Proper democracy is a must so that better solutions can be sought without reaching deadlocks or facing hurdles. With its various factions, the Palestinian Liberation Movement is merely the ideal exemplar of such a need for Proper Democracy. How is it possible for a mélange of viewpoints, backed by armed factions, to provide a road towards the attainment of liberation, while the destruction of the occupation regime remains a thorny task? Is the Palestinian Authority's frustration behind such a multitude of viewpoints? What kind of authority is the PA in any case as the occupation regime controls it? What would happen if

the Authority was liberated and the Palestinians supplanted the occupation regime and its panoptic monitoring appara-

Resolving the differences and disputes between government officials and those in the streets is the responsibility of the Palestinians themselves. Secondly, it is the duty of every Arab nationalist to alleviate the torment that ordinary citizens in the occupied land endure. Quick solutions to these differences and disputes will not only alleviate the daily miseries that Palestinians face, but will also help to provide a environment conducive to the escalation of the brave resistance against its adversaries and to confirm the permanence of the Palestinian strategy of confrontation with the occupation regime.

# Questions & answers on the Arabs' reality (3-3)

he difference between the legitimate strife and that swerving from the right course is that the legitimate struggle has its own rules and codes of ethics and has its own characteristics. More important of these characteristics are the una-

nimity, issuance of opinions from good and versed sources that are fully understanding the facts of life and religion as well as working to avert dangers and to subdue seditions and to support the nation's interests. Unfortunately, we have been experiencing exploitation of opinions in favor of and for political ends. Enemies managed to use those opinions as pretexts and excuses for the implementation of their concocted intentions and goals. The most apparent examples in this regard are what we witness at present of disasters in Lebanon, Palestine and Iraq.

An answer to the question related to the first mistake in education to be corrected is the state of individualism and egoism dominating the education process. We have been suffering for long from these two plagues at all levels, both in the private and public sectors. The spirit of team work is absent from any work or project and the society of enemies of success is widening its circle. It is working on destroying any successful work; deform the image of any successful man and

to hinder the building of any project. We will end up as finished unless we abandon these two plagues and adopt the principle of teamwork that is harmonious and cohesive. Related to this is also the cause of absence of creativity. There are many causes for the absence of creativity which is a shameful aspect in our life. The mistakes committed over decades have resulted in the brain drain. It is

a human, economic and scientific

exhaustion unprecedented in any nation of the world. That has produced depletion of the water of life and spaces of hope for the youth got narrow. Other reasons begin with the ossified educational curricula, absence of intensive care, nonexistence of creation opportunities and loss of interest in establishment of research centers and allocation of huge appropriations for them as it is done in advanced countries. Another main reason is that of not keeping pace with the age of the revolution of technology of science and communication. That has led to this backwardness. There are now serious attempts to catch up with the march and reform the failure. Nevertheless, not to draw a special strategy for encouraging creativity and care for the talented would remain the fundamental factor of the absence of creation indefinitely.

This situation leads us to the question related to the role of the Arab media. We are now at the age of the media, especially that of satellite and internet. This has doubled the duties of media men and increased the dan-

ularly in the area of enlightenment and guidance and the formation of the society's personality, negatively and positively. He is very mistaken who thinks that the role of the media is confined to entertainment and conveyance of the piece of information and event. It is particularly so with regard to going too far in the spread of trivialities and rendering the media industry to a negative factor encouraging deviation and contributing to superficiality of brains and misleading the youth. The media are a goal and constructive role contributing to rectifying the mistakes and dissemination of knowledge. The media role is also to raise the level of audience and present the best as well as unifying the word and, fighting sedition and putting an end to those who use information as a Trojan horse to infiltrate into the nation's body for the spread of diseases.

Another important and urgent question is that related to the duty of the woman towards the society and the society's duty towards the woman. The woman constitutes half and more of the society. Her role defines her duties in bringing up generations and educating her children in a good way. She would encourage her children to go after science and knowledge and entertain commendable morals. An Arab poet once described the great role of the woman by indicating that the good care in bringing up the woman produces good generations. The woman is an essential knuckle in entity of the society, without it there is no renascence in the soci-

ger of information in all walks of life parttic- ety. However, her role as a good mother must not cancel her other role in the society especially the social, scientific, cultural and charitable contributions as well as in decisionmaking. How come we brush her off this matter and then ask her to produce for us sensible human and good generation capable of shouldering the responsibility? Therefore this defect should be cured. Every individual has to shoulder his responsibility in carrying out his duties and gaining his rights. The woman is the pillar of the society, the family, the homeland and the nation. The situations will not be corrected and good unless she obtains her essential rights, which are very many, the religion of Islam has approved for her and gave the guarantee of dignified life and the distinguished role.

This is a little number of questions and answers. In each question there is a space for thousands of articles and each answer represents an in brief image on the reality and conditions of the nation, hoping that in submitting them there is a call for conducting detailed and frank dialogue on their meanings and expansion in deriving one thousand questions and one that may not be enough to explain the suffering and emphasis on the necessities of coming out of this dark tunnel where our nation is hiding.

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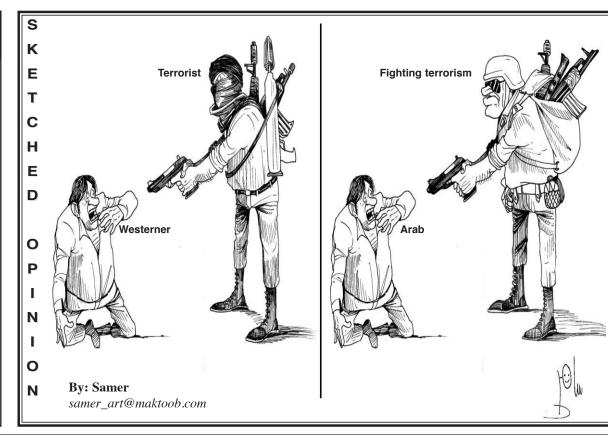

In Egypt there are symptoms of sectarian sedition between the Muslims and the Copts and an ethnical disturbance between the Bedouins of Sinai and the rest of the Egyptians. In Iraq there are ethnical seditions between the Kurds and Arabs and Turkmens as well as sectarian disturbances between the Muslims and Christians and between the Sunnis and Shiites. In the Sudan there is an ethnical riot between the Africans and the Arabs and others between the north, the south, the west and the east and sectarian disturbances between the Muslims and the Christians. In the Arab Maghreb there are signs of disturbances between the Arabs and the Berber. In Yemen signs of seditions between the north and the south and signs of sectarian disturbance and in bargain there signs of riots between the Sunnis and the Shiites and the same situation in Saudi Arabia. In Svria there are disturbances between the Arabs and Kurds and sectarian ones between the Alawites and the Sunnis. In addition, in turkey there is an ethnical sedition between the Turks and the Kurds.

As for Iran there are signs of national seditions between the Azeri and the Persians and between the Arabs and Persians and Turkmens as well as a general disturbance between the Shiites

The states mentioned above govern those seditions through agitating them or calming them down in accordance with circumstances and their own political and economic interests in the region. However the ability of those countries to flare up and subdue those seditions is attributed to that the regimes in our region are unjust and many of them lack the popular legitimacy and most of them have not been able to build the modern state where the citizens are equal before the law and no control of one ethnical or

sectarian over the wealth and power enslaving the other citizens. This structural disorder would continue posing a threat to unity of and security and stability of those countries and consequently their economic progress in

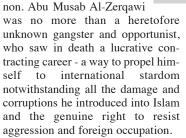

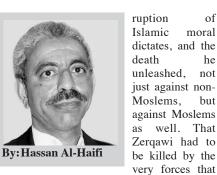

# Old City of Sana'a: Ancient metropolitan planning amid modern disorder

he sa'ilah (water course) surrounding the Old City doesn't give a creatively new picture of Sana'a city. Rather, it provides a platform from which a foreign tourist or passerby can contemplate a city that has preserved its brilliance throughout millennia.

Earlier, the self-motivated individual had to delve into neighborhoods and building spaces to rediscover the warmth of an ancient civilization and examine its

Now, the sa'ilah does nothing but attract one to the gorgeous house fronts lining its banks in calmness and elegance. The scene must be completed inside.

The metered Raha taxi driver wasn't comfortable with a passenger's request for him to slow down. Simultaneously, he turned up the volume of the cassette player, giving vent to the voice and melody of Yemeni singer Mohammed Sa'd Abdullah, who best performs Sana'a songs:

May Allah, with health and safety, let me approach my pretty beloved,

That beloved who has beauty, handsomeness and all that is nice.

All is dross that is neither Sana'a nor its people. Sana'a has every art:

Water and the greenery of its hills, filled with prettiness.

There, time laughs much at the tears of clouds.

May Allah send much rain to that abode.

The striking impression of a passerby is the apparent incongruity between two scenes, those called old and new. As soon as one passes Shu'oob Bridge, the characteristics of old architecture fade away, melting into modern building fronts in a horrific view of atrocity, randomness, disorder and tastelessness.

This is no nostalgia for bygone days. However, it is a matter of a particularly modern metropolitan style manifested inside the Old City of Sana'a disappearing in the concrete and stone structures called the new city of Sana'a.

The first type of architecture is called new, but it incorporates all signs of modernism and order. Ironically, the second is called modern while it has nothing to do with modernism. It can be described as a Frankenstein that doesn't hold the qualities of the old, such as its dense meanings, nor does it hold qualities of the modern, except for the faceless concrete. There is no planning or harmony, thus, it doesn't reflect anything of the personality of the place or its dwellers.

Dwellers of the new city are a mixture of individuals gathered in the city without full integration. Their gathering doesn't lead to any sort of agreement on certain modern values that distinguish their gathering. When one contemplates the new city of Sana'a, he will find it based demographically on localism, as

er in one place in the city.

When one looks at the Old City, he will find everything in order. From the sa'ilah's bank, one views the city but finds nothing inharmonious and nothing disturbing the scene's aesthetics, completeness, homogeneity or constituents.

Ventilation and lighting inside the rooms of Old Sana'a houses form the structure's basis, as though mainly erected to supply dwellers with air and illumination. This knowledge not only is the privilege of bricklayers, as all citizens share it and consider it a truism.

There's no place for isolation when constructing outside space. Individuals divided their space as though ordering their private lives. Gardens are an essential component of every neighborhood and miqshamas (vegetable fields) are part of this green pattern.

The space of the Old City of Sana'a is 'spacious" with many amenities like gardens, bath houses, metropolitan design, etc. In contrast, the space of new Sana'a is overcrowded with shops and randomly built houses, high walls and hill-occupying military camps that look utterly ugly. The space of the new portion of the city is filled with dust, pavements and heavy bus traffic throughout

Constructing the city's spaces reflects citizens' thoughts and their ideas about their life. There is no possibility for human interaction and such possibilities are close to zero as long as there remain few gardens, parks, theaters, swimming pools, cultural and sports clubs, etc.

The community's elite keep their distance and construct their own life beyond high fences: private swimming pools, gardens, tennis courts and the like. They seek to increase the gap between them and everyone else by further heightening their walls. This is a mani-

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Human relationships become sophisticated in such an atmosphere. Amid walls, relationships become suspicious and distrustful – a daily gossip marathon.

In line with its architectural superiority reflecting an elevated pattern of human relationships, the Old City of Sana'a has produced a highly magnificent artistic mode – Sana'a singing. With its own rituals and melodious rhythms, it's an art whose cadence and tunes express a civilized life and open-mindedness. Life is captured there and its moments utilized to the very last.

Such art constitutes valuable material. but becomes hackneyed and distorted in

poor performances. However, nobody has proposed the idea of establishing an institute for Sana'a singing to preserve it and save it from extinction.

mentally and socially.

It would've been good if such separation marked the birth of better manifestations consistent with the age. If so, such change could have been appreciable, even if it transcended traditional metropolitan planning. However, the reality of the housing system deteriorated, disregarding the environment and humans.

Although humans tend toward modernism and renewal, present housing and environmental reality necessitates a return to the traditional metropolitan housing system adopted in the Old City of Sana'a - with all its environmental balance, social relations, good neighboring, cooperation and intimacy - provided that such a return doesn't deprive citizens of the advantages of modernism and age-dictated renewal.

Tradition shouldn't fetter movement or advancement because the population of Sana'a now grows in eight months approximately as much as its net accumulation since its founding in 1962.

#### The historic city of Old Sana'a

Located on a rectangular plateau in the center of a chain of high mountains, most notably Nuqum, Sana'a is an ancient metropolis with an elevation of 2,200 meters and an area of 184 hectares. The city dates back to the time of Noah's son Shem, who is mentioned in divine books; thus, it is considered among the world's oldest cities.

In pre-Islamic ages, Sana'a not only was an important metropolis, but also a trade station and a famous Arab area marketplace. It continued to hold the same reputation in Islamic times.

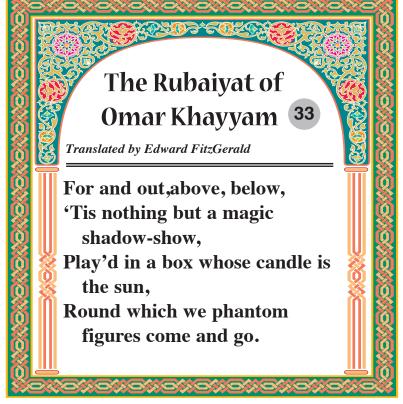
Under Islam, Sana'a took on new characteristics when some of the Prophet Mohammed's (pbuh) companions arrived and established one of the oldest mosques, the Grand Mosque. Al-Razi and other historians state that Sana'a became perfected under Islam, as its wealth increased and those from various areas came to it.

Sana'a expanded at various times, one of which was under the reign of the 11th century Hamdanite state, as well as the Ayyoubide. Al-Nahreen neighborhood was added to the city's western side, at the southern end of which the sultan's headquarters were established. To the present day, it still bears the name "Bustan Al-Sultan" (Al-Sultan's Garden), across which the "Al-Ghail Al-Aswad" (Black Spring) ran.

During the 16th century's first Ottoman era, another neighborhood was constructed on the western side called "Bir Al-Azab" (Al-Azab's Well), in the eastern part of which Al-Bakeeriyah Mosque was constructed in the Ottoman

During their last presence, opposite the city's wall, the Ottomans constructed buildings differing from the prevailing style. They were used as barracks and

changes, renewals, expansion and contraction that can't be traced accurately. However, what is certain is that the ancient city has withstood wars, sieges and catastrophes throughout the ages. It remains a living landmark of original Arab-Islamic civilization with a high level of artistic quality yoking crafts-

Throughout the ages, Sana'a has remained a significant metropolis bearing the past's features in its palaces, wall, mosques and marketplaces. It has the right to pride itself on being one of the most majestic cities in the world.



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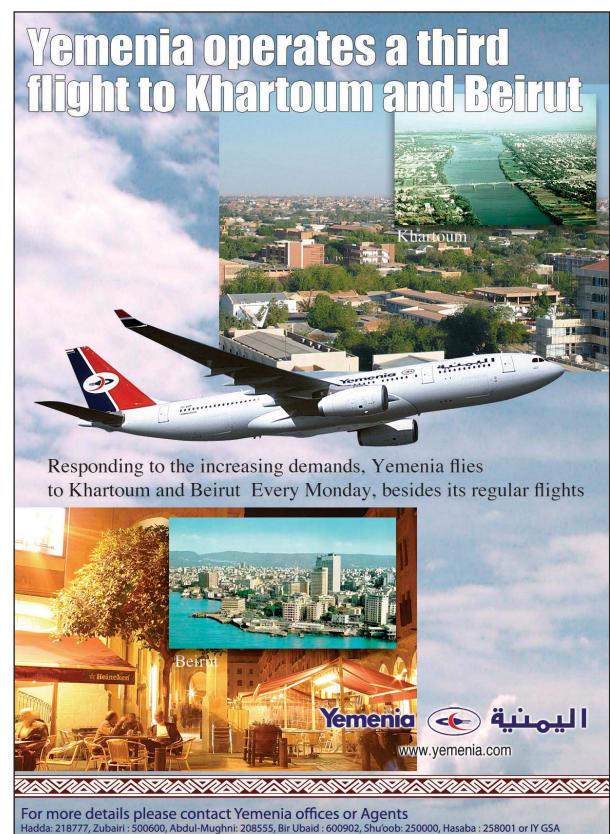

# Female genital mutilation, the taboo subject

emale genital mutilation (FGM) is a very serious subject but also a very sensitive issue in Yemen. Many people dare not speak about it, while some would rather forget it, claiming that it's not a real problem in Yemen. However, such denial doesn't prevent the fact that many international organizations classify Yemen as one of at least 28 nations worldwide that practice FGM.

According to the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), which funded the 1997 Yemen Demographic Mother and Child Health Survey, 23 percent of Yemeni women have undergone FGM procedures. In sparsely-populated Red Sea and Aden coastal regions, the figure rises to 69 percent, compared with 15 percent in the heavily-populated highlands and five percent in plateau and desert regions.

The Pacific Institute for Women's Health (PIWH) conducted a 2000 study on FGM, focusing on five Yemeni governorates - Sana'a city, Hodeidah, Hadramout, Aden and Al-Mahara. The study, which included 2,163 women, sought to determine the extent of the practice and analyze its attitudinal and physiological

The PIWH study indicated that more than 97 percent of respondents in Hodeidah had experienced FGM, 96 percent in Al-Mahara and Hadramout, 82 percent in Aden and 45.5 percent in Sana'a.

Some professionals who read the study were shocked and disputed the figures, saying that the areas where interviews were conducted had a high percentage of immigrant populations, leading to inflated numbers of women who had FGM performed on them.

However, Soheir Stolba, Ph.D., who worked in Yemen in this field, confirmed, "Most educated Yemenis denied the custom's existence, attributing it only to limited coastal pockets of populations where African immigrants live. My continued work on this phenomenon over a six-year period revealed that FGM is deeply rooted in Yemen.'

involving partial or total removal of external female genitalia or other injury to female genital organs.

Stolba referred to another practice performed on female genitalia in Yemeni coastal areas, known locally as Al-Takmeed. On the fourth day after a baby girl's birth, her mother or an older female household member prepares a compress to use on the genitalia. The compress is a soft cotton material inside of which heated salt and/or sand is placed, along with oil and herbs.

The mother heats the compress and places it on the infant's genitalia, pressing repeatedly for about an hour. This continues for a period varying between 40 days and four months. The procedure's physical effect may affect nerve endings and decrease sexual excitement of the girl or woman on whom it is performed.

According to UNICEF, FGM still is practiced on approximately two million girls annually. Amnesty International estimates that some 135 million girls worldwide have undergone some form of FGM.

**Immediate complications** include severe pain, shock, hemorrhaging, urine retention, ulcerating the genital region and injuring adjacent tissue.

#### **Health consequences of FGM**

FGM's immediate and long-term health consequences vary according to the type and severity of the procedure performed. Immediate complications include severe pain, shock, hemorrhaging, urine retention, ulcerating the genital region and injuring adjacent tissue. Bleeding and infection can cause death.

According to Stolba, infection results from using unsterile cutting instruments like razor blades or scissors and improperly treated tetanus infection can be lethal. Unsterile instruments also may contribute to the spread of HIV, as in some African nations. Additionally, urine and feces

Most cutting is done without anesthesia in an unsterile environment, such as a girls' home (a secluded hut) or a traditional barber shop. Even when local anesthesia is used, pain in the highly sensitive clitoral area returns within two or three hours of the operation.

Swelling resulting from trauma in front of the vulva may cause a girl to withhold urinating for hours, fearing a burning sensation and/or pain. According to Stolba, this also may lead to or exacerbate kidney and bladder infections.

Regarding psychosexual and psychological health, FGM may leave a lasting mark on the life and mind of the woman who has experienced it. In the longer term, women may suffer feelings of incompleteness, anxiety and depression.

The most common complications are scarring and reproductive tract infections (RTIs), which often are ignored and unreported by women for fear of being accused of infidelity or lack of cleanliness. Stolba noted that women tolerate the pain and often experience complications resulting from repeated RTIs.

A newly-published (June 2) World Health Organization (WHO) study showed that women who've had FGM are significantly more likely to experience difficulties during childbirth and their babies are more likely to die as a result of the practice.

Serious complications during childbirth include the need to have a Caesarean section, dangerously heavy bleeding after the baby's birth and prolonged hospitalization following the birth. The study found that the degree of complications increased according to the extent and severity of FGM.

"As a result of this study, for the first time, we have evidence that deliveries among women subjected to FGM are significantly more likely to be complicated and dangerous," said Joy Phumaphi, Assistant Director-General of Family and Community Health at WHO.

The study also found that FGM put women's babies in substantial danger during childbirth, as researchers found that there was an increased

mothers had FGM.

"This research was conducted in hospitals where the obstetric staff is used to dealing with women who have had FGM. The consequences for the countless women and babies who deliver at home - without the help of experienced staff – are likely to be even worse," added WHO's Dr. Paul Van Look, Director of the Special Program for Human Reproduction Research, which organized the study.

#### Who and where?

Returning to the PIWH study, many Yemeni parents take their daughters to trained medical personnel, as educated parents able to pay the high price of physicians prefer using them. "Many parents prefer using physicians or nurses because they want the procedure performed under hygienic conditions," the study men-

However, another study revealed that trained medical personnel perform only 10 percent of such operations. Women specialized in ear piercing, birthing attendants, rayissas (women skilled in female circumcision) and relatives conduct most FGM procedures.

According to the study, the procedure is conducted 95 percent of the time at home and mothers are the primary decision-makers in determining if their daughters will undergo it.

#### Stolba referred to another practice performed on female genitalia in Yemeni coastal areas, known locally as Al-Takmeed.

USAID's Demographic and Health Survey found that nearly all reported procedures (97 percent) occurred during the first month of life. Health facilities housed only three percent of these, while 97 percent were performed at home, with a traditional birthing attendant (68 percent) or elderly female relative (19 percent) usually performing the procedure. Nurses, midwives and doctors perform seven percent of FGM procedures, whereas barbers perform five percent. The usual tool is a razor blade, although scissors are used 20 percent of the time.

#### Why FGM still is practiced

Studies reveal that FGM is not indigenous to Yemen. In the past, Yemeni populations didn't practice FGM, so its history in Yemen seems to be recent, but there is no definitive data on such history. However, many Yemenis believe recent migrations from Africa, particularly from Somalia and other East African nations, to Yemeni coastal towns have led to the custom's spread in need to resuscitate infants whose large cities like Aden and Hodeidah.

The practice found fertile ground in Yemeni conservatism, with Yemeni society creating a new form of FGM called Takmeed.

"The reasons for female genital cutting vary from one place to another, even within the same country,' Stolba said. The most common reasons given in Yemen are cleanliness and religious/cultural tradition, as well as a common belief that the practice serves to temper female sexual urges.

"Those who support the practice claim it's an important part of the ritual of becoming a woman. Some groups suggest it has religious significance, especially common among conservative Muslims. However, it's important to note that there is no doctrinal basis for female genital cutting in either Islam or Christianity. Furthermore, there are no Qur'anic citations that support this practice," she explained.

#### **Challenges and efforts**

FGM is not a priority issue for any Yemeni group, as men don't talk about the custom and women seem content with the situation because they think it's sanctioned by religion. Not many choose to talk about FGM politically or developmentally due to fear from conservative segments of the population. Moreover, there's no law against FGM in Yemen; however, a January 9, 2001 ministerial decree prohibits the practice in both government and private health facili-

Despite public sensitivity about the issue, campaigns to eliminate FGM are being conducted in some regions. In a departure from the past, some of the largest public and private NGOs devoted to women's issues are running public awareness campaigns.

Conservative groups have rejected international assistance to fight female genital cutting. Some consider foreign funding for public education initiatives a form of meddling or a conspiracy to cast a negative image on non-Western cultures. Others defend the practice and condemn international and local organizations that advocate eliminating it," Stolba

"It's crucial for local groups where FGM is practiced to be involved and advocate its elimination. Outsiders' interference can only make matters worse if they're not working closely with local groups. However, outsiders may work collaboratively with local women's organizations to facilitate access to funding or provide technical assistance, if needed," she

"It's important to realize that the battle to eliminate female genital cutting is a process that starts with educating parents and community leaders about its negative health impact on girls' and women's health," Stolba emphasized.

According to her, this process can be conducted by increased funding to government health care agencies to educate and train health care practitioners, increased public education efforts by NGOs and other entities and sensitive yet informative media campaigns. "In time, this practice can be eliminated gradually" she added.

An important aspect of such effort will be to take this campaign to conservative rural areas via government health care practitioners at rural clinics, training and re-educating traditional midwives and community education efforts by NGOs working in

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# French photographer exhibits Yemen photos

e Xavier Lambours exhibited 80 photos in a exhibition that kicked off June 6 at the Henri de Monfreid Cultural Center (French Cultural Center) in Sana'a. The collection depicts the French photographer's experience in Yemen, which began with his first visit in 1975. Back in France, his Yemen photos allowed him to have a career in a photo establishment.

"At that time, Yemen was a new place for Europeans," he recollected. "It wasn't easy to come. I came as an unguided tourist and traveled by taxi with locals, which I liked, because I wanted to travel on my own and get close to Yemenis."

Arriving in Sana'a, Lambours visited various other cities including Sa'ada, Jibla, Ibb, Thula, Hodeidah, Bait Al-Faqeeh, Zabid, Mokha and Taiz. His second visit occurred in July 2004.

"Yemen has changed a lot now," he noted. "In 1975, the population of Sana'a was estimated at 50,000 and they were mainly in the Old City, whereas in 2004, the Old City appeared

very small to me in the wide expanse of the new part. The whole city houses millions of people."

However, he indicated that Yemeni customs remain the same, as does its people's mentality in that they are very friendly and welcome guests.

#### Qat a major threat

Lambours mentioned that qat is more prevalent now than before. "It not only affects people, but also the environment. We find that plastic bags are ubiquitous and this is detrimental to the environment. It's serious pollution," he added.

In his photos, Lambours doesn't mean to accommodate tourist attractions. Rather, he captures realistic moments from the streets, worksites, landscapes, mountainscapes, etc.

#### Black and white and color photos

Half of Lambours' 80-photograph collection is black and white while the other half is color. "The black and white are classical. In Yemen, I think I've done everything I wanted in black and white and now I've begun using color. Black and white makes certain scenes stronger and makes it easy to go to the hearts of people. Using color, I go to another world. When people see my photos, I want them to enter my world. When they go to Yemen, I want them to recognize my view of Yemen. It's my personal view of Yemen," he explained

However, Lambours said he still is discovering the right color for Yemen. His choice of scenes is impulsive – when he sees something really compelling, he snaps it. "The scene must be worthy," he noted.

Lambours still is working on a photosupported book written by him and others. Photos to be included mostly aren't tourist-oriented because he chooses to depict real people and show different things "In beautiful books, we provide the same boringly beautiful things, but I want to offer an interesting book. I want people to ask questions," he explained.
