Suspects indifferent and hailed for Bin Laden

Prosecutor & judge quit tribunal

The eighth hearing session in the tribunal of the 15 alleged al-Qaeda suspects, one of them still at large, on charges of blowing up a French Tanker and other terrorists operations turned into a debate between the prosecutor and the suspects, which led the prosecutor to prematurely quit the hearing. The hearing, which was boycotted by the advocates because of the refusal of the prosecution to provide them with copies of the investigation reports, started Saturday with the presentation of some evidence by the prosecution. President Saleh orders hostilities cessation

President Ali Abdullah Saleh, last Wednesday 21st July, gave orders to

cease military operations against Sheik Hussain Badruddin Al Houthi and his followers in Haidan district of Saadah Governorate, North of Yemen.

Those orders came after bloody confrontation between the army, the security and Sheik Al Houthi and his more twothousand strong followers, calling themselves the "Believing Youth". Hostilities have so far continued for (34) days. Following of what is said of mediation carried out by a number of leading religious men including Sheik Mohammed

Government sources said that "military operations were ceased since midnight of last Wednesday to give chance for the mediators to go to Sheik Al-Houthi to convince him to surrender himself to Major General Mohammed Al-Qassemi, Chief of staff who is to be entrusted with providing protection to Al-Houthi and accompany him to the Capital Sana'a and then to stand trial".

While official sources attributed the president's decision to authorities intention to avoid more bloodshed, political sources viewed that the step came as a result of casualties and material losses, expected to increase had the hostilities continued with Al-Houthi and his insurgents who during the past days proved to be stronger than what was expected and that the number of his men had increased. Improved travel advice to Yemen

The United Kingdom announced last week that it had revised its travel warning to Yemen which could help encourage British tourists to visit

The British Foreign Office lifted its warning against non-essential travel, once viewed as a potential target of terrorist attacks.

"Any positive changes in travel advice definitely enhance Yemen's tourism industry," said Taha Al-Mahbashi, Executive Director of Tourism Promotion Board. "Warnings have had a very negative effect on tourism as companies will not cover Yemen when they follow warnings from the governments.'

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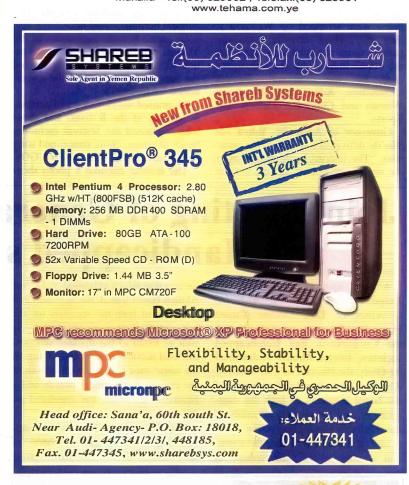
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Saadah on the plate of fire

After thirty days of bloody confrontations between Saadah tribes which support Al-Houthi and the government forces, President Saleh took the decision of treaty and is beginning negotiations with Al-Houthi and his supporters. President Saleh's new mediators started their tasks last Thursday; they were headed by a man more welcome to Al-Houthi's militants who is Shiekh Hames Al-Owjari, and Othman Mujally, a member of the Yemen Deputies council. Shiekh Hames Al-Owjari has entered into controversy with the local authorities and military ones as well in his refusal to hand over the father of Hussain Badruddin Al-Houthi who came to the tormer seeking safe refuge

Meanwhile, though the battles over in the Mran mountains between Al-

Houthi's supporters and the Army forces have calmed, other battles and confrontations are about to flame out between Abdullah Al-Rezamy and the military campaign which was prepared to besiege the former and compel him to extradite himself. The sources expected that the war curl in Al-Oshash villages in Nushoor area will flame out between Al-Rezamy, the parliament ex-deputy, and the forces tending towards the area.

Other sources have mentioned that Al-Rezamy has handed over the leadership "Believing Youth party's leadership" to a person called Ben Laaser, one of the shiekhs of Hamdan tribes, after his heading to his district.

Ben Laaser leads approximately 800 militants from his tribesmen who are supporting him. Multi-leaderships are lot; even if Hussain Badruddin Al-Houthi fell into the hands of the State, the battles will continue as per some

sources make it clear, as the forces left behind seeds for revenge and feuds, as a result of their attitudes over there.

The forces have used lethal weapons and utilized petroleum, as a weapon to destroy the mountains in which Al-Houthi and his followers are believed to be. The forces have burned the mountains, but when the infantry soldiers proceed, they normally face fierce resistance. In fact, Saadah will not be salvaged from gorilla raids in the towns where explosions and fire shootings are heard in the province every night during periods of battle. Al-Houthi's supporters have used other tactics by tending towards gorilla raids and hitting the army rear and setting ambushes which resulted in big losses to the forces; some of which reaching to hundreds, although we do not yet know the limit of the losses directly via Al-Houthi sources estimated it at approximately 260 fatalities until now.

Yemeni Journalists Syndicate hosts Minister of Human Rights

The Yemeni Journalists Syndicate hosted on Monday July 19th, the Minister of Human Rights, Ms. Amat Al-Aleem Al-Soswah.

The Minister presented a lecture, to a number of journalists and the board of the syndicate in order to shed some light on the legislation that organizes the press, in light of the President's directive to reconsider the Press Law with the objective of eradicating the imprisonment of journalists.

The Minister urged journalists to be active and to present a project at reflecting their vision towards the amendments of the Press Law.

On Wednesday, the reaching information group held its first meeting at the Yemeni Journalists Syndicate, with the presence of the syndicate's secretary general Mr. Hafedh Al-Bukari and first undersecretary Mr. Saeed Thabit.

The group agreed to conduct a comprehensive study relating to the problems journalists encounter in obtaining information and in attempting to reach reliable sources and the availability of search mechanisms as basic rights of journalists. The participants also

agreed to prepare a study regarding the role and responsibilities of journalists and mass media, in developing the case to obtain information, by highlighting the obstacles standing against journalists and the free flow of official infor-

Commencing these studies came in preparation of a broad meeting of Yemeni journalists to be held next September, to discuss these important issues and within the framework of cooperation between the syndicate and Danish program, as promised, to develop the information sector in Yemen.

Mr. Hassan Al-Zaidi, Chief of the news division at the Yemen Times will present a working paper underlining the obstacles and difficulties that face news editors at private, independent and political party newspapers, in obtaining information and the accessibility to sources. The working paper will touch upon the mechanisms and methods of how to search for information and on the issue of news editors of some media organizations lacking the

Al-Shoura council discusses Yemeni expatriates' situations

Al-Shoura Council, chaired by Mr. Abdul Aziz Abdul Ghani concluded on Tuesday 20th July a two day discussion on the situation of Yemeni expatriates living in a number of Arab and foreign countries, based on the report filed by the Council's Political, Foreign Relations and Expatriates Affairs Committee.

The report consisted of an oversight and an evaluation related to the current situation of Yemeni expatriates

The council's discussions and comments focused on the measures that ought to be taken and adopted to improve the situations of Yemeni living abroad.

At the conclusion of the discussions, a sub-committee of some members from the main committee and other concerned authorities, was formed in order to formulate the final recommendations and suggestions, before transferring them to the related authorities to take appropriate measures.

Third specialized course concluded on bee breeding

The activities of the third course on bee raising were wrapped up Thursday at the Bee Raising Development Project in Osaifira, Taiz. It was organized by the project from July 17th to 22nd with the participation of 15 trainees and from different governorates.

Participants were given information on how to raise bee queens, select categories, and examine hives for the purpose of maintaining the quality of the internationally renowned Yemeni

The project is planning other similar courses in the coming period that are meant for preserving the good reputation of Yemeni honey as it is a national wealth, contributing hard currency to the public treasury.

It is believed that Ambassador Hull personally supervised the assassination of Ali Al-Harethy a member of an alleged Al-Qaeda Organization in Yemen (and six of his guards), by a missile launched from an unmanned US warplane.

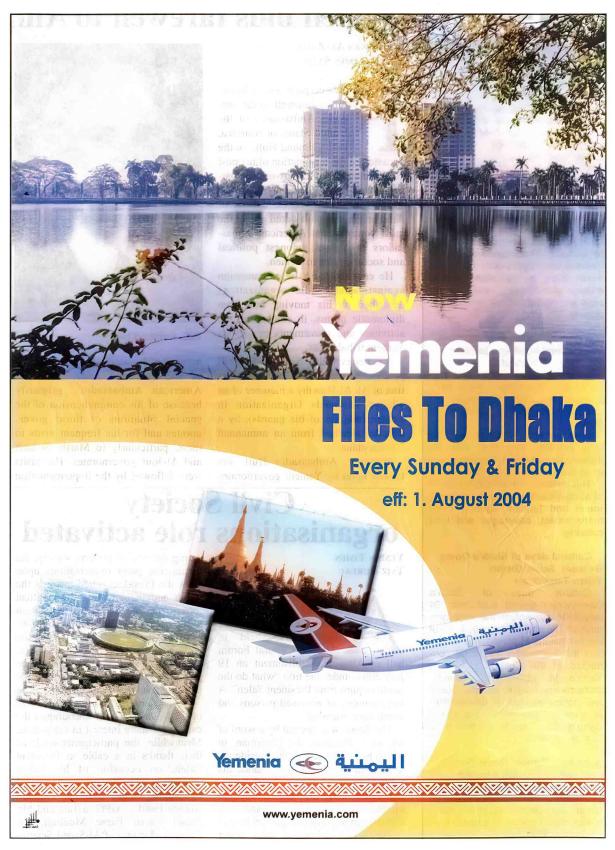
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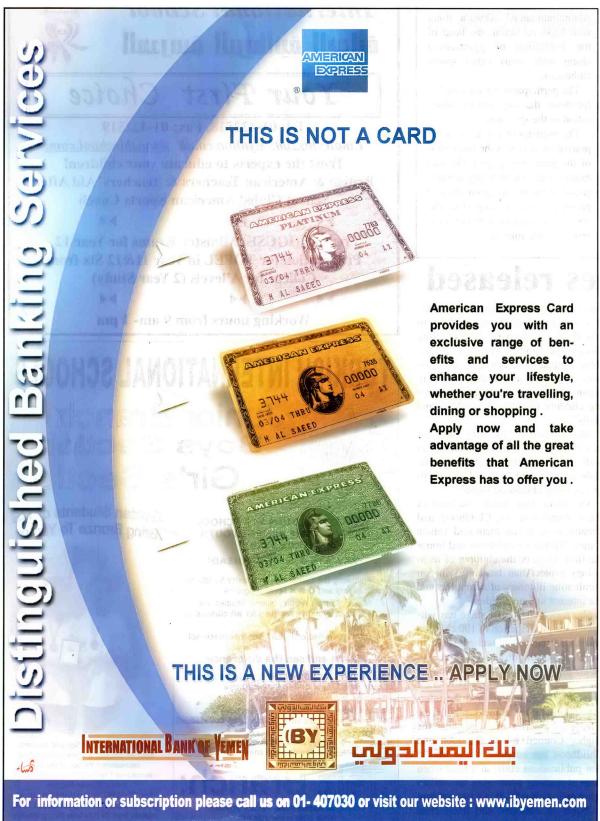
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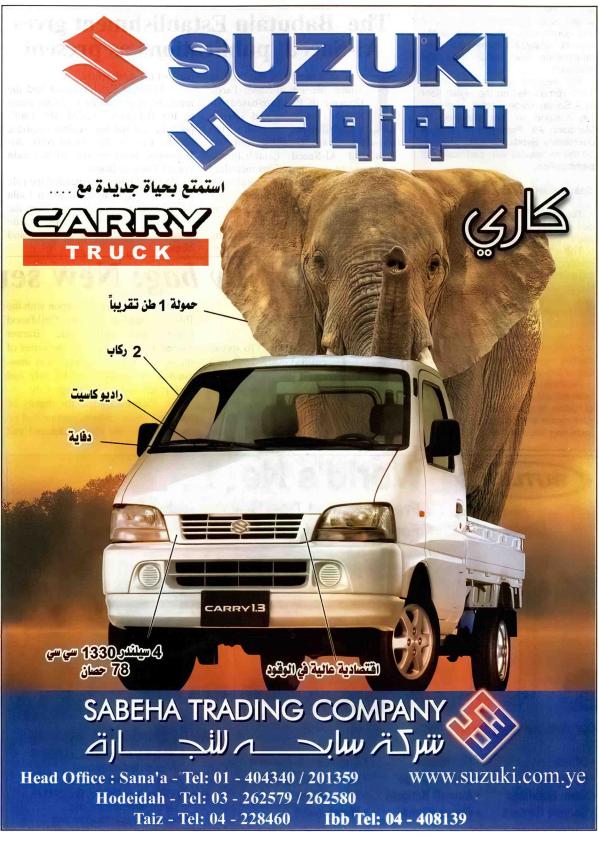
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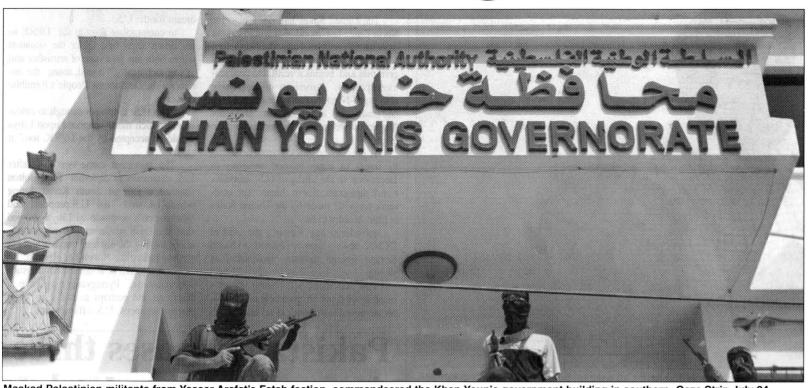








Gunmen storm Gaza govt office, challenge Arafat



Masked Palestinian militants from Yasser Arafat's Fatah faction commandeered the Khan Younis government building in southern Gaza Strip July 24. The militants demanded the Palestinian president fire a nephew recently appointed as security chief, witnesses said.

GAZA. July 24 (Reuters) -Palestinian militants seized a government building in the Gaza Strip on Saturday but left peacefully after saying President Yasser Arafat had agreed to reinstate comrades dismissed from the national security forces.

Dozens of gunmen from al-Aqsa Martyrs Brigades stormed the governorate of Khan Younis town at dawn, causing no casualties but dealing a new blow to an Arafat-led Palestinian Authority beset by corruption allegations and widespread civil unrest.

Hours earlier, unidentified Palestinians torched a two-storey police station in the nearby village of al-

"We are trying to determine who took advantage of the instability in the Palestinian territories to commit this crime," Mayor Ahmed Abu Zayyid said. Al-Aqsa denied involvement.

The masked militants in Khan Younis demanded the Palestinian president fire Moussa Arafat, a nephew of Arafat whose appointment to a top security post last weekend sparked armed standoffs with reformist vigilantes who flooded Gaza's streets in

But by noon, the leader of the barricaded gunmen said they had decided to quit the governorate after receiving assurances that 11 fellow al-Aqsa men who had been dismissed from jobs with the security forces by Moussa Arafat would be reinstated.

"The crisis is over, as we received a decision by President Yasser Arafat to stop the dismissal," the leader, Abu al-Haj, told Reuters by telephone.

Al-Aqsa, a disparate group of Fatah young bloods, has spearheaded a revolt that erupted in September 2000 after talks on Palestinian statehood in Israeli-occupied Gaza and the West Bank stalled. Its members have also grown vocal, and violent, in challenging the old guard's grip on Palestinian government

A senior Palestinian Authority official confirmed the 11 men were employed by the security services, but

denied that they had ever been dismissed or moonlighted as al-Aqsa mili-

"This has all been a misunderstanding," said Major-General Faisal Abu Sharaikh, head of Arafat's bodyguard

Pointing to the al-Aqsa link, Israel and the United States accuse Arafat of encouraging Palestinian violence. He denies it. The Palestinian president shuffled security chiefs on Monday, but did not dismiss his nephew. He has also scrambled to head off a resignation threat by Palestinian Prime Minister Ahmed Qurie, who demands long-awaited reform of security forces.

Iraq and Syria to form border security committee

Syria and Iraq will form a committee to improve security along their long desert border, which Washington says anti-U.S. insurgents use to infiltrate Iraq, the countries' prime ministers said on Saturday. After a series of meetings in Damascus, Iraqi Prime Minister Iyad Allawi said the two countries had agreed to look at how to better control the 600-km (375mile) frontier, which Washington and Baghdad see as a serious source of instability in Iraq.

"We have ... formed a joint committee to look at these issues (border and security) in detail in the future, in the weeks ahead," Allawi told a news conference.

"Syria has seen terrorism in earlier days. even by the old regime in Iraq when Saddam tried to inflict a lot of damage on the Syrian people and kill a lot of Syrian civilians. Now it's time for us to close ranks."

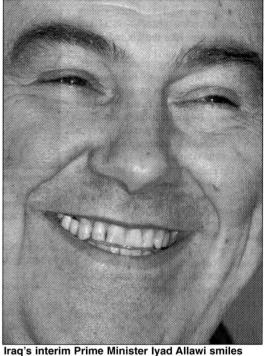
U.S. officials have repeatedly accused Syria of failing to do enough to keep anti-U.S. militants from crossing into Iraq, though the U.S. military acknowledges that foreign fighters account for few of the guerrilla suspects it has detained.

No talks until Arab militias disarm, Darfur rebel

KHARTOUM, July 24 (Reuters) - A rebel leader from Sudan's troubled western Darfur region said on Saturday his group would not talk to the government until it honoured commitments to disarm Arab militias. Justice and Equality Movement (JEM) leader Khalil Ibrahim's statement cast doubt on a United Nations announcement that Darfur's two main rebel groups were ready for talks to help end what the U.N. says is the world's worst humanitarian crisis. "JEM will not have any direct contact with the government and will not start any political negotiations ... until the government meets preconditions which are the terms of the ceasefire signed ... on April 8," Ibrahim said from Eritrea.

The JEM has set disarmament of the Arab militias, known as Janjaweed, as a key precondition.

The rebels and Khartoum have accused each other of truce violations. The JEM and the Sudan Liberation Movement (SLM) launched a revolt against Khartoum last year, charging the government with arming the Janjaweed to loot and burn black African villages.

U.N. spokesman Fred Eckhard said on Friday the JEM and SLM had agreed at a Geneva meeting with special U.N. adviser Mohamed Sahnoun to participate in "substantive political negotiations" on Darfur.

Peace talks hosted by the Africa Union were suspended last week when rebels walked out after Khartoum rejected some of their preconditions.

The U.N. estimates at least 30,000 people have been killed in the Darfur crisis and that around 1.5 million have been made homeless.

A U.S. congressional resolution this week branded atrocities in Darfur as

Oil pipeline ablaze north of Baghdad, witness

TIKRIT, Iraq, July 24 (Reuters) An explosion set fire to an oil pipeline north of Baghdad on Saturday,

witnesses and an oil refinery official said. Witness Ali Mchammed Samarrai said he heard the blast and saw the pipeline catch fire at a point just southwest of the town of Samarra, 100 km (60 miles) north of Baghdad. An official at Iraq's main northern oil refinery at Baiji, 180 km (110 miles) north of Baghdad, said the blaze was on a pipeline that carries oil from the refinery to Baghdad.

Guerrillas frequently attack Iraq's oil infrastructure, setting explosives under pipelines in an effort to disrupt the country's reconstruction.

The pipeline attacked on Saturday was a subsidiary line and not Iraq's main northern oil export line which runs north to Turkey.

That line has also regularly been sabotaged and is currently out of commission, with no oil flowing to the port

Kuwait says it was also target for Qaeda suspects

KUWAIT, July 24 (Reuters) - A group of suspected al Qaeda supporters arrested in Kuwait for recruiting militants to attack U.S. troops in Iraq also planned to strike targets in Kuwait, an Interior Ministry official said on Saturday.

"The maps found with them revealed that they also had plans to attack foreign troops in Kuwait, as well as Iraq," the official told Reuters.

Kuwait said on Saturday at least 12 suspected al Qaeda supporters had been arrested since last week and authorities were searching for two more on suspicion of indoctrinating young people in radical Islamist ideology and helping them enter Iraq via Syria to fight foreign

The official said police had arrested at least three of the 12 men after interrogating four Kuwaiti youths recently handed over by Syria.

Two of them managed to enter Iraq and leave earlier, and the other two were arrested while attempting to infiltrate

The Interior Ministry identified Kuwaiti nationals Khaled Abdullah al-Dossari and Ahmed Mohamed al-Mutairi as suspected al Qaeda

supporters on the run.

Iraq, he added.

It called on citizens and residents to contact the ministry with any information on the two men. All suspects had been referred to the Public Prosecution where they would be further questioned. the official said. The father of another Kuwaiti caught in Iraq, 16-year-old Abdul Rahman Mubarak al-Bathaly. said on Saturday his son would be handed over to Kuwait by the Red Cross

within days. "My son called me yesterday and told me that he has been released from Abu Ghraib (prison), and that he will be returning home within a few days," said Mubarak al-Bathaly, adding his son had illegally entered Iraq via Svria in January.

He said his son was accused only of illegally entering Iraq and was not connected with the group in Kuwait.

Kuwait has tightened security after a surge in violence in Iraq and Saudi Arabia.

It has also launched a crackdown on Islamists opposed to the presence of U.S. forces, which used Kuwait as a launchpad for last year's war against

The official also said authorities were investigating any possible presence of terror networks in Kuwait.

Terrorism top target of leading Indonesian candidate

BOGOR, Indonesia, July 24 (Reuters) - Indonesia's leading presidential candidate vowed on Saturday to intensify the war against terror if he won September's election, saying terrorism was the biggest challenge faced by the country.

Former security minister Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono, who is leading the vote count in the first-round of election on July 5, looks set to face incumbent President Megawati Sukarnoputri in a September 20 run-off.

How the candidates approach terrorism in Indonesia — hit by the October 2002 Bali bombings that killed 202 people, as well as other violent incidents in recent years — is of key interest to allies like the United States and to investors

"I think one thing is sure, that terrorism is our biggest fundamental threat," Yudhoyono, an ex-general, told Reuters in an interview in the West Java hill town of Bogor near his home.

"I think we have to protect our own people. We have to maintain our security across the country.

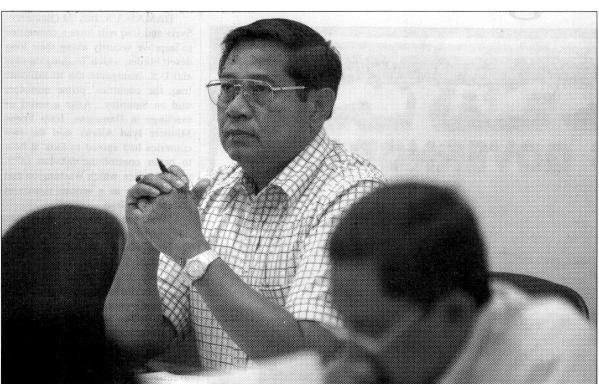
"He said that included intensified efforts in intelligence, police and immigration operations as well as international cooperation.

Yudhoyono, who with most votes counted leads Megawati 34 percent to 26 percent in the first round tally, was speaking between a graduate class at a university where he is pursuing a doctorate in economics and the filming of a campaign commercial.

Three other candidates contested in July but only the top two go through to the run-off, required if no one wins a

Yudhoyono's tough anti-terror stance is not liked by all in the world's most populous Muslim nation, where some call it anti-Islamic. He vehemently rejected that criticism.

"Actually it is the obligation of Indonesian leaders, Indonesian ministers to combat terrorism and there is no direct connection between terrorism and Islam," he said, adding that terror-

ism can be committed by many groups and religions.

"I am Muslim myself. I am praying.

I practice in Islamic teaching, so this is really irrelevant," said Yudhoyono, who had military training in the United States and earned a degree

Yudhoyono said he was still studying a court decision on Friday that said parts of Indonesia's anti-terrorism laws were unconstitutional, but added: "I don't think that Indonesia will reduce its seriousness to combat

terrorism." Terrorism is not Indonesia's only problem with violence.

It suffers from sporadic ethnic and religious clashes and is fighting two simmering separatist rebellions, the most serious in its resource-rich far northwest province of Aceh.

"A military solution alone can't solve the problems in Aceh," Yudhoyono said, specifying that social, economic and political efforts in the province needed to be intensified.

He suggested that "reconciliation and rehabilitation" were needed in other trouble spots where violence has flared since he left the cabinet in March after a spat with Megawati that drew sympathy for him as the perceived underdog.

Despite soaring personal popularity

since then, Yudhoyono's Democrat Party won just 10 percent of parliament seats in an April 5 election, far behind Megawati's party and Golkar, the former vehicle of long-time authoritarian ruler Suharto. Yudhovono said that while if elected he would try to form a governing coalition: "It's not necessary that the executive is weak compared with the authority possessed by the parliament.'

On endemic corruption, a major concern for investors, he said: "I will lead by myself in the war on corruption by giving examples, making sure every single rupiah should be audited." "I'm looking for a tough man to be appointed as attorney general," added

N.Korea rejects U.S. nuclear proposal, ministry

Pakistan releases three in proliferation probe

ISLAMABAD, July 24 (Reuters) -Pakistani authorities have released three aides to disgraced nuclear scientist Abdul Qadeer Khan after holding them for months in a probe relating to a huge proliferation scandal, officials said on Saturday.

Military spokesman Major-General Shaukat Sultan said out of about a dozen people detained late last year for questioning, the government was now holding only one, but added the investigation was not over.

"We have released all of them except one," he told Reuters.

Sultan said Mohammad Farooq, a key associate of Khan, was still being

"The investigations have not yet been concluded and anybody could be called back whenever it is needed."

The three men released on Friday were Dr. Nazeer Ahmed, a former nuclear scientist, and two retired military officers, Sajawal Khan and Ehsan-ul-Haq, who were connected to the country's top uranium enrichment facility until it was headed by Khan in 2001. Khan, praised at home as the father of the country's nuclear programme, confessed in February in a televised address that he sold nuclear secrets to Libya, Iran and North Korea.

The government sacked him as special adviser but President Pervez Musharraf pardoned him in recognition of his role in developing a nuclear weapon for the Muslim nation. Khan has virtually been under house detention since the probe was launched against him and his network spanning across

Southeast Asia winning war on terror, Malaysia PM

KUALA LUMPUR, July 24 (Reuters) - Southeast Asia was winning the war against terror but could not yet declare victory, Malaysian Prime Minister Abdullah Badawi said, a day after his intelligence chief warned of fresh attacks.

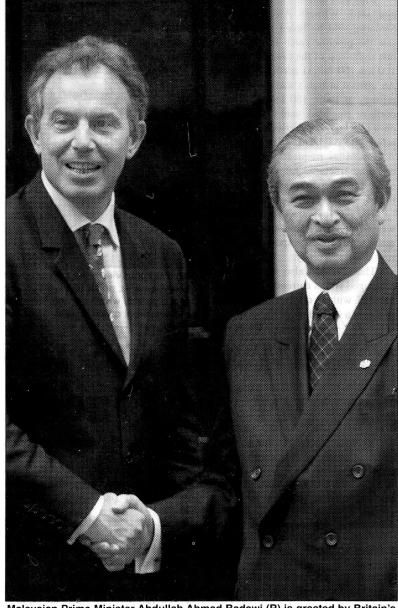
"I think we are winning that war ... not completely but we are watching very, very carefully and we believe that soon we should see no more threat," Abdullah told the BBC in an interview broadcast on Saturday.

"I'm not looking for a date to declare victory." Abdullah's comments, recorded during a visit to Britain this week, were aired barely 24 hours after Malaysian police said remnants of the al Qaeda-linked Jemaah Islamiah (JI) were regrouping to plan more attacks in Southeast Asia.

Believed to be the Southeast Asian arm of Osama bin Laden's al Qaeda network, JI is suspected of carrying out the Bali nightclub blasts in Indonesia two years ago that killed 202 people, mostly foreign tourists. Abdullah said that although the regional terror arm had not been completely destroyed, "I think...if there is any more, we are able to contain

Dozens of JI members have been arrested in the Philippines, Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia and Indonesia over the last two years, although many more are believed to be at large. "A big group of them are preserving their strength while reorganising themselves," Mohamad Yusof Abdul Rahman, head of the Malaysian police's Special Branch, told a conference on terrorism in Kuala Lumpur on

Police and intelligence officials say JI, which seeks to establish an Islamic state across much of Southeast Asia, has also planned or carried out other attacks in the region.

Mali calls for help to fight locust swarms

BAMAKO, July 24 (Reuters) - Mali urged international donors on Saturday to help the government fight locusts swarms which threaten to destroy vital food crops in the West African country.

West Africa is facing its worst locust crisis for 15 years with swarms moving rapidly south from Algeria and Mauritania.

Forty-two swarms have already been spotted in Mali and Communication Minister Gaoussou Drabo said serious damage was already visible in some grassland areas.

'We are threatened with a locust invasion...Every day we receive new reports (of locust swarms)," Drabo, who is also acting agriculture minister, said on the sidelines of a meeting with international development agen-

Drabo said Mali could afford about half of the locust-fighting campaign and needed an extra \$1 million to treat some 100,000 hectares with pesticides — which experts say is the minimum it must do to protect its crops from the locusts. Desert locust swarms, which can contain as many as 80 million insects per square km, can travel more than 130 km (81 miles) in a day. Adults can eat roughly their own



locust of swarms threatening vital food crops in Mali

weight, or about two grams, of food every day and swarms can devastate entire crop fields in a matter of min-

The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organisation says the locust crisis is the most serious in West Africa since a 1987-1989 plague which cost more than \$300 million to contain. Some \$9 million has been pledged to help this year's campaign.

The desert locusts have shifted from breeding areas in northwestern Africa and moved south to countries such as Mauritania, Senegal and Mali. They are likely to multiply over the

next few weeks, the FAO said earlier

Fiery S.Africa highway smash kills 14

Lie or naivety?

oday, we are witnessing one of the most bizarre situations in political history. The report recently released in the USA about the 911 event revealed that there is no connection between Iraq and the incident, and confirmed many shortages in intelligence and administrative bodies. Concurrently, reports issued in the USA, UK, and Australia investigating the intelligence that formulated the reasons for war on Iraq, have shown outrageous mistakes in calculations and predictions, which led to the war catastrophe. All of these reports confirmed the doubts of millions throughout the world that the war on Iraq was not based on accurate information, and was not at all justifiable.

But again, the three leaders of the US, UK, and Australia are defiant and continue to insist that the war was the right choice and that Iraq constituted a danger to the world's peace. Many diplomats, intellectuals, and the general public in most countries of the world, find it difficult to understand from where these leaders find the audacity to claim that what they did was right.

Last week in Iraq, fighting, kidnappings, incidents of violence, and continued chaos was still adding to the problems faced by the Iraqi people, who continue to suffer from a war that was opposed by most of the world's population.

Looking at the situation of Iraq of today makes us all worried about the future of this country. It makes us ask whether the war was carried out for hidden objectives and used the allegation of weapons of mass destruction as a means to achieve them. In this case, the claim may be considered an intended lie to disguise the plan. On the other hand, the alleged failure of the intelligence agencies of the US, UK, and Australia, may make some believe that it was the naivety of the countries' governments that led to this miscalculation.

Whether it was a lie or not, it is too late for blame and accusations, but it is rather wiser to begin thinking about the future of Iraq and of the world. Yes, it is possible to rebuild Iraq and establish a democratic government there. But eventually, if Iraq is to ever stand strong, it cannot be forever over-shadowed by unanswered questions about its inception or the moral ambiguity of its basis. Hence, I believe there will always be a scar on the efforts to rebuild Iraq and the country's future. This scar will never go away unless people know whether the WMDs allegation was a lie or simply, a naivety of the US intelligence and government.

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We and reforms in Yemen (6)

eforms begin with modernization and change, modernization should coincide with every new development, in order to keep up with what's going on in the world. We in Yemen need a revolutionary set of reforms, in the broad sense of the definition of reforms. The reforms strategy must not be limited to slogans, chanted on special occasions. At the same time, we do not want the general public to lose the enthusiasm that has arisen since the President's declaration of his campaign to fight corruption wherever it might be.

Mr. President, we need a new type of government and a responsible press. We want the government to sense that it is being monitored by another alternative government-in-waiting, and that there is another government waiting to take over and to commence missions and duties when the current government fails to effectively carry its required duties. We want a standby government that is setting itself up to bear the responsibilities the other has failed to carry out. We want everyone to have a sense of responsibility and to compete and to be innovative for the best interest of society, that is if we really want to catch up with others ahead

We do not want to feel that the changes are limited to only changing ministers, ineffective by-laws and primitive concepts, but also includes encouraging a new government with claws, that could fight corruption, bureaucracy, and handover 'corrupts' to the judiciary, to receive the punishment they deserve in accordance with effective laws. A government that would be able to attract new investment, to alleviate poverty, to improve living conditions and to build the trust and confidence of the public, and raising expectations of a brighter future. A government that would reconsider the ill and ineffective policies with the aim of rectifying the deficiencies it encounters. A government that would sincerely launch giant projects, which would make a difference to the economy. The public does not want to feel that there is a long way ahead before achieving that. We want to prepare for a more honest and fairer local councils, parliamentary and presidential elections.

After 14 years since the unification of the country, and ten years of governance by the ruling party, ordinary citizens want to see genuine changes at all levels, so that they can believe in the rhetoric, the prom-

ises and the truth of intentions that are proclaimed in carnivals and on special occasions. They have had enough of chaos, price hikes and lack of security in their daily lives.

We agree and admit that previous crises have influenced every aspect and thus, changes include persons, mentality and perceptions. Civic society organizations and civil liberties must be encouraged and supported. They are the prerequisites to achieving a strong and viable economy.

We want each minister to be independent and yet accountable for all of his actions. We want ministers and heads of banks and corporations to be leaders and not employers. The first reform measure must be to implement a free market economy in reality, that would be based on organized and well-prepared policies, not just what some randomly call for. Regrettably this is utterly absent and subsequently, the changes continue to be merely related to individuals, places and based on the same policy. I bet that the sought changes would come as to meet the desire of the public. But it is important to have an awareness of the importance of having and handling them wisely. Any crisis that arises must be confronted immediately and effectively rather than waiting and prolonging its remedy for years. Problems such as an ineffective educational system; a government that controls media organizations; an economy that lacks practical mechanisms to revive it; and crippled political parties with only marginal freedom have led to a lose of trust and confidence in the government and its performance. In contrast, organizations have offered suggestions and solutions to emerge from this situation on many occasions. The participation of the private sector is critical when preparing for, or before introducing, new legislation related to reformation, in order to avoid

any discrepancies or conflicts of interest. I strongly believe that the keys to reformation and modernization of Yemen lay in the hands of the President. I would present the following points that constitute a threshold to conduct changes whenever he wants to commence to do so:

- · Adopting an effective and efficient
- administrative reform program. • Creating trust between the banking sector and clients, importers, and investors and easing policing and monitoring measures against employees at the banking sec-
- undertaking privatization programs by rates that coincide with economic growth, including the privatization of certain government funding banks and companies

and allotting shares for employees working in them.

• Intensifying efforts to diagnose the reasons behind the current markets stagnation with the aim to find remedies to come

· working to create legislation stability and judicial reform that could decisively settle disputes especially those against state corporations and corrupt civil and military officials.

We also demand the development and promotion of exports through some urgent measures, the most of which are:

- Tax exemptions for locally produced
- or manufactured goods for export. · Reducing custom tariffs on heavy

It is people who bring development

ne of the big problems that developing countries are confronting is in finding a clear path towards overcoming the hurdles that stand in the way of achieving the right venue for continuous economic growth and sound management of existing economic assets and available resources. This is quite clear to most of the governments of developing countries, but beyond that most governments of developing countries tend to view development as merely gathering some physical assets and plants and thus all efforts are directed towards this task, with little or superficial attention to the more important aspect of development: the human side. Oh yes, many a developing country will tell you. 'Look at the number of schools we have built, or the number of vaccinations we have made, etc." This kind of information is significant, but what kind of influence are these numbers having on the real important indicators of development: quality of output of the education system, the number of skilled technicians and professionals, the decrease in rapid population growth and the number of additional jobs created, etc? The experience in Yemen and many of the other least development countries of the world is that the reliance on quantitative tallies of physical substance to project their level of development tends to overlook some very fundamental aspects of development. These aspects are of a primarily qualitative nature, but without them no quantitative projection of development achievement can have value. These qualitative aspects will show the true levels of achievement, because they are primarily dealing with the human side of development and will truly reflect the extent to which development is having its desired effects on the element of the society that matters the most: the people of the land.

On the international theater, experienced has shown that ocieties that harness a healthy portion of their development efforts towards upgrading the human resources in the society have succeeded in overcoming the hurdles that stand in the way of development. Not only that, such societies have actually more to show in quantitative terms of physical attributes than those who focused all their attention on gathering a few assets here and there and neglected to look at the human resources that will benefit from such assets and run them sustainably. Even in countries, where there is a very timid natural resource base, such as Japan, or to come closer to home, Jordan, development was attained in all its true manifestations, because the human resource base was the focus of attention on their development plans.

We in Yemen have gone a long way since the pre Revolutionary period and many in Yemen have been able to uplift their standard of living significantly from what it was like in their own childhood years. But, there are many who will attest that there is much inequity in our development strides. Moreover, we have not really developed the right human resource base that can see opportunities and make use of the appropriate facilities that will enable them to take advantage of these opportunities. Moreover, we need to have a fundamental review of our educational system and how it is able to translate the learning experience into the lives of the people and into productive capacity. In other words, it is not enough to know that there is an internet in the world and in the end have to rely on foreign expertise to help us stay connected to the rest of the world, while our people are still not capable of even knowing the many useful things that can be obtained through the internet, thus making up for all the lacking sources of information and facilities for cultural enhancement. On the other hand, to make sure that there are adequate services for the people in the major cities, while neglecting the overall majority of the people who live in the rural areas of the country, even for such basic things as proper schooling, is bound to leave a sizable portion of the population out of touch with develop-

One of the essential elements of development is to have development programs that rely on participatory community management of projects and programs. This is not just after a program or project have been implemented, but in the pre implementation stages of planning and design. The Yemeni development effort in its earlier stages was in fact based on such an approach and many of us remember very well how active local development cooperative associations went along way to bringing important development projects to event the remotest parts of the country. What made the cooperative schemes of the mid 1970s so successful? They were fairly democratic in nature and depended on trans parency and accountability of the officers of the associations. When the government decided to reduce the autonomy of the cooperative movement, it brought participatory development work to a standstill.

One was hoping that with the Law of Local Authorities. the local communities will be able to regain some of their empowerment over harnessing development resources and managing the assets acquired through the infrastructure projects already implemented, but the observer is inclined to suggest that there has been little progress in getting local communities to take the initiative and move forward on their own. The Central Government has yet to relinquish a lot to the authority, which the Law supposedly turned over to local government. Moreover, access to the resources required for these local authorities to function viably is still under tight central control, even if these resources were obtained locally.

If the people are the ones best able to determine their needs wherever they live in the country, then it should be the people who should be allowed to set their own plans and carry out the projects that they really need. Moreover, greater empowerment of the people means better transparency and more credible accountability. We have sufficient proof that a tightly net centralized regime can never be a guarantee that these important elements of governance are there, not to mention the avenues for corruption that such regimes usually open up.

Development administration hits success and justice for all

evelopment administration in Yemen, as in other developing countries, is still weak in its performance and the proportion of its production does not reach a rate of 35%, compared to the advanced administration in developed countries. It is therefore in need of training, qualification, and providing it with knowledge, developed information in

order to achieve its goals fully.

What urges us to tackle the importance of developed administration is the people's search for justice and equality in rights and duties inside official administrative machinery or in dealing with the citizens. There are ongoing reforms led by the government to attain the development and productive objectives of the proper scientific administration. It is to be remarked that the program of administrative reforms has allocated a financial budget and the government has external grants and loans to carry out financial reforms at an expensive cost in order to attain the developed advanced administration.

Nevertheless, the development administration in Yemen requires more training for its cadres' in short training courses or seminars or training workshops on programs of limited effect because many of many of leading administrators, reaching about 45%, are basically in no possession of capability of qualification during a short period because originally they bear rather low degrees.

Therefore, here emerges priority in administrative development and the necessity of change and empowering young leaderships that are qualified to bear responsibility for effecting new styles and methods in the modern administration work.

Although administration work remains a fertile environment help develop administrati9on in case there is an acceptance of change, or a sterile environment in case of refusing change, and the latter blocks the desire of administrative reform because it refuses modernization and impedes attaining the nomic performance. aspired for development administra-

Using the language of production, the traditional administration would stay non-productive and derelict in performance in addition to hindering administrative development as well as wasting potentials and public

Hence, efforts of financial and administrative reforms process should be channeled to creating an essential change in administration leaderships so that to realize their goals of equality of opportunities and obtaining productive gains of avail in interest of the entire eco-

It is also observed that the measures taken up to now are still at the start-point towards development administration aimed at realization of the principle of justice for all and equality among members of administration in rights and duties for the increase of production and ending failures resulting from administra-

Aden the road to the world of investment and commerce

ince ancient time, Aden has played an important role as an economic and commercial port in the southern part of the Arabian Peninsula and as a destination that serves as a meeting point in world trade. At the beginning of the second half of the nineteenth century, Aden began to regain important ground towards bearing its vital role as a major international trade port. It has rapidly developed since then, to become one of the most important seaports in the world. The importance of Aden as a seaport is due to its unique geographical location, and the naturally suitable environment has contributed in the rapid transformation of Aden into one of the best seaports, in a century and

After achieving independence from British colonization and after the unification of Yemen twenty years later, Aden port began to surface as a major

issue, deserving of special priority, lage, the industrial and tourist regions especially after Aden became the official commercial and economic capital of the Republic of Yemen. The announcement of the establishment of a free zone in Aden city over an area of 31 hectares, laid the foundations commencing serious development of Aden city and Aden port in all aspects of development.

Loading and unloading activities increased by one hundred percent at a rate of 20 containers an hour immediately after construction of the container port at the Caltex region with an operation capacity of 500,000 containers per annum. The rate of berthing giant vessels increased as well. The area of the free zone was divided into fifteen areas, most importantly Aden port, container port, airport, air cargo village, heavy and light industries, petrochemical areas and tourism areas.

During the past eight years, the Free Zone management board implemented a number of vital projects that included surveying and developing the area, establishing a special security force for lights, establishing the air cargo vil-

in addition to carrying our effective marketing and promotion campaigns.

Despite the immense movement and activities that Aden witnessed during the past period until the year 2001, where some 8660 ships in a variety of sizes, types and activities had entered the container port, the level of activities at Aden port dropped following the incidents to USS Cole and the French Limburg oil carrier. The announcement by insurance companies of increased insurance rates on various ships going to Yemeni ports including Aden port only exacerbated the situation.

The Yemeni government was compelled to deposit a US\$500 million as a bank guarantee to insurance companies in order to lure shipping companies to resume their activities to Aden

The number of ships reported to have anchored at Aden port during the period January-April 2004 was 107 ships in comparison to only 50 ships for the same period in 2003. Draft resolution for control of materials affecting Ozone

he ozone unit at the State Authority Environment Protection at the ministry of Water and Environment has been working at preparation of a draft resolution regarding a regulation for controlling materials that case depletion of ozone layer that would be soon submitted to the competent authorities to be endorsed.

The draft has been discussed at six workshops in the capital Sana'a and a

experts in this field have participated in discussions and contributed with their opinions to articles of the project and they have added valuable suggestions guaranteeing success of implementation in future.

According to sources at the Ozone unit, the third article of the project has defined its goals to controlling the use of ozone-depleting materials and watching other materials subjected to monitoring and that is in implementation of Yemen's commitment to international pacts and protocols.

The project stipulates that the State Authority of Environment Protection should not grant licenses to any new activities using materials depleting the ozone layer, and not to give acceptance for expanding industries based on using such materials. In compliance with article five of the project the Authority, in coordination with concerned parties at the ministry of agriculture, would implement a program for gradual riddance of the methyl bromide substance and to utterly stop using it as well as offering alternative assistance to farmers and organization

of the importation of bromide substance in coordination with customs. The draft regulations has defined the importation registration process and obtaining licenses of import according to portions of amounts, in addition to naming equipment and apparatuses that are banned from importation.

The draft stipulated the prevention of all sides using materials exhausting ozone layer from launching them to the atmosphere and that they work for recycling them according to conditions worked out by the Authority. Article 25 of the project stipulates that the

customs authority, in coordination with the environment protection authority, should implement the symbols regarding materials subjected to monitoring stipulated in the customs system and to put an end to trafficking with harmful equipment and material through application of marking mech-

Article 28 stipulates that all companies and factories that would produce or contain substances harmless to the ozone layer have to write the substance's trade and scientific name in a clear way on those products.

The draft regulation also stipulates that the concerned parties specialized in tackling dangerous solid wastes must prevent getting rid of equipment and apparatuses that contain materials subject to monitoring until obtaining approval of the environment protection authority according to measures it adopts. This project is regarded as an important legislation for controlling the materials causing depletion of the ozone and demonstrates Yemen's orientation and intent of cooperation regarding problems of atmosphere pol-

Progress on Alzheimer's dramatic - U.S. researcher

PHILADELPHIA, July 22 (Reuters) - A cure for Alzheimer's disease is unlikely in the near future, but big advances are coming soon in the treatment and prevention of the fatal brain illness, a leading researcher said on Thursday.

Researchers have made strides in learning about causes and possible therapies, and just in time, too, as the burden of Alzheimer's threatens Medicare, said Dr. William Thies, vice president for medical and scientific affairs at the Alzheimer's Association.

"We will see drastic improvements in ways of treating and preventing the disease," Thies said in an interview at the end of an international Alzheimer's conference. "It might be three, five, seven, 10 or 12 years away - something like that."

Thies said researchers have made a "staggering amount" of progress on finding causes, developing medications that have the potential to treat it, and identifying preventive steps, particularly lifestyle changes that may delay the onset of the brain-wasting disease.

Research presented at the conference suggests, for example, that risk factors for heart disease may also lead to dementia. A study in Sweden and Finland found that participants who were obese in middle age were twice as likely to develop dementia in later

Another study from Harvard Medical School found that women who ate vegetables such as spinach and broccoli in middle age preserved more of their cognitive abilities as they entered their 70s.

Drug trials presented to the conference appear to show that beta-amyloid, the abnormal protein that is a prime suspect as the cause of Alzheimer's,

can be broken down in the brain using medication, slowing the process of cognitive decline.

16 Million cases

Such preventive measures could help cut the number of Alzheimer's cases in the United States, which is expected to hit 16 million by the middle of this century — almost four times the current number — as the baby boom generation ages and lives longer.

That number could be even greater because of the higher incidence of Alzheimer's in the U.S. black and Hispanic populations, which are growing faster than the white population,

The financial burden of treating the expected increase in Alzheimer's sufferers threatens to bankrupt the U.S. health care system, Thies said. Alzheimer's patients often have other illnesses, and the cost of treatment to Medicare — the state-federal health insurance system for the elderly averages \$13,207 per patient per year.

That amount is more than three times the average for other Medicare patients, according to the Alzheimer's

Seeking to avert a crisis, the association is asking for a 32 percent increase in federal research funding, to \$1 billion a year.

The association's campaign have been helped by the Alzheimer's-related death of former U.S. President Ronald Reagan, whose widow Nancy has called for more government support to fight the disease.

"Congress would like to recognize the contribution of Mr. Reagan, and rather than putting his face on a \$20 bill, funding to find a cure for this awful disease would be the right decision," Thies said.

US FDA OKs Merck-Schering-Plough cholesterol drug

WASHINGTON, July 23 (Reuters) -Merck & Co. Inc. and Schering-Plough Corp. won U.S. approval on generate billions of dollars in yearly

Vytorin combines two currently available drugs that lower levels of LDL or so-called bad cholesterol in different ways, Merck's Zocor and jointly developed Zetia.

The Food and Drug Administration approved Vytorin late on Friday, an agency spokesman said.

The companies said the new drug will cost wholesalers \$2.34 per pill at all doses and will begin shipping to customers as soon as possible and no later than early September.

"We believe that Vytorin can successfully compete as a first line agent with all statins for all patients requiring cholesterol medications," said Adam Schechter, a vice president for the Merck Schering-Plough joint ven-

Shaojing Tong, an analyst with Mehta Partners, expects the medicine to post eventual annual sales of \$3 bil-

Other sales forecasts veer as high as \$8 billion, based on Vytorin's ability in clinical trials to slash LDL levels by up to 60 percent at higher doses.

"Vytorin is a marketing breakthrough because it combines two drugs with different mechanisms of action into a single pill," Tong said.

High cholesterol is considered a major risk factor for heart disease, the leading killer of Americans.

Golden opportunity

Zocor is a member of the statin family of medicines that limit the liver's production of cholesterol. Zetia. launched in 2002 for use by itself or with any statin, helps block the intestines from absorbing the artery-clog-

Merck and Schering-Plough, which Friday to sell a two-in-one cholesterol both need to reverse years of disappill called Vytorin that is expected to pointing earnings, will split profits from Vytorin.

Moderate doses of the new drug are as potent as the highest doses of Pfizer Inc.'s \$10-billion-a-year Lipitor and AstraZeneca Plc's new Crestor, giving it a possible safety advantage over its

Moreover, the two drugs in a single tablet would be more convenient for patients and require them to make only one co-payment, doctors and analysts said

New U.S. guidelines calling for lower ideal cholesterol levels were issued earlier this month and could prompt doctors to favor the most potent medicines when they reach for the prescription pad, giving Vytorin a golden opportunity for an exceptionally strong launch.

"Lipitor will remain the market leader because it is so well established and doctors are so comfortable with its safety record" after seven years on the market, Tong said.

Merck badly needs a big new product to replace Zocor. The company's top-selling drug, with sales of \$5 billion last year, will lose U.S. patent protection in 2006 and face cheaper generic competition.

In the meantime, Vytorin will be a mixed blessing for Merck because it will wrest sales away from highly profitable Zocor.

Schering-Plough is in worse financial shape than Merck. It lost \$92 million in 2003.

Most of its sales from allergy blockbuster Claritin have evaporated since that drug lost patent protection in 2002. And its hepatitis C drugs have been overtaken by newer treatments sold by Roche Holding AG.

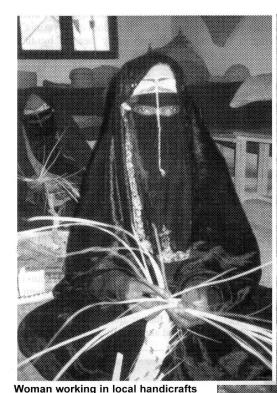
The Geography of Doann:

Doann is one of the provinces of the Hadhramout governorate, situated on the road between Sayoun and Al Mukala. The construction and asphalting of a 63-kilometer road that connects Ras Hobarah and Khailah Bugshan to the valley has made it more convenient for the inhabitants, tourists and honey seekers. The construction and asphalting of the road was implemented by the Bin Ladin group at the expense of the prominent Sheikh Abdullah Ahmed Saeed Bugshan.

Before asphalting the road, it required many hours of suffering to reach the valley. The passing, however, through the valley could only be made by four-wheel drive cars. Currently, construction works are taking place on the northern side that would connect Doann and Al-Mokala. The road is being constructed at a cost of 1.6 billion Riyals, also at the expense of Sheikh Bugshan.

The left and right valley The right valley of Doann valley

According to Hadhramout towns book reference, titled, "Adam Al-Qout", by the deceased author Abdulrahman Aboidah Bin Mohsen Al-Saqqaf, the name Doann is a Persian name that refers to two valleys at the peak of Hadramout. The right side is planted with valuable palm trees with scattered villages and towns at the edges of the roadbed. This side is actually divided into two mini valleys, "Al-Nabi" and "Hamodha" valleys, the latter embraces the population



housings.

The eastern side of Doann valley

The first area is "Rabad Baashen' the hometown of Bin Ladin, followed by Awrah area, referring to Doann's fortification and housing of its elite, the populated areas such as "Gareen", "Rehab", and "Hoden", the third refers to the town of Prophet Houd, (peace be upon him) are found on this side before reaching "Bawazeer and Garn

The left valley of Doann valley

The first area is "Rasmah" town and then the populated areas, Juha Al-Khnabesha, Sabeah Khailam Hawfah, Saif, Gabdoun, Al-Hajreen, Mekh, and Al-Mashhed(Al-Attas town).

Prosecutor and judge quit tribunal of 15 al-Qaeda suspects

The court judge listened to the testimony of the merchant who bought the car that was used in carrying the boat used in attacking the Limburg. Other evidence and reports were read out in the courtroom while the suspects showed indifference to what was going on, refusing to comment on the charges in the absence of their

Chief prosecutor Saeed al-Aki and his deputy Saeed al-Samit quit the session before the judge Ahmad al-Jermozi announced its end. The prosecutor left the courtroom when the suspects refused to keep mute and listen to the evidences presented by the prosecutor; complaining that they were harassed in the intelligence prisons, and demanding that they should be transferred to the central prison. They even shouted and hailed after they said they were teased by intelligence agents; they claimed they do not care whatever sentence they got, death or imprisonment, as much as they were annoyed by the interrogation that they were subjected to by some US men and women investigators. "It is you who gave permission that we be interrogated by the Americans. Sit down or you want to turn the judge into a decoration," said alleged ring leader Fawaz al-Rabee when talking with the prosecutor. The suspects said they were teased by intelligence agents and that they should vell with their slogan and then burst together "Allah Akabar, death to the US, Bin Laden is the dear of God," This angered the prosecutor al-Akil who asked the judge to silence them and then left the courtroom before its end. On his part, the judge, who appeared very weak and influenced by the prosecution from the first hearing, felt insulted by this behavior of al-Aki and left. the courtroom without terminating the hearing or even fixing a date for the next hearing session. The suspects appealed to the judge to listen to them but to no avail: they told him "listen to us otherwise we will not forgive you now or in the hereafter."

The fifteen suspected terrorists were charged in the first hearing with blowing up the French Oil Tanker in Mukalla in October 2002, carrying out several explosions in Sana'a, killing one soldier and

plotting to blow up the US, UK, French, German and Cuban embassies in Sana'a as well as plotting to killing the US ambassador to Yemen Edmund Hull.

The only advocate who was present Faiz al-Hajori described the quit of the prosecution as against the law. "The prosecutor violated the law by this behavior as the hearing was not yet concluded by the judge. The prosecutor was angered by the suspects who have the right to convey their demands to the judge," said al-Hajori while talking to journalists outside the courtroom. He said that his friends boycotted the tribunal as they were denied access to copies of the investigation reports so that they would be in a position to probe into the charges against their

The suspects said the orders of the judge in the last sessions were not enacted. They complained that their friend Aref Mujali was not attended to by the doctor despite the serious wound in his leg but the judge ordered the prosecution again to take him to the doctor.

When journalists approached the bar, the suspects were furious and said "come and report what is going on. Otherwise, we will come out and turn into atomic bombs that would blow you up." It seems that both the prosecutor and the suspects are not happy with journalists for the prosecutor allowed filming only before the hearing for five minutes. When journalist Khalid al-Mahdi, reporterfor the German DPA agency tried to take a picture during the hearing, the prosecutor shouted at him and asked the judge to kick him out Journalists were furious and intended to leave the courtroom but the judge calmed them

During the session it was found in the reports of the prosecution that the boat used in the bombing was made in the UAE and was bought for around one million and eight hundred thousand Rials. The suicide bombers were Khaithama al-Hadramai and Hussein al-Badwi; al-Badwi is the brother of the second prime suspect in the USS Cole terrorist attack Jamal al-

The reluctance of the prosecution to

allow advocates to have copies of the case files and the insistence of the advocates, his permission. He also authorized as well as the refusal of the suspects to Mohammed al-Azani to defend the prime comment on charges, have all crippled the progress of the tribunal despite the fact that it started on May 29th.

The same problem is found in the tribunal of the USS Cole 6, one tried in absentia, suspect operatives. The advocates Khaled al-Anisi and Abdulaziz al-Samawi insisted in the third hearing held last Wednesday that they should have copies of the case files to which the judge and prosecutor refused and said they are allowed to copy whatever is possible only. "We are committed not to display any secrets if secrecy is what the prosecution wants to maintain," said al-Samawi.

The suspects refused to comment until their advocates have this right. However, the court judge Najeeb al-kaderi who looked more influential and controlling, said this behavior on the part of the suspects will be considered as a refusal to reply on changes and that the procedures of the hearing would go on. The judge even fined the two advocates YR 2000 each for talking in the courtroom without suspect Abdulraheem al-Nasheri being in US custody after his arrest in, and extradition from, the UAE. The judge ordered the arrest of al-Nasheri and considered him a

suspect still at large. The court, on July 7th, charged the six alleged operatives of the al-Qaida terror network in connection with the bombing of the USS Cole four years ago.

The prosecutor accused the suspected terrorists of forming or setting up an armed gang, and joining al-Qaida and planning, terrorist acts against the USS Cole, which affected the Yemeni-U.S. relationship, putting Yemen as a target in the war on terrorism. In the attack in 2000, two suicide bombers. Hasan al-Khameri and Ibraheem al-Thawr in an explosive-laden boat rammed into the USS Cole as it was refueling in the port city of Aden. The attack on the U.S. Navy destroyer killed 17 American sailors and wounded 39 others.

The two trials are carried out amidst intensive security measures.

The same sources claim that it is probable that the offer has been renewed and that some parties in the authority might be of the opinion of accepting the offer, despite rejection of other parties.

> On the other hand, Amnesty International expressed concern over Saada events. On 22nd July 2004 a letter from the German office of Amnesty International was addressed to Dr. Abdu Bakr Abdullah Al-Qurbi, Yemen's minister of foreign affairs, on the military events in Saada, expressing concern over civilian killings resulting from the confrontations there.

Improved travel advice to Yemen

The British Foreign Office adjusted its warning after the UK government's recent review of travel advice. In June, Foreign Secretary Jack Straw said that "in the future in the case of intelligence-based terrorist threats, the British government will advise against travel to a specific country only in situations of extreme and imminent danger."

Although the statement from the Foreign Office dropped the warning against all but essential travel, it included advising tourists about terrorist threats.

"The threat against Western interests in Yemen has not changed. The Travel Advice maintains that there is a continuing high threat from terrorism and that there is reliable evidence that international terrorists are targeting western, including British, interests in Yemen," said the Foreign Office in the statement,

The Foreign Office lifting the travel

warning but still offering advice about terrorist threats did not sit well with some

Yemeni tourist agencies "Their advice didn't change very much," said Marco Livadiotti, General Manager of Universal Touring Company, "It lifted the warning, but it also said to tourists that Yemen is still a dangerous place. There was not a big effort to show that Yemen is

The Foreign Office also advised tourists to avoid traveling in areas near the Saada province where fighting has continued.

Clashes between Shiite militants and government forces in north Yemen have been ongoing since the fighting began on June 18th. Tourist agencies have reported that large numbers of foreigners that planned to visit Yemen have canceled their trips as a result of the clashes.

This month the Yemeni government lifted some restrictions that had been in

place since the war on terror began after terrorist attacks in the United States on September 11th 2001. Travelers from over 30 countries - including nations in Europe, North America, the Far East and the Arab Gulf - can now get a visa entering Yemen at Sana'a International Airport or other places of entry. Individuals can also visit Yemen without having to join a tourist group or come for business.

The government might also make it easier for foreigners to move around inside the country. Tourists have to get permission, are escorted by Yemeni police and are stopped at numerous checkpoints to reach certain areas. Soon, the government may drop tourists getting permission, reduce the number of checkpoints and have police cars patrol areas instead of escorting tourists.

According to Al-Mahbashi, it is important for Yemen to see other countries

revise their travel warnings to help give a boost to the country's tourism sector. The United States issued a warning last spring that said US citizens planning to travel to Yemen should "consider carefully the risks of travel to Yemen.

"We hope that the US warning will change in the near future. This would help tourism in Yemen tremendously," said Al-

Security in Yemen has improved since it ioined the United States to fight terror soon after the attacks on American soil in 2001. Hundreds of suspected terrorists have been rounded up, and suspects accused of being involved in the bombing of the USS Cole in 2000 and the French oil tanker in 2002 are now on trial. It has been three years since a foreigner has been kidnapped in Yemen.

The British Foreign Office also revised its warnings of travel to Saudi Arabia and

Clarifications and response about 'Abyssinia'

What's wrong with the Arab World?

t was just a random statistic, but a telling one: only 300 books were translated into Arabic last year. That is about one foreign title per million Arabs. For comparison's sake, Greece translated 1,500 foreign-language books, or about one hundred and fifty titles per million Greeks. Why is the Arab world so far behind, not only in this but in practically all the arts and sciences?

The first-order answer is poverty and lack of education: almost half of Arabic-speaking women are illiterate. But the Arab world used to be the most literate part of the planet; what went wrong? Tyranny and economic failure, obviously. But why is tyranny such a problem in the Arab world? That brings us to the rub of the matter.

In a speech in November, 2003, US President George W. Bush revisited his familiar refrain about how the West has to remake the Arab world in its own image in order to stop the terrorism: "Sixty years of Western nations excusing and accommodating the lack of freedom in the Middle East did nothing to make us safe....because in the long run, stability cannot be purchased at the expense of liberty" - as if the Arab world had willfully chosen to be ruled by these corrupt and incompetent

But the West didn't just 'excuse and accommodate' these regimes. It created them, in order to protect its own interests — and it spent the latter half of the twentieth century keeping them in power for the same reason.

It was Britain that carved the kingdom of Jordan out of the old Ottoman province of Syria after the First World War and put the Hashemite ruling family on the throne that it still occupies. France similarly carved Lebanon out of Syria in order to create a loyal Christian-majority state that controlled most of the Syrian coastline - and when time and a higher Muslim birthrate eventually led to a revolt against the Maronite Christian stranglehold on power in Lebanon in 1958, US troops were sent in to restore it. The Lebanese civil war of 1975-90, tangled though it was, was basically a continuation of that struggle.

Britain also imposed a Hashemite monarchy on Iraq after 1918, and deliberately perpetuated the political monopoly of the Sunni minority that it had inherited from Turkish rule. As Gertrude Bell, an archaeologist and tration in Baghdad, put it: "I don't for a moment doubt that the final authority must be in the hands of the Sunnis, in spite of their numerical inferiority, otherwise vou'll have a mujtahid-run, theocratic state, which is the very

devil." When the Iraqi monarchy was finally overthrown in 1958 and the Baath Party won the struggle that followed, the CIA gave the Iraqi Baathists the names of all the senior members of the Iraqi Communist Party (then the main political vehicle of the Shias) so they could be liquidated.

It was Britain that turned the traditional sheikhdoms in the Gulf into separate little sovereign states and absolute monarchies, carving Kuwait out of Iraq in the process. (Saudi Arabia, however, was a joint Anglo-US project.) The British Foreign Office welcomed the Egyptian generals' overthrow of King Farouk and the destruction of the country's old nationalist political parties, failing to foresee that Gamal Abdul Nasser would eventually take over the Suez Canal. When he did, it conspired with France and Israel to attack Egypt in a failed attempt to

Once Nasser died and was succeeded by generals more willing to play along with the West — Anwar Sadat, and now Hosni Mubarak — Egypt became Washington's favourite Arab state: to help these thinly disguised dictators to hang on to power, Egypt has ranked among the top three recipients of US foreign aid almost every year for the past quarter-century. And so it goes.

Britain welcomed the coup by

Colonel Gadafy in Libya in 1969, mistakenly seeing him as a malleable young man who could serve the West's purposes. The United States and France both supported the old dictator Bourbuiga in Tunisia, and still back his successor Ben Ali today. They always backed the Moroccan monarchy no matter how repressive it became, and they both gave unquestioning support to the Algerian generals who cancelled the elections of 1991 - (nor did they ever waver in their support throughout the savage insurgency unleashed by the suppression of the elections, that killed an estimated 120,000 Algerians over the next ten years).

'Excuse and accommodate'? The West created the modern Middle East, from its rotten regimes down to its ridiculous borders, and it did so with contemptuous disregard for the wishes of the local people. It is indeed a problem that most Arab governments are corrupt autocracies that breed hatred and despair in their own people, which then fuels terrorism against the West, but it was the West that created the problem — and invading Iraq won't

If the US really wants to foster Arab democracy, it might try making all that aid to Egypt conditional on prompt democratic reforms. But I wouldn't hold my breath.

Can Democracy be the Main Feature of the Middle East?

n the light of the latest events from Iraq, Israel, Palestine, Saudi Arabia, etc. etc. people often ask: is it possible to see democracy flourishing in the Middle East?

Some say that modernization will come, but it needs time, other say that democracy is not likley to blossom

The gulf war pointed out the long term problems of the region - the lack of the military power and the political will to form an independent regional security structure, the incapability of the Arab League to establish dialogue between the Arab leaders, are not the least important factors of instability in the region.

One of the main features of the region is the ruling political, social, ethnic and religious elites who fight for their survival by creating or dissolving shifting alliances with domestic, regional and external players.

Most of the region's states are superficial entities that were produced by British and French imperialism.

So, in addition to lacking political legitimacy, they do not have a viable economic system experience or liberal, democratic traditions. In these societies, various ethnic and religious groups are engaged in a fierce competition for power. (eg. in Lebanon the political struggle between Shia, Sunni and Christians).

In this globalized era the Arab states can not afford to isolate themselves. Their leaders realize that this is the right time to change their policy. At the same time, they strongly reject the external attempt to democratize their respective countries. We have in the example of Iraq a demonstration of how the attempt to democratize the country from outside produces a political and social instability, creating a vacuum that entices the domestic and external fundamentalist militants to take action

The Arab leaders recognize the need to reform, but they want to do it in their own way. I do not deny the fact that each culture has its own path of development - fast or slow - and its own set of rules and philosophies to guide its growth and progress. But, they should speed up the moderniza-

tion process and make the region what it once was - a cosmopolitan and flourishing place where diversity was praised, economic development encouraged, cultural and academic advancement promoted.

Foreign intervention may aggravate the region's shaky stability and reinforce the tendency to resist to the West's call of reform and democracy. When US is asking its Arab allies to implement democracy they refrain from reforming their political systems and they reject practical solutions to end the hostility with Israel.

If, for example the ruling elites of Saudi Arabia were to suddenly implement democratic rule, then they would lose power. And, they do not want

Instead, they agree with all of the 'small steps' policy, hoping that the US and the EU will somehow get tired, or concentrate on other issues (like the war on terrorism) and will forget their case.

The goals from President Bush's speeches: establishing democracy in the Middle East, forming regional security arrangements, moving towards arms control agreements,

peace between Israel and the Arab states - have only created unfulfilled expectations that will probably lead to new American commitments and entanglements. But, a commitment to the region means military presence and direct intervention - and this is one of the reason's why anti-US feelings are still very much alive in the Arab and Muslim world; the other reason may be the US's almost unconditional support for Israel.

However, Israel and the Arab states are not just nation states striving for security, democracy and modernization; they represent powerful ideologies, such as Pan Arabism, Islamic fundamentalism and Zionism - ideologies used by the ruling elites to mobilize domestic and external sup-

Only if a reasonable solution can be found for the Israeli Arab conflict with some sort of ideological accommodation between these opposite views, only then will stability and economical development be possible. If Israel and the Arab states will be partners in the economic process, then the Middle East is most likely to move towards reform, democracy and even peace.

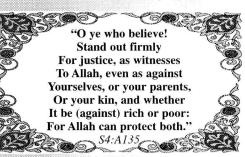

A letter to the teachers of English: 53 Some more useful activities for the vacation

Dear fellow teachers,

n the last letter, I suggested that you reflect on your classroom teaching of last year in order to freshen up for the next year. I also pointed out that you read and listen to English more and more so that your fluency in reading and listening to English increases. If you happen to travel abroad, make use of English more often so that your communicative skills improve. In this letter, I am suggesting two more activities exclusively for the benefit of the teachers of English, for the vacation.

One of them is preparing a glossary for your Pupil's Book. A glossary, as defined by the Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary of 1996, is 'a list of technical or special words, especially those occurring in a text, explaining their meanings'. In other words, it is a list of words and their meanings in the contexts in which they occur. It is like a dictionary because it provides the meanings of words, but it is different from it in that it does not give all the meanings of a word but only the meaning of a word in the context in which it is used. A glossary is, therefore, of immediate use to a teacher of English.

I am aware that you have no time to prepare a glossary during the school days and the vacation is the right time for it. You know well the important words in each lesson because of your experience of teaching it; take down each of these words from a lesson and with the help of a good dictionary, prepare a glossary, taking down only the meaning of that word in the context it has been used in the lesson. For example, the word 'date' has at

least 6 different meanings, but in Pupil's Book 1 page 22, it is used in the meaning of 'a sweet brown sticky fruit that grows on the palm tree'; the word 'get' has about 30 different meanings, but in Pupil's Book 5 page 7, it is used in the meaning of 'reach'.

In addition to the meaning, if you are interested, take down from the dictionary the sentence in which it is used to make sure that your students understand the meaning clearly; alternatively, you can write down your own sentence using the word. For each lesson, you will have to choose about 10 to 15 words; you need not choose the word, if it is repeated in another lesson. This means that your glossary for a Pupil's Book will have about 100 to 150 words, which can be prepared in about 2 to 3 hours spread over a week, roughly. The advantages you will have of this glossary are going to be manifold, I am sure. The most important of these will be the confidence with which you enter your class; furthermore, you can avoid using Arabic unnecessarily; then there is the benefit of your increasing your own vocabulary as a byproduct of referring to a dictionary. You can also help your colleagues who teach the same class in another school. Think of its benefit for a teacher who teaches in a village school, where there are no facilities like a dictionary or another teacher of English or someone else to consult.

Please think seriously about my suggestion, which benefits you and your learners to a very large extent. Even if you are lucky to work in a school where there are dictionaries and you have access to them, a glossary is of immense and immediate help to you. The time invested on its preparation is time well spent. which you will realize after the successful completion of the task. Get at it! Good

Level of Education in Yemen from students' perspective

oday, education in Yemen has reached a state of confusion and permanent chaos through the random changing of the syllabus and the unsuitable content of school books.

Teachers are teaching subjects unrelated to their specializations, to the extent that you find all specializations, perhaps excluding medicine, covered in schools.

Unfortunately these are the conditions of one of the largest sectors in our country, the educational sector, to which millions of rials every year are allocated through the national budget as confirmed by Mr. Abdu Rabo Mansoor Hadi, Vice President of the Republic, when he said that the budget for education is higher than that for the army forces in order to expand the educational facilities. "Every week there is a classroom being built somewhere in Yemen." he said. Yet, in spite of the attention and the budget the level of education is getting worse. The state must work on educational strategies that aim at developing the educational sector starting from primary education and ending with the high schools. Wellstudied syllabuses must be set out so as to support the desired understanding among students and increase their knowledge and learning

Whose fault is it?

Secondary school girls in one of the high schools explained that more often than not it is not only the fault of the teachers or of the text books. In fact the level of students is very poor. In many cases the students themselves do not want to learn and they do not exert enough effort to do well. That is why, he explained, there are students who are not regular in their attendance, yet they get high marks

An alternative opinion is that it is a complex issue and many factors contribute to the success of education or the lack of it. In many cases it is family circumstances such as economic instability and carelessness of parents regarding the follow-up of their children's school performance.

Teachers do not fulfill their duties honestly, as some students in the secondary level commented. As the teacher is not specialized in the subject, so he teaches it very superficially and completes the syllabus without the core knowledge on the subject being transmitted to the students.

Favoring teachers' children:

One student pointed out that if there is a true will to reform education this should

start from the basic education, i.e. the very first grade through the choice of a qualified teacher in order to create a good environment where healthy competition takes place. Student's spirits are dampened every year because it is always the teachers' children who come out first in class. This leads to frustration among the other deserving students as they feel that, no matter how hard they work, there will be no recognition of their merit; so they lose interest in studying right form the early years of schooling. It also leads to the graduation of a generation that is not really qualified. In the past, one high school girl commented, education was much better and students did struggle hard to learn and they were better educat-

Lost image of the teacher:

Although apparently teachers have a number of benefits and are appreciated by the Ministry of Education and receive bonuses every now and then, they have lost their image completely in front of the students who do not pay respect to their teachers and do not hold them in high esteem. Students disturb class sessions and reply curtly and rudely to teachers, they do not appreciate teachers' efforts and instructions. In spite of having an educational system as well as schools and teachers, yet if students do not respect their teachers, it is unlikely that the level of academic success will be high.

Satellite generation: One promising student pointed out to a

new dimension of the issue. She brought up the topic of satellite channels and the deterioration of the students' concentration and learning ability as a consequence of continually watching of TV. Students prefer to sit for hours in front of the TV screen and watch any nonsense that is presented, rather than studying or participating in social activities. For example, she explained, "The social studies teacher gave us a task to review a number of questions and some of them were very simple, such as 'when the September and October revolutions took place' and 'when was Yemeni unification and what was the significance of those events.' However, most of the students did not know how to answer these questions.

Finally

These were some facts and opinions gathered from girls in secondary schools about the status of education in Yemen. What will be the percentage of pass in this year's secondary exams is yet to be known! Students nowadays are working through their exams and we hope that they do well, honestly and in reality.

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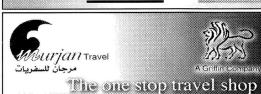
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Repairing Aden water cisterns to attract tourists

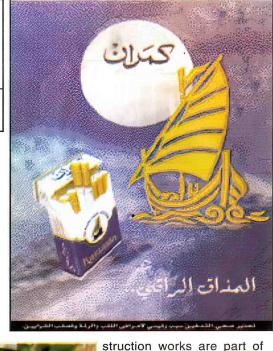

he water cisterns of Aden are characterized by enchanthistorical ing features that can attract attention of foreigners forming tourist groups to visit them, especially after the authorities there have been carrying out many kinds of repairs and renovations to restore their former features to look the same as they were during the fist century when they had been built during the ancient Yemeni Himyarite

Overhauling operations include repairing terraces and utilities affiliate of them at a cost amounting to YR six million. The garden of water cisterns accommodate around 400 visitors and have a children playground. Reconstruction of the rest of historical landmarks is also under renovation, including lighting and gardening works expected to be finished during next

The underway recon- Aden water cisterns

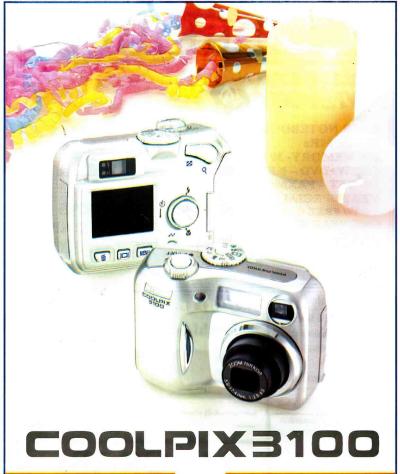




struction works are part of the second phase of local authorities efforts to improve condition of water cisterns after they had finished the process of cleaning water canals extending from them to the center of the city of Aden to end up at the seacoasts.

The number of cisterns is 50 but most of them are still hidden under earth of exposed to negligence and destruction. What are ready of those cisterns now are only 18 accommodating 20 million barrels of rainfall water torrents.

Ancient Yemenis had built Aden cisterns at a mountainous narrow passage of 750 feet long to store rainwaters descending from mountaintops and are meant to be used for many irrigation purposes and to protect the city of Aden from torrents. Those cisterns have a good, entertaining historical, and tourist importance and give an indication of the genius of the Yemeni human in dealing with his environment in an engineering way and accommodating environment to match with his interest.



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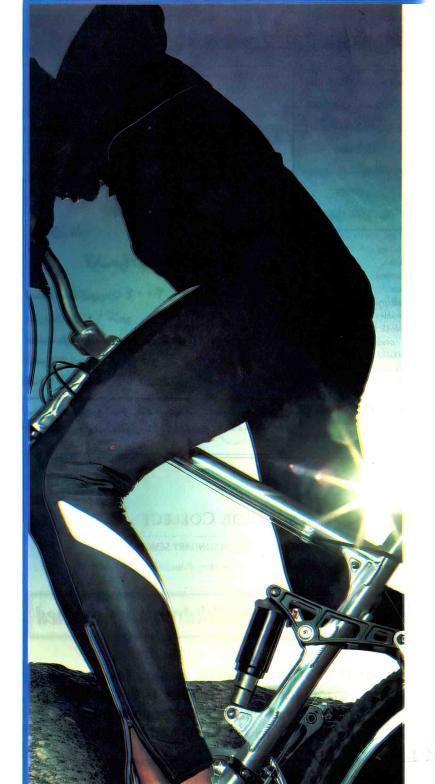
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
