

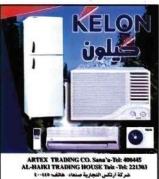

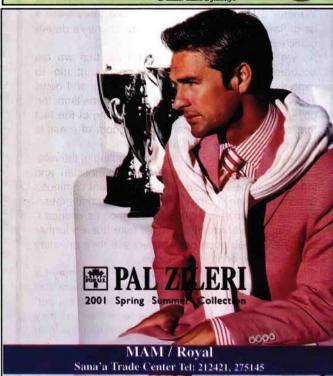

By-elections to Be Held on 14 October

The Supreme Elections Committee (SEC) announced last week that preparations are underway to hold on October 14 of this year byelections for local councils in roughly 80 election centers nationwide. Some of the mishaps took place during the previous election where some candidates' names and symbols were omitted which caused lots of problems in different parts of the Republic.

On the other hand, the meeting of the Political Committee for Dialogue held last Saturday at the Permanent Committee of the PGC came to a dead end as there still are many disagreements between the government and the opposition parties over certain articles related to the new draft law on elections.

Electricity Dilemma Continues

An increasing number of complaints were filed in the last couple of weeks concerning the weakening and alternating electricity power. Most neighborhoods in the capital have suffered from unstable electrical currents that resulted in damaging electrical equipment and machines.

Despite the increase in electricity prices leading to unaffordable electricity bills for many families, electricity services continue to deteriorate. When asked about the reason behind this inefficient service, an engineer at the Ministry of Electricity replied, "There is simply not enough power generators."

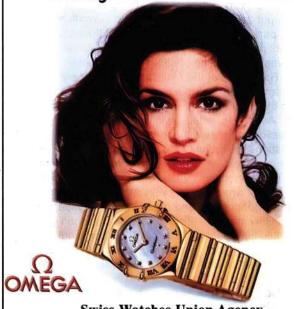
Technical Reasons behind Delay in Launching New ISPs

Following last week's debate on Internet service in Yemen, broadcasted on national TV in the successful "Face to Face" program, it was concluded that the to-be-licensed ISPs have not been yet launched due to incomplete infrastructure.

Internet monopoly was terminated months ago but the ministry could not give licenses without the completion of data network and gateway projects. Data network is indeed the medium of transporting

internet data while the gateway is the gate to world internet resources. The statements made by the officials during the debate brought hope that new ISPs may be operational soon.



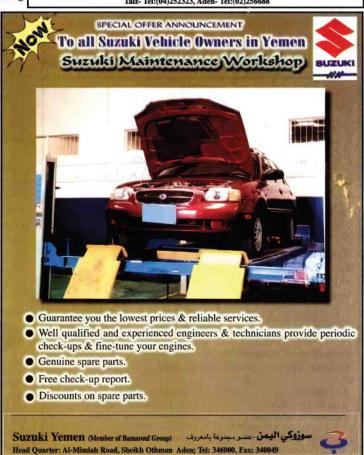

Government and the Press **Should Be One Team**

leven years have passed since Yemen started adopting democracy and freedom of press. Those eleven years included various ups and downs. There were many obstacles hindering the progress of Yemen's democratization process, and there were a lot of flaws and shortcomings in our country's demo-

As we look back in time, we realize that we did accomplish something. Newspapers continue to express their opinions and publish reports and news items critical of the government. At the same time, the government is tolerant and understanding of the fact that any environment where the freedom of press is granted would have such articles.

However, there seems to be a mishandling of the relations between the government and opposition and independent newspapers. The government continues to think that many of those newspapers aim at embarrassing the government and focusing on its wrongdoing. Some governmental officials take it even further by thinking that those newspapers are their enemies and should be dealt like enemies.

Let me clear one thing at this point. There may be some newspapers that bluntly and unjustly attack certain figures without strong basis. I do not support those newspapers, and even condemn them as they are turning the honorable task of delivering the truth to the evil task of insulting others.

However, one can also not deny that most newspapers are constructive in their criticism and do show a sense of responsibility. I believe that those newspapers deserve respect and cooperation.

I am asking through this column all governmental officials to put aside any hatred or envy towards those newspapers and try to make good use of their articles. Ministers could potentially benefit largely from articles that reveal mishandling of affairs relating to their ministries. For example, the Minister of Health benefited a lot from Yemen Times when we revealed the corruption that was eating away one of the public hospitals in Aden. He acted swiftly and expressed his appreciation to the newspaper's stance.

This responsible action of the newspaper should have even a more responsible response from the government. The authorities should read those articles and act to correct what is wrong within their domain.

I think that opposition and independent newspapers are definitely more beneficial for our officials than governmental newspapers because they point out the problems so the ministers could fix them. Governmental newspapers usually praise the government and ignore criticizing it. By this, they are not benefiting the government, but rather putting it in an illusion that has nothing to do with what is on the ground. In brief, the government and the press should be one team and cooperate to have the country develop rather than become enemies.

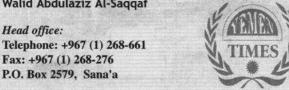
We should work together for the sake of the country and never against each other.

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British Embassy Bombers' Trial Postponed

The West Sana'a Court has postponed the trial of the suspects accused in connection with the British Embassy blast, occurred in October 2000 as a consequence of the appointment of judge Abdullah Tharwan head of the court as chairman of the Central Organization for Control and Auditing (COCA). The sessions of the court were scheduled to be held on

Saturdays but, due to certain changes taking place at the judiciary system, the court has postponed its sessions.

At the same time Syrah Court will hold its sessions next Wednesday to interrogate the suspects accused of the bombings carried out during New Year's Eve in the City of Aden.

Seminar on Insurance & **Reinsurance Launched**

The seminar on insurance and reinsurance will conclude its activities tomorrow at the Sheraton Hotel in Sana'a. A number of people concerned with insurance presented working papers highlighting the situation of insurance in the Republic of Yemen. The activities of the seminar started last Saturday when the Yemeni Federation for Insurance presented a working paper on the same issue. More details in the next issue of Yemen Times.

Yemen Times Organizes a Workshop on Female **Journalism**

Yemen Times Weekly is organizing a workshop from September 10 to 13 at its premises in Sana'a on the issue female journalism in Yemen. The workshop which will be inaugurated by Mr. Mohammed Shahir, Deputy Minister of Information, will focus on the challenges facing female journalism in Yemen and methods to promote female journalism.

The program coordinator of the event, Ms. Nadia Al-Saqqaf, stressed that the workshop must generate tangible results that could potentially open the way for female journalists wishing to be involved deeper in the field of professional journalists. "The workshop is considered a pioneer step by Yemen Times to promote female journalists and pinpoint the challenges and problems they go through. We also hope that it will be useful in familiarizing the Yemeni community to female journalists," she said.

Training Workshop for Local NGOs Launched

The activities of the training workshop for nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) kicked off on September 8 under the title "Management and the Means of Communication". The training course was organized by the Society for Developing Women and Children and included a series of courses aimed at developing the skills and abilities of non-governmental organizations with the view of empowering them to play a pivotal role in the development process. The number of beneficiaries from this course are five local NGOs sending each four partici-

Investment between Arab Nations Reached USD 22.77 Million

According to the Arab Industrial, Commercial and Agricultural General Union, the rate of accumulated customs reductions reached 40% since the implementation of the Free Trade

A report issued by the General Secretariat of the Union, presented during its 91st session in Sana'a, highlighted that the current situation in Arab markets do not provide an appropriate framework that could enable the private sector to concentrate its business towards high quality production. The report also indicated that the level of joint investment between the Arab states shrank to USD 2.3 billion while Arab investment abroad is sharply increasing.

Moreover, it mentioned that joint investment between Arab private sectors do not exceed the USD 2,277 million.

First Ophthalmic Seminar

The National Program for the Prevention of Blindness at the Ministry of Health in co-operation with Al-Nibras Charity Organization for the prevention of blindness held the first ophthalmic seminar in Sana'a on Thursday 30 August.

The seminar was given by Professor Abdulmajeed Masood and was about "Yag Laser in treating secondary cataract". A number of eye doctors attended the seminar which is going to be on a monthly basis. The next seminar will be held on Thursday 20 September and is going to be on "Diabetic Retinopathy and Laser treatment".

This is part of Continuous Medical Education offered to the eye doctors in Sana'a and the seminar was supported by Allergan Pharmaceutical Company.

Customs Revenues of Sana'a Airport Increase

Incomes of the Customs Office at Sana'a International Airport for the month of August reached USD 97.950 million an 30% increase compared to the pervious month.

Official sources at the airport indicated that incomes from the customs office have been witnessing continuous expansion in the past few months.

By maintaining the siege and keeping "We confirm our trust in the Yemeni governhostages away from the Jahm tribe, authorities believe that they could pressure the kidnappers to free the hostage without any ransom demands whatsoever. However, the situation there suggests the contrary, as the kidnappers have expressed a desperate need for money to leave the country and settle elsewhere. "They have lost their links with their own tribe and have nothing to lose. They will probably not let the hostage go without being paid the demanded ransom," a tribal figure close to the kidnappers' associates told YT Mareb corre-

The authorities have stressed out that the government will and shall never bow to demands of the kidnappers by giving out any money. However, they continue to study possible means and strategies to have Berns safely released through peaceful means.

Similarly, the German embassy denied any attempts to get involved in the negotiations or its willingness to give the demanded ransom.

It is worth mentioning that this is the most sophisticated and mysterious kidnapping incident that the country had ever witnessed since the emergence of kidnappings in the early 1990s. The security forces' inability to locate the kidnappers and hostage until today is yet another indication of the mystery of this incident. What further complicates the incident is that the kidnappers belong to an Islamic movement and took part in Islamic activities in Afghanistan which is giving the incident political dimensions.

Mr. Rainer Berns was kidnapped on July 27 by unknown militants from the busy 60-meter street in Sana'a after arriving with his family from Sana'a airport.

More than USD 28 Bio of Fish Exports

The Yemeni fish exports totaled USD 29 billion in the first half of 2001. In this context, more than 21 million Kilo of fishes have been exported while the total income from fish exported las year totalled USD 40 million. The Yemeni government encourages private sector companies to invest in the fishery sector by providing incentives, soft loans and by establishing quality test labs in Sana'a, Mukalla and

Hodaidah. Moreover, qualified staff has been made available for the General Department for Quality Control at the different exporting ports in the Republic. Hence, the Ministry of Fisheries must pay more attention to building the infrastructures necessary for the fisheries sector, such as sea anchors, snow plants and labs, which all contribute to developing fish

Yemen Introduces Free Emergency Dial

For the first time, an emergency dial service has been introduced in Yemen as the Ministry of Interior has completed the technical and administrative arrangements related to making the free emergency dial accessible to all citizens in the republic through the toll-free number 199. The ministry noted that the toll-free number 199 will be directly connected with the police operation rooms in the capital Sana'a and the other governorates of the republic. With the use of the emergency dial system, any person would be able to call the police and ask for assistance or report any crimes. Moreover, Republic of Yemen intends to upgrade the capacity of the telephone network to 1 million telephone

lines by the end of 2005, at an average annual growth rate of 16.7 %. Thus, the distribution of telephone lines will reach the rate of 4 telephone lines per each 100 inhabitants. The telephone capacity of the Republic of Yemen has also been upgraded from 242,000 telephone lines in 1995 to 460,000 telephone lines in 2000 at a growth rate of 14,1%. However, the size of investment has not exceeded YR 29.3 billion of which 83% is financed locally. The telecommunication projects included upgrading the rural telecommunication at 157 residential areas with the capacity of 31,000 telephone lines costing USD 37.4 million.

Handicapped Child Activities Concluded

The Yemeni non-governmental organization Coordination Committee for Child Rights organized the first summer activities aimed at involving children in different projects. Several societies based in Sana'a like the Physically Handicapped Society, al-Iman Society for Blind, Orphans Care House, the Challenge Care Society, the Deaf and Dump Society, Rabe'ah School, al-Khansa School, etc. took part in the project activities.

The two-month project is unique in its kind as the different groups of handicapped children had the chance to gather in one single place. The concluding ceremony was held on September 6 on the grounds of al-Qalam School under the supervision of the Coordination Committee and several societies involved in rendering care to handicapped children.

It is worth mentioning that this event came to highlight child rights in Yemen, which is one of the signatories of the Child Rights Convention, and the participation of different NGOs represented by the Coordination Committee and the support of the Swedish Child Care Organization.

Deliberation meeting on Environment

Al-Tamkeen Center for Training and Development headed by Sami Mohammed Al-Washali participated last Saturday in the consultative meeting held in Bahrain's capital Manama. The meeting, sponsored by the UN Environment Program, aimed at paving the way for the Earth Summit to be held in Johannesburg in South Africa in April 2002.

USD 874.745 Mio of **Incomes from Oil Exports**

Total income of Yemeni oil exports during the first half of 2001 reached a total of USD 874.745,000, while last year during the same period oil income equalled USD 914.866 million. Reports of the General Department of Credits at the Central Bank of Yemen (CBY) also indicate that amount of oil exported during the first half of 2001 reached 35.470 million barrels mainly coming from Almasylah, East Shabwah. Genah, and Alhouailim.



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Mohammed Alraba'ee to Yemen Times:

"We are struggling to achieve the goals of the revolution."

Alraba'ee, 71 years old, through the Imam's regime and the revolution. His views about the 1962 revolution and its goals differ from what has been said by histori-

He believes that the six goals of the revolution did not translate aspirations of the Yemeni people but were declared in imitation to other regimes and systems which were imposed on the Yemeni revolution. According to him, the six goals cannot become a reality in Yemen, because the continuous changes on the regional and international arenas have a direct effect on the country

During an interview, Yemen Times correspondent Mohammed Bin Salam asked AlRaba'ee the following questions:

Q: After a stark opposition, you failed to prevent the latest constitutional amendments from being implemented and you did not score any success on other subjects related to the Yemeni arrears. How do you respond to that?

A: How rough to describe us as being unsuccessful. I do not know on what basses you have judged us this way. We are satisfied with the results. Those who do not know the hidden facts realize that the opposing political forces did not fail as you may believe.

Our people are usually very discreet. When they come to contemplate the end results, even if they are twisted, they accept them in silence although they consider them unfair. So, the new procedures and amendments became legal with the population remaining silent and therefore accepting it. This is the kind of legality that the last constitutional amendments do

Q: The opposition forces withdrew their pre-stated conditions during negotiations with the government on the latest constitutional amendments which guarantee fair elections and the end of perpetual financial contributions imposed on the helpless population.

What was the price of this withdrawal? A: The opposition forces did not withdraw. They all agreed to suspend negotiations with the government at that time because its latest decision, which is not the first one and will not be the last, caught everyone by surprise in a very inappropriate time. Through negotiations, the government tried to impose its financial decree without any prior announcement. The opposition forces decided therefore to halt the negotiations in order to express their refusal of the new governmental policies. An question arose during the negotiations with the government, that is wether Prime Minister Bajammal was representing the government or the PGC. We respect Mr. Abdulljader Bajammal, our prime minister, but his presence at the negotiation table as only a representative of the ruling party was somewhat irrational. Because of that, there were no equality between the party. I do understand things as a politician. "If you are a politician you are a negotiator and if you are a negotiator you are a politician." Negotiations are something natural in politics. You should conduct negotiations with your colleagues at the party, your partners at work, and your friends in a drive to come up with the right solutions to any problem.

Q: News is spreading that disagreements appeared within the opposition movement, especially on the elections law. What is your comment on these allegations?

A: There is no misunderstanding nor disagreement between the opposition parties. There is no mistakes in the texts of the

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election law. The most important thing is how we apply them. Our constitution presents very strict texts and articles but, unfortunately, they are to be found in books only. Among them, Article Nr. 5 "The political system is based on pluralism and partisanship that guarantee the peaceful transfer of power. Another one says, "No one owns the right to use the national budget or a governmental position in order to serve a particular party or any specific political entity." If we ask ourselves wether the government applies such strict laws properly, the answer is no. The failure in the past elections did not result from the texts themselves but from their misuse

Article no. 39 states, "The military and security forces are the possessions of the citizens, no one owns the right to use them in serving his own interests or these of a particular party." During electoral time, we can observe that these two institutions are the instrument of one person or party.

Q: No country among the developing world was successful in adapting democracy as a political system. It may be due to the social and cultural heritage of these countries or it may come from something else. How do you evaluate Yemen's democracy as described by our politicians? Could they succeed in transforming it to a real democracy? A: Some voices demand to reduce plurality and partisanship in the country and to limit the political landscape to two or three parties at the most. They claim that it would create a democracy adapted to the unique atmosphere of the country, as our system does not resemble to democracies in the Western Countries.

Q: Is this related to democracy? How do you evaluate such desires and policies?

A: I do not think that there are unique societies presenting exceptions in dealing with various political issues and systems. There is no partial democracy (25%, 50% or 60%). It is either full democracy or another system. That is why I vehemently objected to the so-called 'emerging democracy' that lately emerged in our national political arena by saying, "Does the title implies dictatorship wearing the coat of democracy?!" Democracy cannot be softened or separated. We should either be strong enough and self confident to embrace it as a whole or apologize and withdraw. It is irrational to use weak excuses in order to claim the necessity of adapting an imperfect form of democracy. Some these excuses are the following: inflation of illiteracy rates in the country, unability of the society to adapt itself and conduct a team work, ignorance of majority of the citizens on this issue, and other illogical pretenses. Only imperialistic states repeat such excuses. It is better for the government to apologize and confess its incapacity to grant the population complete freedom and self-determination rights. Furthermore, our national government should not imitate the imperialists.

Q: How do you judge the democratic atmosphere in the country?

A: I really disagree with those people who accuse the ruling party and other parties members the coalition of imposing imperfect democracy on our society. This is not only their own fault but also all political parties' responsibility. They have all contributed to limit democracy, as the opposition forces remained silent instead of using the available democratic resources granted by the government.

Q: The Yemeni politicians, intellectuals and religious men are pessimistic about the future of the country. What visions do you have about our future taking into consideration the regional and



international changes, such as the world moving towards Globalization, open markets, and other evolutions?

A: I possess publications written 25 years ago. Most of them present evaluations of civil societies throughout the centuries. The wheel of civil society's evaluation is driving us towards more comfortable partnership between world nations to be achieved through world Globalization. I believe that the nations could become of the globalized world after being qualified to participate actively in different fields, such as culture, economy and social issues. To be an active partner, you must be qualified and able to conduct and respond to demands made by this partner-

Q: What solutions do you predict to end all mishaps and crises in the country? Do you think that after the social, economical, and political crises, which are endangering the future of the Yemeni people, they would enjoy a life presenting security and progress, or is there any major disaster awaiting them?

A: Pessimists predict the latter because many alarming factors are present in our country: a widening gap between social classes, a sharp rise in poverty, an increase in illiteracy rates, the lack of medical security, the frequent crimes, and the economic crisis. Above all, the population feelings to live in a world of discrimination, injustice, insecurity, corruption, incompetent administration, and so on, feeds on the idea of a bleak future.

I agree with your analysis, especially if things will move into this direction. The only solution I can suggest is to activate the role the political forces are supposed to play, that is cooperating together to correct all the wrong doings made so far in the country.

This could be a test on their expected role and their ability to adapt to new challenges. If the political performance would continue to be as poor as it is right now. we shall loose any hope to be successful in the future. As a conclusion, I can say that to be globalized has become a must, as globalization is sometimes imposed on

Nowadays, developed nations are worried about globalization. As for our nation, it is not only less developed but also deeply asleep. We need a balance between the social and governmental roles to achieve progress in Yemen. Such cooperation between all parts of our society will help us to be more competent in dealing with this new state of emergency.

Q: But, you did not answer my question

A: All indications force us not to have high aspirations but not to be extremely pessimists in the same time. High expectations go against the practical and effective policies. I swear my God that our natural resources are wasted and the economic crises our country faces are fixed only with rusty "scissors". The government not only confiscates the natural resources but also increases the burdens on the population. Most of the grants and loans offered by the World Bank and other donors are directly diverted by some senior officials. If rusty scissors can be used to perform successfully a surgical operation, the robbers could be able to solve our economic quagmire. No wonder that we find pessimists as a majority among the popula-

Q: On September 26, 1962, the Yemeni revolution erupted in the northern part of Yemen and was based on six goals. Today, 40 years after this event, revolution was accomplished while achieving these six goals has become a dream. What has pushed them so far from real-

A: I think that the problem already existed before revolution. Among many people, I was greatly worried about the hasty preparations to provoke the uprising, which may have concluded with the change of the ruler only but not the situation and the ruling system. The Imam's regime collapsed because of internal weaknesses, as everyone was complain-

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President Saleh to Al-Jazeera:

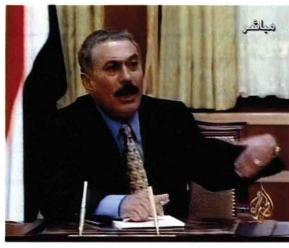
"Americans are Denied Interrogating any Yemeni and Cole File is Referred to Prosecution"

resident Ali Abdullah Saleh denied information that American investigators of USS Cole incident requested from Yemen to interrogate high-ranked Islamic personalities and military officials as well. Last Wednesday, he gave Al-Jazeera Satellite TV Channels an extensive interview and said, "such allegations are repeatedly made by the Yemeni opposition. Americans did not request this and they are denied the right to interrogate any Yemeni national whatever his position or rank is. Americans can submit their inquiries to the Yemeni security services and they will get their answers." He fully denied the involvement of any Yemeni Islamic or non-Islamic leaders in the Cole suicide bombing incident which killed 17 American sailors and injured 39 other last October. He also confirmed that the case investigation is has been completed and can be submitted to prosecution. However, he did not set a date for these proceedings. With regard to his visit to Washington, President Saleh confirmed that this visit was not postponed because of the bombing attack on the USS Cole but because of other arrangements on the part of both Yemen and United States. He added that, in principle, the visit has been scheduled to take place by the end of the October or the beginning of November.

The President described the bombing attack on the American destroyer as a terrorist act aimed to tarnish and cripple the Yemeni-US relations and to show the country to be a safe haven for terrorist acts. However, he said the incident made Yemen able to have a better grasp on the US administration and to learn on how to deal with it.

He stated, "Our position on the attack was strong and responsible. The US administration respected it. In respect the Americans as they respect people who respect themselves." said Saleh. He confirmed that there were pressures on Yemen but he said if Yemen had surrendered to this pressure, the Americans would here asked more and more facilities. "We denied them access to Yemen with forces, planes, and ships. We put them under direct monitor by our security forces. They respected our position and surrendered to what we did " He claimed the investigation into the incident has been completed but he said that Americans requested the postponement of the tribunal of the six suspects so that they can prop into the missing link in the case. Asked whether a republican amnesty can unique on secessionists will be issued with the 39th anniversary of 26th September Revolution, the President, denied such information. He said the 26 persons who were involved in the secessionist act during the civil war of 1994 including his former president Ali Salem Al-Baidh have been tried the justice and that if an amnesty on them is released, that would justify their criminal acts against the country and wash their hands of the responsi-



bility of the 11.000 killed and injured in the war. He said the defendants can come to the country or appoint advocates to appeal the verdict against them, denying any sort of contacts with

However, he said the Yemeni political leadership was very liberal and lenient with people involved in the separation act as it restricted the responsibility of this crime to 16 people, four of them have been sentenced to death while the



12 other have been sentenced to different terms of imprisonment but with suspension. He also underscored that both the Central Committee for Yemen Socialist Party and the representatives of the south in the parliament were found guilty of triggering the separatist

current controversy between the government and the opposition over draft amendments of Election Law, President Saleh said he was optimistic that both sides would reach an mutual satisfactory agreement. He added the PGC has been very open-minded as it invited all political parties to discuss the proposed amendments on Elections Law. He stated that he was ready to endorse any suggestion from the opposition on ways to run elections in the country, but insisted that this was not possible everywhere as candidates always choose their own members to monitor the voting process while vote screening is conducted by Ministry of Interior. He mentioned that a committee was set up to handle the electoral process. Asked about preparation of Saleh's son Ahmad to become the next president of Yemen, the President did not give a clear answer and told the interviewer, "You are always

asking about the sons of Saleh, Quadafi, Mubarak, Saddam Hussein. You want to say republics are now becoming monarchies. That is not a problem if there is democracy." Concerning the on-going conflict in the

Palestinian territories, President Saleh called upon all Arab countries to support the Palestinian Intifadah as the only way out to settle the war with Israel. He underlined that peace was not possible as long as Israeli Prime Minister, Aril Sharon, was challenging all international agreements on the Arab-Israeli conflict. He stressed out that talking about peace is without any sense as peace can only be achieved through the use of force. "Peace can not be given on a golden plate", he observed. President Saleh added Israeli arrogance should be attacked by force so that Sharon would have no other choice but to ask for peace. He even called for a mobilization of Arab forces to face the enemy because Sharon is a very unpredictable character and could act stupidly against the Arabs as he did in the 1980s. He also praised Saudi Arabia for its significant financial support to Intifadah, adding that Saudi leadership are very enthusiastic about its new idea to bring Palestinian and American leaderships together at the table. He said that last Wednesday Prince Bander bin Sultan delivered him a personal message from Saudi Crown Prince Abdullah bin Abduhalaziz exposing this new idea.

However, Saleh insisted on the significance of setting up the Arab Defense Treaty as well as organizing a meeting with the Arab Foreign and Defense Ministers before holding the next Arab Summit. He said that all kinds of relationship with Israel should be stopped and that goods of companies dealing with Israel should be boycotted. The President stated, "Once our position and decisions are strong and well defined, we will press on the United States and the European Union to be adopt a more fair attitude towards the Palestinian issue. When we have a powerful and a unified stance among Arabs, our voice can be heard more clearly by others." In his point of view, the Arabs have not so far used their relationship and common interests with the United States in favor of the Palestinian issue which is the cause shared by all Arab and Muslim countries. However, he expressed surprise at the US decision to withdraw from International Conference as it decided to side with Israel. He said, "We have not expected such bias from the sponsor of New World Order."

Concerning the Iraqi-Kuwaiti dispute on the Kuwaiti still held captive in Iraq, Saleh said that Kuwaiti leadership asked him to intercede in its favor in order to have the prisoners released. Yet, the Vice President of Iraq, Taha

Yaseen Ramadhan, confirmed to President Saleh that there were no Kuwaiti prisoners remaining in Iraq and that Iraq had transmitted a letter to the Arab League concerning this issue. Ramadhan also mentioned to Saleh that Iraq was ready to accept an investigation of this matter on Iraqi soil by the committee of the Arab Red Crescent.

The Yemeni president said that economic sanctions on Iraq should be lifted and that differences should be smoothed out as Iraq is member of the Arab Nation.

Regarding Yemen's position during the second Gulf War, Saleh insisted that the country stance was misunderstood as did not side with any of the belligerants. He stressed out that Yemen condemned the invasion of Kuwait but refused in the same time any foreign interference in the problem. He said that Arab leaders could have been able to convince Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait but those leaders were forced to take other decisions at the fateful summit in Cairo.

Concerning the Yemeni-Kuwaiti relations, the president described them as normal and improving.

The president denied any silent conflict with Eritrea as the dispute over Hunaish Island has been settled. He added that the disagreements on the areas of traditional fishing will be solved by law experts from both countries, indicating that the Eritrean Foreign Minister will visit Yemen soon in this objective.

Saleh depicted the relations with Saudi Arabia as at their best, especially after the signature of the Jeddah Border Treaty. He also mentioned that the German company, Hans Luft Bild, chosen to conduct demarcation, is now carrying out field surveys in cooperation with Yemen and Saudi technical teams. On the issue of Yemeni expatriates in Saudi Arabia, President Saleh stressed that the situation was now different as Saudi

Arabia has to give priority to its own people in getting jobs to meet the demand of a growing population. However, he ended saying that "We should give priorities to other people not because the treaties say so but because we are neighbors."

Arab Globalization vs. International Globalization



few years ago, many European countries held a conference to study and discuss means and ways for staving off problems and conflicts in Europe. The attendees discussed plans on how to spot areas of potential tensions and how to try to trace their causes and offer solutions to avoid these conflicts. The Europeans seem to have developed a mechanism aimed at prevention a problem from degenerating into a conflict instead of waiting for its emergence and then trying to solve it. This mechanism can without any doubt of save time, efforts and many other things. There is no need to go any further in the European lengthy and successful efforts to realize the European unity. I still remember that the conference came out with a multilateral strategy to implement this project which could be a practical application of the proverb, " Prevention is better than cure." What the European leaders and experts had done at that conference was only part of a multidimensional plan to achieve the European unity.

As Arab countries, we belong to one family sharing a common nationality and history. We are in great need of political, economic, cultural, and social unity. We possess all the required elements to realize this goal. What we really need is an investment in these fields and the willingness to act con-

In fact, I remembered this European conference while attending a series of meetings at the Intellectual

Symposium on Future of Yemeni-Gulf tems. The more time passes the Relations which I reckon being a big step forward in the reconciliation and cementing of Arab-Arab relations.

The Intellectual Symposium on "Future of Yemeni-Gulf Relations" was held in Sana'a on 7-8 August 2001. It could prompt many Arab writers and intellectuals to tackle this vital issue. It is indeed a question of essential interest for all Arab intellectuals and thinkers specialized in Arab social, political and economic affairs. Although the symposium's title seems to be regional in its scope, its jurisdiction in reality goes beyond and include the entire Arab nation and all Arab countries. It can be argued that tackling and drawing the boundaries of Yemeni-Gulf relations can be taken as an example of inter-Arab relations which can introduce a more comprehensive picture covering Arab-Arab relations as a whole.

Over two days, the symposium offered discussions on various working papers dealing with Arab relations and workshops laying down proposals and recommendations. I do not want to go into the details of the symposium but I thought to concentrate on one of the visions that the symposium had come out with: "Considering unity of the Arab peninsula and the Gulf and the unity of its issues as a launch pad for continuous actions, for further meetings and dialogues, as well as an impetus for joint cultural cooperation."

A long time ago, world nations adopted the conclusion that being part of various political, economic and social groups is primordial. Although many nations were aware of this necessity decades ago, the world of the third millennium has made them realize that their inclusion into groups and blocks should be sped up in order to keep pace with rapid developments, more especially in technology which plays an important role in our daily lives.

A closer look into Arab reality would lead us to dreadful conclusions. As one nation, we are divided into more than 22 politically separate entities with a variety of political and economic sysmore seeds of division are growing within our large Arab entity. Our ruling regimes are greatly responsible of our nation's division instead of trying to unify her ranks. On the other hand, they try hard to strengthen their individual ties with other world regions without even bothering to give priority to inter-Arab relations. The equation is thus turned upside down making national policies run against the unification trend that is supposed to be the priority.

We can find some weak and incomplete Arab associations, such as the League of Arab States, the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC), and the Maghreb States grouping. However, they are in such condition that they do not play a real and effective role in unify-

ing the Arab people and they fall short of their goals to create such groups in order to meet supposedly Arab people

The Arab League was established more than half a century ago. It has achieved so far very little and has not raised to the level of its declared objectives. It has not achieved the Arab unity nor Arab economic unity. It has not even been really successful in solving disputes or disagreements occurring among the Arab states, nor it has drawn up a practical mechanism to do that. The Arab League is thus far behind its stated objectives. The League's failure is obvious in political, economic and military issues, as it has never been able to settle successfully Arab-Arab disputes. The most recent example is the crisis between Iraq and Kuwait that led in 1990 to a devastating war which has made the Iraqi people suffer from its consequences. The Arab League played a negative role that paved the way for foreign intervention and consequently the occupation of the Gulf region under the pretext of protecting



the area against the so-called Iraqi threats. In fact, it is aimed at protecting the US and British imperialist interests, particularly in maintaining flow of Arab oil to continue their hostile war machine against the Arab nation. The Arab League is in practice an enhancement of Arab division into more than 22 political entities having a similar number of different orientations.

As I mentioned earlier, other Arab regional groups are present but have not met so far the aspirations of the

Arab people. In the beginning of the 80s in the 20th century, the GCC was created and six Arab Gulf states were its members: the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Oman, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Kuwait. Iraq, though a Gulf state, was excluded for various reasons and most probably because of various foreign interventions. This situation also applies to Yemen. After more that twenty years since its establishment, the GCC has not achieved much, neither internally nor regionally. Population of the six states are Arabs, still it needs visas and passports to travel from one member state to another and duration of their stays are limited. No educational, political, economic, military and monetary unity has so far been achieved within the GCC. Disputes among the GCC member states, such as those related to border demarcation or territorial sovereignty, are not and could not be solved by the leadership of the association. An stark illustration of this inability is the continuous dispute between Qatar and Bahrain over some islands was solved after both countries resorted to arbitration at the International Court of Justice in The Hague. Is not that

The ball is now in hands of the Arab people to urgently change the Arab miserable reality. They depend on political parties, organizations and a multitude of civil society groups to

shameful?

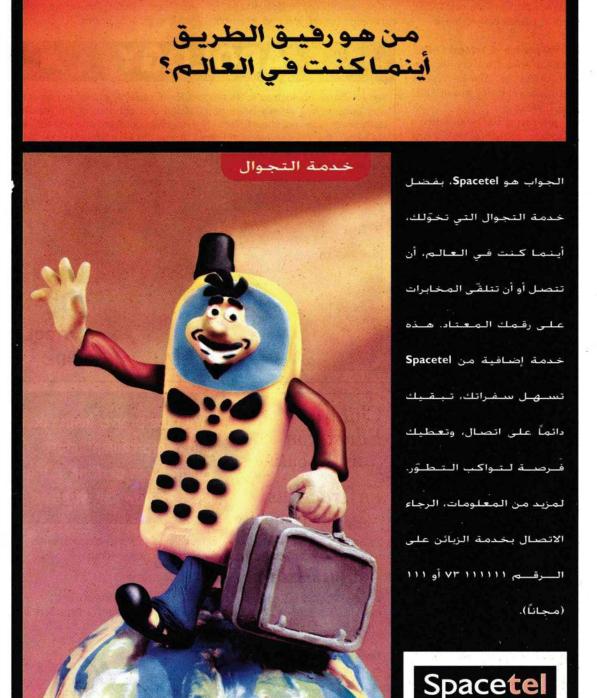
activate this important role. They should work out an Arab version of globalization tailored-made to the Arab nation in all fields. By this, they will be capable of adapting their daily life and to deal with and establish a relationship with the "global" globalization.

On the political level, all Arab political parties and movements should unify their political attitudes by putting down political barriers which separate them. First, they must unify and coordinate their policies within the boundaries of their own countries and come out with one stand towards Arab issues. Then, they should hold a political conference with an agenda covering all Arab issues with proposed realistic solutions and recommendations. They, as a political popular front, would refer them to their countries' leaders by calling a summit conference. This would place their leaders on the touchstone to rescue the nation from the deteriorating situation and averting the tragedy from happening. The most alarming crisis, which has been an invincible obstacle for more than a decade, is the situation between Kuwait and Iraq. Arab political parties and movements must promptly take some initiatives to find a peaceful settlement to this tragic crisis affecting not only the Arab people in both Iraq and Kuwait but also the entire Arab nation. Solving this crisis would make the nation devote all its efforts to backing the Arab people of Palestine in their heroic resistance against the Zionist usurpatory entity and the spearhead of US imperialism in the region. The economic situation within the Arab states is calamitous. Huge amounts of Arab capital are invested abroad and not in the Arab countries themselves except for limited amounts. There is not really an effective economic cooperation and integration among the Arab states and the so-called Arab economic unity is just an entity dreamed of. Arab countries, especially the Gulf states, hire millions of foreign

labor instead of Arab manpower. The latter is not less capable or efficient than foreign labor, but for mainly political or other undeclared reasons, Arab labor is excluded. In my point of view, foreign labor should not be hired if it is at the expense of Arab labor. Arab governments, unfortunately, deal with Arab citizens from other Arab countries in accordance with criteria and policies subject to the nature of relations between the ruling regimes. On many occasions, Arab employees are expelled or deported by some governments because a dispute or a restrained relationship arose with the employees' country of origin. Political disputes between Arab regimes always lead to severance of economic agreements and contracts, heedless of their respective peoples' interests, 7

Hence, it is the duty of Arab businessmen and commercial corporations to establish inter-Arab trade and economic transactions, i.e. in a manner leading to create an Arab economic integration. Their major investments must be first in Arab countries, as their attitude would enhance and activate an integrated Arab economy by the creation of thousands of jobs and a common interest. It would be the Arabic version of economic globalization within the boundary of the Arab world. This would thus form a solid and broad economic base capable of trade transactions with other world economic associations in the West and the East.

All these proposals and ideas need to be urgently planned and rapidly implemented. This fight will be of benefit for the entire Arab nation because time is running away and developments in the political, economic, technological and scientific fields are so fast. Let us move swiftly before it is too late! The future generations would not pardon us if we fail to do so, especially if they would find themselves lagging behind other



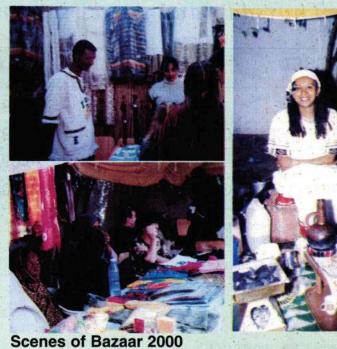
PAD to Host BAZAAR 2001

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Yemen & China **Towards a Wider Trade Exchange**

emen and China signed various agreements at the conclusion of the 5th round of meeting of the joint Yemeni-Chinese committee held in Beijing. The agreements aim at enhancing the bilateral relations and developing the horizons of trade, economic, medical and cultural cooperation. The meetings of the 5th round of the Yemen-Chinese joint committee coincided with the 45th anniversary of establishing distinguished and friendly relations between both countries which have undergone development in different fields.

Yemen and China strive to increase trade exchange, expand the fields of bilateral investments and provide facilities and regulations that ensure the creation of an investment partnership, particularly at the Aden Free Zone. During the 5th round meetings of the Yemen-Chinese joint committee in Beijing, possibilities of Chinese participation in investing in Aden Free Trade Zone were also discussed. On the other hand, the Peoples' Republic of China expressed its willingness to upgrade the Textile Factory in Aden in order to meet the demands of the neighboring Arab and African markets. This statement came during the visit paid by the deputy-chairman of the National Council of the Chinese Advisory Congress to Aden Free Trade Zone. Furthermore, Beijing promised to encourage Chinese corporations to invest in the Republic of Yemen, especially in the field of electronics assembling and textile industry as well as providing these plants with the required trained manpower.

Yemeni-Chinese relations undoubtedly progressed following the visit paid by President Saleh to China in February, 1998. Since then, many Chinese companies have flown to Yemen for implementing road construction projects and investing in oil exploration.

It is also worth mentioning that Yemen and China are bound by bilateral agreements and memorandums of understanding for enhancing economic cooperation. In addition, the People's Republic of China grants Yemen 155

scholarships for high school graduates and provide training courses for Yemeni instructors working in the Industrial Vocational Institute in Sana'a as well as three scholarships for the top three graduates of the institute. Similarly, Yemen gives 10 university scholarships to Chinese students.

China finds in Yemen a wide market for its different products such as electronics, house appliances, and other equipment. Meanwhile, China signed an agreement with the Republic of Yemen to buy Yemeni oil directly and not through London Market. On the other side, many Yemeni firms opened import offices in China.

Subsequently, the Yemeni-Chinese relations will witness further development in the upcoming years. Yemen finds indeed in Chinese moderate foreign policy, its support for the Palestinian cause, and her policy of non-intervention in the internal affairs of foreign countries an encouraging factor for enhancing relations between the two friendly nations.

Towards Perpetual Development for Growing Yemeni Coffee

he College of Agriculture at Sana'a University will soon witness the first farmers' meeting dealing with the famous Yemeni coffee tree. Academic personalities, experts, and specialists in this field are expected to attend this meeting in order to exchange their experiences with farmers in growing this tree by developing high standards of cultivation and to draw plans for increasing coffee production and its exports to the foreign markets. Reliable sources within the College of Agriculture indicated that coffee samples will be examined scientifically in order to specify the best qualities together with their regional origins in Yemen. Last year, Arab and American Companies made purchasing orders of Yemeni coffee after Yemen's participation in several international fairs, such as Cairo and Dubai, to advertise Yemeni coffee abroad.

USD 7,500 per ton of Yemeni Coffee According to official sources, the purchasing offers of Yemeni coffee reached a price per ton of around USD 7,000 to 7,500.

After a price set at USD 400 per ton a few years ago, coffee was ranked first among all Yemeni products. As a result, two projects to export coffee were established in Haraz and Yafe' regions at a cost of USD 57 million. Two other projects, one in Razeh in Saada'a governorate and in Anes in Dhamar, will be ready soon. It is worth mentioning that these projects were set up close to the coffee farms.

Indications that national budget will benefit from coffee exports

The Ministry of Agriculture points out that the increase in coffee production could impact positively Yemeni exports and Yemen's budget. This can be achieved by the expansion of coffee production in all fertile areas. The fifth year plan for the period 2001-2005 includes the construction of small dams, the utilization of modern techniques of irrigation, encouraging the farmers to establish coffee storage, and the replacement of the old trees with new ones. Moreover, the experts in coffee growing have to instruct the farmers how to produce in proper ways the best qualities of Yemeni coffee.

Statistics also indicated that the Ministry of Agriculture established a number of water collection basins and irrigation techniques in all coffee growing areas with the financial help of France. They added that there are currently 18 nurseries scattered all around Yemen and that areas with coffee plants are estimated to have reached 33,443 hectares.

Local efforts to increase coffee pro-

In absence of investors and capital in Yemen, cooperative societies were set

up by locales. Among these cooperatives, Al-Kara Cooperative in Abyan governorate was established at the cost of YR 5 million and encompasses around 3 million coffee trees. 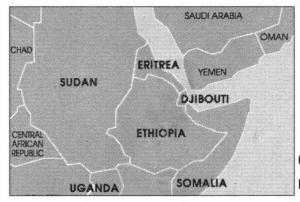

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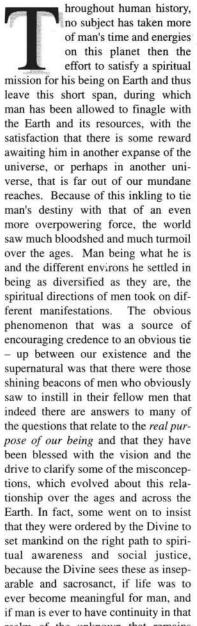

On Missionary Work



much in the knowledge and possession of the Creator, but where great reward awaits him, for having been a continuation of the ongoing parade of human beings who have dedicated their life to fulfill the Divine requirements of a world in which spiritual awareness and social justice prevail universally These series of philosophers, prophets and messengers could never be underestimated in terms of the role they had in shaping much of the present social and moral suasions that have taken shape here and there in the world.

As we come closer to our time, we are less prone to find men claim direct guidance and instructions from the Divine, especially as Islam came and produced the creed that entailed a direct relationship between all worshippers and the divine and insisted that all the past efforts are part of one and the same religious culture brought down in a series that accommodates to man's perceptive capabilities, which evolved along with the human experience. Its different manifestations (even within Islam itself) are no more than corruptions introduced by men that arose out of deviations inspired more out of worldly quest than spiritual drive, and a full comprehension of the simplicity and an appreciation of the true powers of the Divine, Al-Mighty. Because of man's strong desire not to break from the spiritual aura that must be a part of his being, men are bound to attach themselves with any calls to enliven this spiritual connection and indeed many people take it upon themselves to ride on the bandwagon of this

Islam that insisted that all worshippers are missionaries of the faith by, first of all, living Islam and then by portraying Islam to others, through convincing dialogue and good deeds - with obvious good intent - and by showing the logic of the creed and the natural link between Islam and life.

Missionary activity for Christianity became more intense after the separation of the state and the church, and the state could no longer be expected to impose Christianity on the subjects on behalf of the Church.

Because of national interests and other worldly aspirations, sometimes missionary activity was tied to political momentum, such as the "White Man's Burden". On the other hand, because of people's attachment to the spiritual could not be easily relinquished, even after the separation of church and state, there were many who saw in this an opportunity to make easy money and achieve glory and power, and went on to solicit support for their "missionary quests". The matter was made easier, because these missionary efforts were seldom subject to transparency or accountability, and the efforts were not under evaluation by any form of public

It is worth mentioning that there are around half a million active Christian missionaries throughout the world!

While it is true that the exploitation of religious sentiment is a widespread phenomenon, in both Christian and Islamic constituencies, it goes without saying that it is much more institutionalized in the West than in the Islamic believers, whose humble way of life was clear testimony to their sincerity and truth of purpose, and whose faith provided strong guarantees of the seriousness of their quests and the honesty of their intents, not to mention the wisdom they projected.

Many Moslems have voiced concern at the large scale missionary work undertaken by Christian missionary organizations in their midst, even before the Taliban of Afghanistan have decided to intervene, if we can assume that the Taliban are not doing this to project an overzealous advocacy for Islam, for the sake of public relations.

Whatever the case, we must also take care and guard ourselves against all suspicious missionary work, whether for Christianity or Islam, for there are those Moslem "missionaries" who evoke a very dubious front, as well, projecting a public image of religious piety - but little enlightenment - and when, in fact their methods and their own personal lives reveal them to be far from the class of missionaries, who spread Islam in Africa and Asia by relying on the simplicity of their own lives, their actual good deeds and the power of the message they were delivering in its appeal to common sense. The new breed of organized missionaries in Islam are living extremely well, if not lavishly, and their political aspirations are rigorously pursued as part of their "missionary" work.

Yes, we must do all we can to protect Islam and Moslems from any foreign efforts to guide our religious persuasion, whether by people from other gently to create friction among Moslems, by insisting on their own rigid standards, which they themselves fail to apply, except in exaggerated surface renditions, such as appearance, clothing, etc., and forgetting that Moslems should work together to find unity of purpose and destiny, before the other missionaries find the right climate for propagating other religious persuasions. To defend Islam, we must first live Islamic, not show Islamic" To the person(s) who sent me the literature on some of the non-Islamic mis-

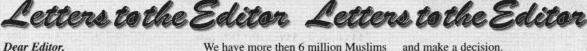
While bidding farewell to Bodine, we are welcoming James Edmond the new US ambassador to Yemen.

Diesel and Environment

iesel is one of the most dangerous products for both men and environment. Its poisonous substances pollute air and cause many problems to all. Every bakery in Yemeni cities and means of transportation, including micro-buses mini-buses, use diesel. Surprisingly enough, Yemen became one of the few countries to import second-hand diesel-power engines. Every Tom, Dick, and Harry comes to Yemen. These engines are sold cheaply and publicly. From a Report Issued by PHPEC **Alarming Bell of AIDS Rings in Yemen**

he Publ Population Public Health, **Environment Committee** of the Parliament issued a report on AIDS in Yemen describing the situation of AIDS in the country and the measures to be taken for controlling this epidemic. Enclosed is the text of the report.

The Epidemic Situation of AIDS in

The report issued by the Ministry of Health on the situation of AIDS in Yemen stated that it is hard to evaluate the size of the problem due to the absence of a specialized unit able to detect epidemics. Moreover, the reported AIDS cases are not registered appropriately for many reasons such

- Improper diagnostic of HIV positive cases at hospitals
- Difficulty of reaching hospitals
- Private hospitals & laboratories do not notify the competent authorities on the discovered cases

The first AIDS case was discovered in 1990. However, the continuous rise in the number of AIDS-infected patients means that more and more people are now infected with AIDS.

The long period of incubation of HIV virus makes it difficult to identify the exact number of infected people as they live for many years without having any symptoms of the disease. Furthermore, the available data and information do not give the exact size of the epidemic but merely give indica-

tors on the size of the problem. The number of AIDS patients reached more than 806 cases as of the first quarter of the year 2000. Most of these cases were discovered by accident.

Sexual intercourse is considered to be the principal way of transmitting HIV virus. While the ratio of male to female patients was 4 to 1 in 1995, it went down to 2 to 1 in 1999 which shows that females are now more vulnerable. The report stated that the ratio of Yemenis to be infected with AIDS represents 44 percent of the total number of infected patients in Yemen. The number of cases registered in 1999 are nine times bigger than these in 1993. The number of registered cases is also very alarming as HIV positive cases increased four times in 1995 and 1994. So far, 96 persons have died since the discovery of AIDS in Yemen. The report discloses that most of the cases are within the age group from 20 to 39 years and accounts for 96% of the total number of the infected cases.

Preventive Measures

The Government report warns of ignoring the extent of the AIDS problem since the number of the infected cases has reached in the past two years 806 AIDS and HIV cases. Thus, concrete steps should be taken for controlling this epidemic by adopting the following two approaches:

- Spreading awareness among the people on the ways the HIV virus is trans-
- Getting ready to combat this epidemic through the early detection of the HIV positive cases

Furthermore, the report focuses on the importance of continuing AIDS-fighting with the cooperation of the UN Anti-AIDS Program, created in 1986, since this epidemic has become a universal threat.

The practical steps taken by the government can be outlined as follows: The establishment of the National Program for Combatting AIDS and Sexually Transmitted Diseases and earmarking a fixed budget for this pro-

goals of this program have be drawn and the duties of the program officer and coordinators have been specified. The objectives of the newly created program focused on:

- Preventing the spread of AIDS
- Controlling the effects incurred on the AIDS patients and their families. These two objectives can be achieved through adopting the following strate-
- Enhancing the role of mass media in spreading awareness of this serious disease and mapping out the necessary
- Providing treatment for the AIDS
- Strengthening the role of epidemic detection and following up the different activities of the program
- Checking the safety of the tools used for surgeries at private

and pubic hospitals - Rendering care to the

- AIDS and HIV patients - Training a specialized medical team in Yemen and overseas
- Enhancing inter-sectoral coordination among the concerned bodies
- Promoting researches and studies related to AIDS epidemic.

Remarks & Outcomes

- The committee noticed that the government's report on the AIDS epidemic and HIV is full of mistakes, especially the unavailability of sufficient and accurate information and statistics pertaining to the AIDS epidemic. Moreover, the plan for combatting AIDS is more theoretical than practical since it is based

Moreover, the general and detailed

on unconfirmed information and indicators. The government's side has made many justifications that have been partially confirmed by the committee, however, some of the mistakes can be avoided if the government is serious enough to control this epidemic. In addition, the measures taken by the government are not following up to the required standard despite the establishment of the National Program for Fighting AIDS.

"Yemen Needs More Than 20 Specialized Heart Center"

the most fatal diseases brought up by the modcivilization. Medical reports by some specialized medical magazines indicate that heart diseases are the cause number one of deaths, particularly in the advanced world.

Accordingly, treatment of heart diseases require great competence which can not be provided by developing countries due to their inability to establish specialized heart treatment centers. However, individual initiatives could sometimes be tantamount to these of governments. Professor Abdullah Raweh, who works as a heart surgeon in Italy, is a perfect illustration of this tendency. Moreover, Dr. Raweh is the Chairman of Amenah Medical Society for Heart Diseases which coordinates with some hospitals in Italy the opportunity of providing free treatment for Yemeni patients suffering from heart

Yasser Mohammed Ahmed of Yemen Times met Dr. Raweh, Here are some and excerpts of the interview:

Q: Can you introduce yourself to Yemen Times' readers?

A: Firstly, I'd like to thank Yemen Times for this interview. Regarding my personal biography, I was born in Taiz. In 1984, I joined the medical college of Bologna University in Italy. I got a doctorate degree with distinction in heart surgery and blood circulation diseases. After I obtained my doctorate degree, I started working for some private and public hospitals in Italy and the Netherlands. In fact, working in those hospitals gave me the chance to meet many professionals in heart surgery from all over the world. Similarly, during my work in Italy, I established excellent relations with some non-governmental organizations (NGOs) along with many social and political person-

Q: How could you manage your relations with the different organizations there in a way that could help heart patients in Yemen?

A: This is a very important question and I would like to highlight one of the



supervision, an Italian medical team managed to come to al-Thawra Hospital in Sana'a with the objective of conducting several heart surgeries. Eleven of them were performed on patients with serious heart problems. The team's members were so eager to do these operations as they came to know the extent of suffering from these patients. We used an up-to-date equipment brought by the team from Italy and very sophisticated medical techniques were used when performing the mentioned operations. In addition, no artificial hearts or lungs were used during these operations and this raised therefore the success rates and fast healing of the operated patients.

Q: Are there any kind of cooperation with regard to the training of Yemeni surgeons?

A: Besides providing treatment to patients, we have taken into consideration training the Yemeni cadres involved in this field. Principally, we have agreed with the Yemeni officials to send a team of Italian surgeons to Yemen once every three months and to grant 10 scholarships aimed at training a complete medical team.

Q: Regarding Amenah Society...How has originated the idea of its establishment?

A: Amenah Society was established at the end of the year 1997 as the result of death of my mother because of a heart attack. My mother could have been saved if she was provided with a proper medical treatment. Following this dreadful experience, I started thinking about the establishment of a society for helping heart patients in my homeland. In fact, the creation of the Amenah Society, which was named after my mother, came in a desire to help the sons of my motherland who need health care. We paid a particular attention to children with heart diseases.

The first group of 13 children was sent in Italy at the end of the year 1997 and was followed by other groups for a total of 332 heart patients. The last groups included adult heart patients as well as patients suffering from bloodrelated diseases. The selection of those needing treatment in European countries comes after screening the patients at the society in addition to receiving the patients referred to us by the commedical authorities. Furthermore, we are also investigating with close attention the applications in terms of financial abilities of the applicants since the poor patients are priori-

Q: What are the future plans of the society?

A: We intend to go ahead with providing treatment for heart patients and enhancing our relations with international non-governmental organizations. Similarly, I call the concerned responsible at the Ministry of Health to cooperate with us by offering the necessary facilities to the society. On the same level, the society intends to establish heart treatment centers in different governorates in cooperation with the World Health Organization and the Emirates Red Crescent Association chaired by Sheikh Hamadan bin Zayed Al-Nahyan. Within the framework of the different activities of the society, we opened the door for providing treatment for the aging heart patients.

When Doctors Forget Scissors in Patients' Abdomens

he fatal mistakes of the Yemeni surgeons make us laugh and cry. The doctors turned out to be the death messengers instead of being the saviors. They had to get rid of merciful feelings to treat people as animals but even animals should also be treated well. Visiting the public hospitals around the country gives you an opportunity to see what is going on.

How can a doctor be satisfied when he dares to forget his scissors inside the abdomen of the suffering patient who hurried to the hospital

Wagedah Abdullwahab, a 18 years old girl and a student at the secondary school in Taiz, was only suffering from appendicitis. Doctors of the Military Hospital decided to carry out a surgery to remove her appendicitis which was causing her pain, but the surgery turned to a tragedy. The unskilled doctor removed a part of the girl's intestines

but forgot to treat her appendicitis.

Wagedah's parents never thought that the surgery would cause their daughter more pain instead of seeing a smile once again to that beautiful face.

Wagedah's pain increased and her family took her from one hospital to the other and spent a lot of money to cure her but all their efforts remained idle. Aeshah Ahmed Abdu, 10 years old, widespread presence of private hospibelieved that the patient should be transferred to the Military hospital in Sana'a. There, the doctors were surprised to find the appendicitis still incompetent surgeons performed an

to be cured but finding instead more suffering. The other victim was only suffering from appendicitis but woke up from the surgery its intestines missing.

Some surgeons might even by mistake amputate the patients leg or hand or any part of his limps.

Such serious mistakes are committed daily in both public and private hospitals scattered in the country. As a result, the helpless citizens found no other way but to turn to jugglers who claim to know about the herbal medicine and the the rapeutical effects of reading specific verses of the holy Qura'an to cure

During the last decade, such popular medicine has widely spread all over the country.

present after the operation while the cutting of the so-called surgeon was far away from the localization of pain. Instead of treating Wagedah, he had worsened her situation.

Last January, the German doctors opened Wagedah's abdomen and removed the appendicitis which caused

her pain before surgical operation. He also tried to the patient's intestines, but the pain went on. The surgeries performed on in

February and March were still unsuccessful and the poor girl did not go back to school after having encountered the so-called doctors and hospitals.

The little child Ra'ad Mohammed Kasem was admitted to the hospital due to fever. The doctors thought that he should be kept in the hospital to be monitored. But instead of treating his fever, they amputated toes of his right leg after a couple of months of hospitalization.

The shy baby Randa Mansour Alkamaly lost her left hand as she was amputated by one of the unskilled doctors at the Yemeni Saudi Hospital in Hajah governorate.

Finally, they took her to a German was hospitalized in one of the private medical team visiting Taiz who medical institutions in Taiz governorate in 1999. She was only suffering from clubfoot on her right leg as it was then shorter than the left foot. The

operation thought to remove this stigma but, instead, the leg turned 7cm shorter than the left. So she was kept at home not moving at all. After being checked by one of the Egyptian specialists in bones surgery, she was found suffering from insufficient calcium and no surgical operation should have been conducted.

Dr. Abdullwahab Alghorbani, General Manager of the Medical Affairs Office in Taiz, talked about the mistakes made by the doctors and the legal procedures to be adopted in such cases as follow-

If we are sure that one of the doctors has committed a medical error because of ignorance and because of being careless, we are sending him to the public prosecution. Dr. Abdulwahab believes that, "Most of the mistakes committed by doctors and other medical staff are no more than technical errors during surgeries. Some come from carelessness, while a few are deliberately committed. Though I do not believe that a doctor will commit a To avoid in the future further medical tioned by the authorities. The files of mistake deliberately."

He also told us that, "Concerning Wagedah's and Ra'ad's cases, we have already formed a committee to study the mistakes which resulted in their tragedies and to send reports on this regard to the Public Health Ministry." He added, "We are proud to form the first medical committee in Taiz which include doctors of all specializations to bear the responsibility of determining the kind of medical mistakes committed by the doctors. We consider this a victory achieved by Taiz governorate as it is the first initiative of its kind."

The Chairman of the Doctors and Pharmacists Syndicate, Dr. Sultan Al.Doba'aee, believes that the increase of these kinds of mistakes is due to the tals which lack the minimum medical equipment and sufficient qualifications of Yemeni cadres in the medical sector as well as in the other sectors. Most of these private medical units and hospitals are practicing without having

being granted the proper licenses. Some of the licenses were even granted to businessmen and Sheikhs who had no knowledge of medicine.

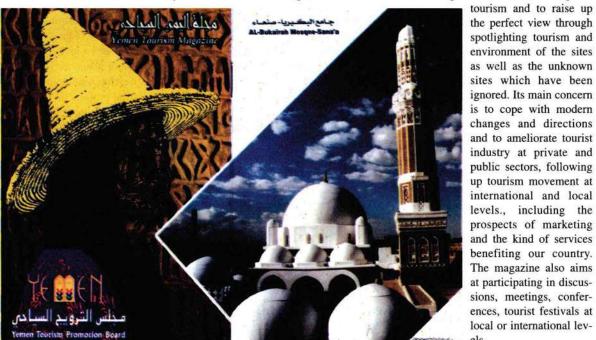

owry is one of the biggest problems that the Yemeni youth is facing. This is a very bad social phenomenon with numerous negative consequences. As young people cannot live decently with the girls they want to marry because of the high dowry requested by the bride family, many of them use illegal ways to be financially viable.

In this article, we will shed light on this social problem and reflect on the negative aspects caused by the huge increase in dowry.

God created both men and women to complement each other. They can not live separately. Therefore, Islam recommends marriage and pushes Muslims to marry to each other. Our prophet, our good and ideal example, married his daughter for an iron ring. He also married another Muslim for some verses from the Holy Qura'an. However, our society is currently suf-

fering from the families demands for high dowry. The greed of some parents has gone beyond what words can describe. They ask for high amounts of money that most of the youth will never be able to afford. These parents look at their daughters as a commodity and nothing else.

The strict attitudes of parents in this regard has led to perversion and spread of immoral practices among many young people. Consequently, girls get married to a wealthy person or to an elderly whose number is rising. Youths find themselves helpless in such a situation. Therefore, they prefer to travel and look for job opportunities abroad. Most of them stay there and marry foreigners. I don not think that there is any available solutions for this phenomenon which has become part of our culture and conventions.

The expensive dowry and other requirements made by the girl's family are not at all affordable. Due to all these endless requirements (parties, clothes, lunch party, qat, money for the money, and so one), the young Yemeni has to leave the girl he loves and then to remain bachelor. These conditions lay obstacles in front of the youth who wants to marry and have a stable life and many may be inclined to have a perverted life.

This problem comes from the society which is divided into three main segments: the wealthy segment, the middle class and the lower segments. The economic factor and the standard of living is the basis of this division.

The duty of the Islamic law on the question of marriage is to follow instructions and teachings of the prophet. So improving living conditions would not represent a problem with regard to high dowry.

In addition to the role of the citizen in the question of dowry, the activation of the law of dowry by the government is also one of the main factors of the problem. Both are concerned by the spreading of the problem awareness and providing services such as appropriate housing.

The national committee for women is supposed to discuss such matters and propose suitable solutions by holding meetings, implementing programs, and working out on future plans such as awareness symposiums to be aired on regular broadcasts of television and

he whole world, local and international organizations, and governmental and non-governmental institutions celebrated the international day of illiteracy eradication on September 8th. The idea of the International Day came after a meeting of the Education Ministers in 1965 and was adopted by the UNESCO in 1966. Thus, every year, on September 8th, the world community honors the exerted efforts done by the hard-working individuals in the field of education and alleviation of illiteracy. The advanced countries already resolved this issue of systematic essential principles of education, illiteracy eradication, and women's enrollment in schools. However, the third world countries are still struggling to tackle the problems in basic education for all, while in the advanced countries the illiterate are those who do not know how to use a computer. Undoubtedly, a comparative study between advanced and developing countries is somewhat far-reaching. Development and progress in the developing countries depends on taking great interest in education and taking care of old people. In Yemen, for example, the problem of illiteracy is only the main concern of "educationists" who have tried to overcome the challenges faced by the spe-

cialists and those who work on the educational and pedagogical fields. Yemen decided to deal with this issue via two approaches:

Illiteracy... A Time Bomb

· Preparation of five studies exposing international efforts and experiences in the educational field, and assessing the efforts to be made nationally.

· Design of a systematic study to eradicate illiteracy in the Republic of

In Yemen, illiteracy eradication institutions were established in 1990 as a unified body covering the whole country. In the northern cities of the Republic of Yemen, the first experimental campaign was created in 1971 and 1972 to eradicate illiteracy in Yemen in cooperation with the Arabic Body within five cities, Sana'a, Taiz, Al-Hodeidah, Ibb, and Rada'a.

In 1974, the General Education Law was issued. Chapter 7 of this law was specifically spoke about illiteracy eradication. In 1987, a republican decree was issued to launch a comprehensive national campaign to eradicate illiteracy particularly among the adults. It was estimated at that time that the number of illiterates reached 2.826.405, and among them 1.710.105

In the northern and eastern regions (previously South Yemen), the number of illiterates reached in 1967 almost 90 percent of the population. In 1973, the Population Census indicated that their number equalled 736.224. This repre-

Illiteracy Eradication and Adult Education after the Unification of

A Republican decree (Decree No. 28) was issued in 1992 to set up, as part of the Ministry of Education, a illiteracy eradication body and adult education section to make clear that both are vital and distinguished sectors in the Republic of Yemen. Recent studies revealed that the number of illiterate people rose to 5.381.150. This increase can be attributed to a number of rea-

The natural increase of the population as well as the population growth in Yemen have reached 3.7 percent. The main reason behind illiteracy is the non-attendance of classes in remote

It is our duty, rather than the responsibility of a given party, to eradicate illiteracy in our homeland which has been facing a spreading of illiteracy not only among the adults but also the children.

One of Bawazir Short Stories: "Three Days in Prison"

First Day: Wednesday 21 April 1965 It is six o'clock in the evening and I am still at work in the store where there are three women appearing to ignore the curfew as they have engaged themselves in a lengthy chat about the latest fashions of the shawal and the evening dresses-I wonder where they will wear them on such nights. Had it not been for their beautiful faces, I would have kicked them out, but "Beauty is awesome", as I often say, holds true. This awesomeness of beauty will without doubt make me spend the night in prison, but I remember that all the people of the city will be in prison tonight too, and I see no use in running away from one prison to another. But because "the devil you know is better than the devil you do not know", I prefer the prison I know -my bedroom. I, therefore, have to end their conversation and give them a choice: either to buy or leave. I thought, if these ladies' beautiful faces can intercede for them for staying in my store a little late after the curfew has started, my face will surely not plead for me with the British soldiers if I am late even for one second. Pointing at two pieces of clothes before me I said, " Please make up your minds. Which colour do you want? The pink or the purple so I can cut it now; or do you want to cut off my livelihood?" One woman smiles while the other looks in fascination at both pieces and appears to be ready for a long chat that will never end if she starts it. I have become outraged at that moment and as an indication that I have run out of patience and time, I have stridden to the door with the keys in my hand. Realizing that I am serious and nothing will make me change my mind, the awesome beauties have started begging me to give them what they want and, tempted by Eve, I have given in and have proceeded with the sale although only a few minutes are left before the curfew. In seconds I am outside the store staring at the back of the deluxe limousine driving away with the three women who have not even bothered to offer me a lift. The street is totally deserted and in

order to make up for the lost time I have started to run to get home in time -before six thirty. While running, I have felt that there has been something running behind me but cannot figure out what it is: a dog or a British soldier, but who cares as both are the same to me. I have then realized that I am in no danger as I still have a few extra minto where we live. I say 'we' because I am not living by myself but have about ten other people living with me in the same single room, where each one of us has no more than one metre to lie down. After much effort I get home, enter the narrow stairway and run up cursing the occupiers on every single step. In the room, I have been welcomed by my curious room-mates, who have thought that I have an accident, but when they have found that I have nothing interesting to tell, they have given up and left me alone anticipating what the days are holding for us and trying to foresee tomorrow's dawn breaking through today's darkness.

Second Day: Thursday 22 April 1965 It is six o'clock at night. My thin body forces its way through a narrow alley crowded with moving human bodies that seem to be driven by someone or pulled violently by invisible strings attached to them. In my right hand I am carrying some fruit, wrapped in an old newspaper. This fruit will be my dinner for this evening, which I will be spending at home from six thirty.

I force my way through the crowd and along both sides of the alley and notice the shops are closed in an obvious nervousness. A water vendor is spilling what remains of the iced water on the ground with his eyes watching in sorrow the spilt water forming a crooked line that runs down the alley only to be trodden by the shoes of the scared, moving bodies. During my walk the street is gradually deserted and by the time I get home there are only two or three people who appear determined to enjoy the last minutes of their freedom. At home my roommates have gathered on the small roof outside our room watching a television; I do not know how they have agreed to buy it together. It must be the only time they have agreed to do something together during my stay in the residence dubbed "Noah's Ark" because of the diversity of its tenants with their various dispositions and interests. I squeeze myself through the crowd and sit down watching programs most of which have been imported from Britain just like the law itself by which the occupiers are running the country. I have tried without much success to brush aside the nightmarish thoughts that are raging in my head, instead I feel more depressed so I have got up and entered the room and switched the light on. My mates have complained at first, but quickly have given up and got involved with the

show. From the window I see everything -houses, the street etc. -is still and silent. At the other end of the street I notice a cow strutting down the street confidently in my direction. She appears unmistakably safe and free. I cannot help but to make a weird comparison between the free animal and the captive man. Honestly, I am envious of her and feel sad that I am treated less than a cow. I pull my head inside upon noticing a police car turning into the street. I go back to my mattress and in my spinning head there is still a lot I wish to say. A lot about the future I have to encounter and the present whose fetters I am trying to free myself from.

Third day: Friday 23 April 1965 Today is Friday, the Muslim weekend.

The scene of the closed shops on this day is familiar to everyone, but this day is significantly different from any previous Friday. Normally, on weekends I often stay home and sometimes never leave for the whole day. I always enjoy it simply because I spend it the way I like, but tonight will be different, though. The feeling that I am in prison spoils my weekend and makes me feel agitated and restless.

One hour has already passed since the curfew has started and these thoughts are still invading my head. I lean on the mattress looking at a newspaper which I am unable to read. At that moment I have lost all interest in everything and am incapable of reading or writing. Pushing myself, I have thrown the paper aside and stretched my hand for a pen and a paper. I have decided to write. But, I am puzzled. What can I write while I am imprisoned in this room and being robbed of my freedom? Hopelessly I have tried to find an appropriate topic for writing. Even if I write my writing will be void of life and freedom.

The pen starts fidgeting between my fingers and my agony is becoming excessively unbearable urging me to get rid of it. I have actually stood up to throw it out from the window. Through it I can see the city lying still under a thick blanket of heavy silence; the street looks like a long corridor in a dark prison whereas the tall buildings become the same size as narrow prison cells. From a distance I see the prison guard hitting the ground with his heavy feet. Suddenly my pen falls down on the sidewalk of the street in front of him. He steps over and smashes it, but this does not worry me as it is no longer useful. I have become certain that the pen, no matter how powerful and eloquent it may be, is able to do nothing. I return to my mattress feeling helpless and in despair. The moment I lie down I hear a powerful explosion coming from somewhere not far from where we live. It leaves me dumbfounded. Now I am absolutely certain that that explosion is more eloquent than the pen and more powerful than words.

That night I slept tight!

It's harmful for us and for the children to have unrealistic expectations about them and stress them to the extreme.

But unless we pester them, they might be negligent.

Sumaiya: I don't think that's true. We can, at best, encourage them, inculcate in them the right motivation and build their self-confidence. Set the ball in motion and the ball will roll itself. You don't need to give it a push every moment.

Ghania: I sometimes feel guilty. I'm not doing enough

Sumaiya: You're a typical example of parents who expect too much from children. And when the expectations are not fulfilled, parents see it as a blow to their own self esteem. Working women like you naturally feel more of a sense of guilt. They blame their working status for their children's underachievement.

You have rightly caught it, Sumaiya.

Sumaiya: You must change your perceptions. Exam is not the end of the world. You, first of all, should be calm and supportive. Advise your children to do their best and forget about the results. Help them to foster a positive attitude. Your negative reactions can create guilt feelings and depression in children.

And that is what we are going to talk about today. We will define Web server and Website.

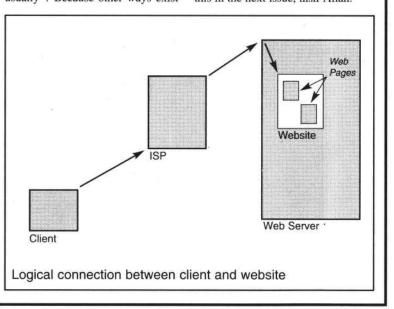

In fact, it connects to the web server following its IP address. Once the connection is established between the ISP and the web server, ISP passes on the request of the client to the web server asking it to respond. Misuse of Prepositions by Arabic Native Speakers

t is needless to say that English has gained and has been gaining greater importance in Yemen and in the Arab world. It is used in several walks of life, and it is taught in schools and universities. Furthermore, it provides employment opportunities on a scale, which probably no other language does. Prepositions are an extremely important area of grammar in both English and Arabic. An inappropriate use of a preposition may alter the intended meaning of a sentence or make it ungrammatical. A native speaker of Arabic learning English as a foreign language must be familiar with the syntax and, more importantly, the semantics of prepositions in English in order to establish an accurate and effective communication. It appears that most of the native speakers of Arabic do not use the appropriate preposition requested by the semantic and the syntactic

context of the sentence in particular and the discourse in general. This, most often, results in wrong interpretation by the recipient and sometimes results in a breakdown in communication. A translator too needs to have a fairly good knowledge of the prepositions in English so that his translation from Arabic into English and vice versa may be accurate and effective. Apart from being important for com-

munication, preposition is one of the most difficult areas of grammar in the sense that its use is hardly governed by any clear syntactic rules. The semantics of the preposition does play a role in its usage, but it is of little help when it comes to a choice between two prepositions with almost the same meaning. No rule states why afraid should be followed by of and not by from or with. The idiomatic choice, or let us say the idiosyncratic selection of a preposition in a particular context, causes great problems for non-native speakers of There is a correspondence between the

prepositions in English and the prepositions in Arabic. Prepositions in English and Arabic share indeed some common semantic features, but the choice of a preposition in English depends on the preceding verb/noun/adjective or on the following complement. A native speaker of Arabic, not fully familiar with this kind of choice of prepositions in English, chooses a preposition in English sharing the same semantic feature(s) with its counterpart in Arabic. In other words, a native speaker of Arabic decides of the equivalence (between a preposition in Arabic and a preposition in English and vice versa) on the basis of semantics and not on the basis of selecting restriction. This often results into un-idiomatic and wrong translation with regard to preposition. A native speaker of Arabic language

does not observe the co-occurrence restriction between a preposition and its complement or between a preposithe preceding and noun/verb/adjective. Therefore, confusion occurs when translating prepositions from English into Arabic and vice

The entire use of prepositions in the adjacent list will help the Arabic native speakers avoiding mistakes, because the difference between English and Good English is usually the right preposition.

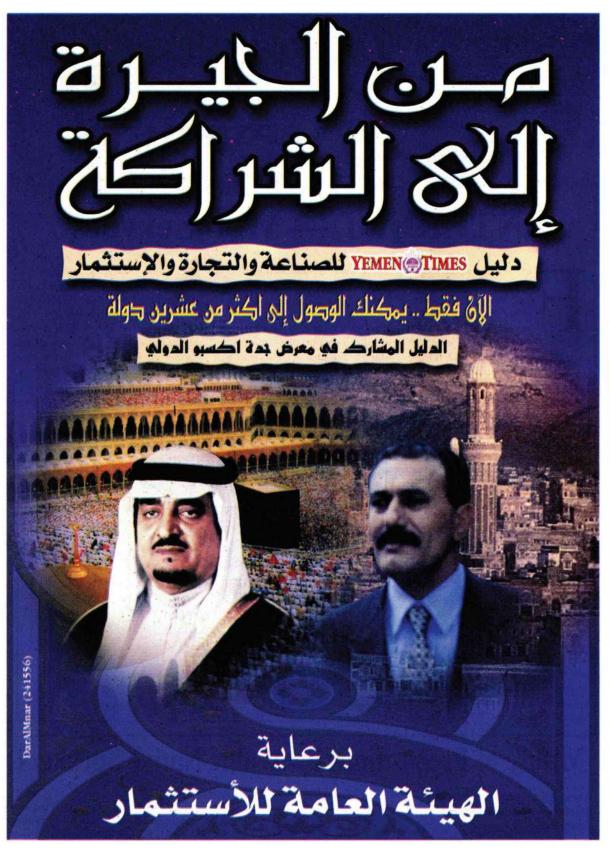
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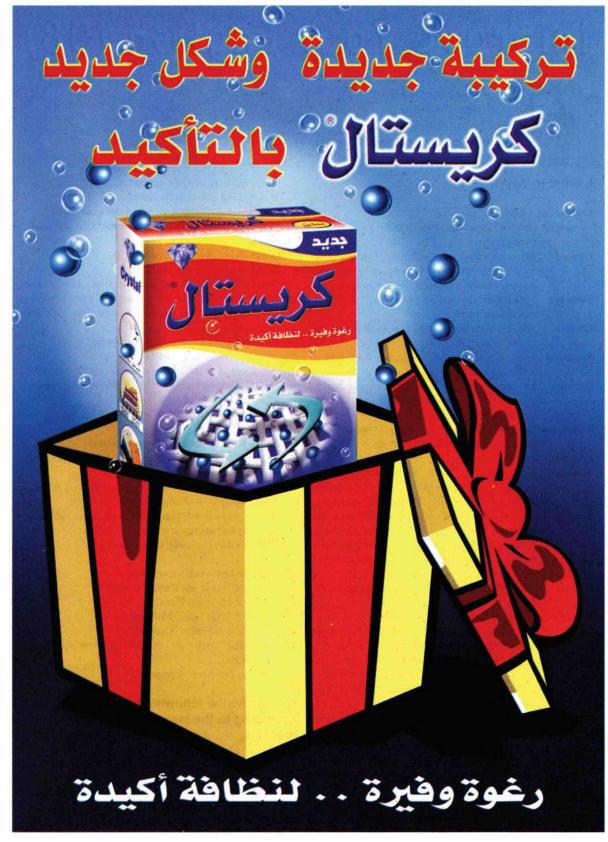
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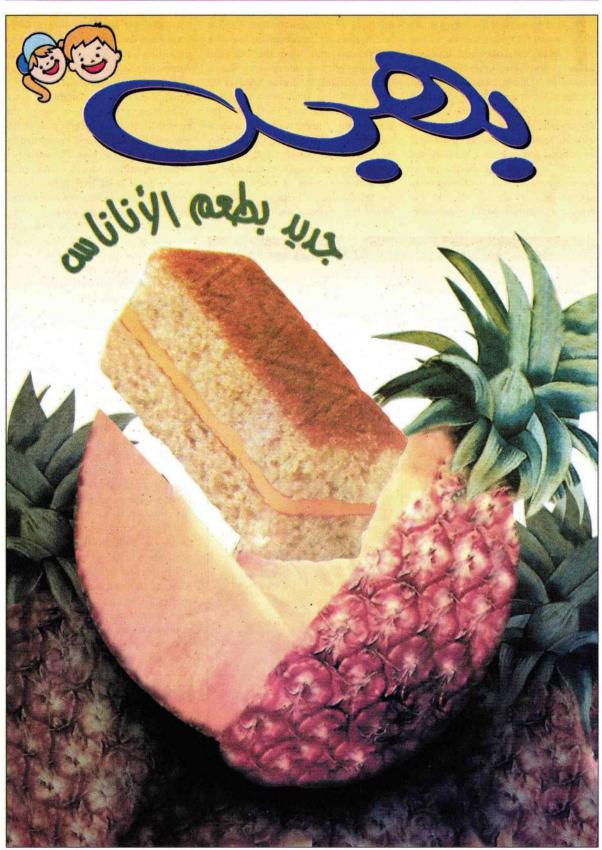

emeni press has faced serious challenged in the past years, particularly in the wake of the 1994 civil war. The major problems include legal hassles, censorship of the Ministry of Information, lack of professionalism, and lack of an institutional press.

There is a general agreement that freedom of press and of opinion in Yemen are only relative and are governed by certain factors related to the complex social fabric of Yemeni society rather than the Press Law. Hence, those involved in tribalism and arms possession are conspiring to silence any one who dare to criticize corruption. Journalism is therefore a dangerous profession for its defenders who can be victims of violence amidst a prevailing

environment of injustice and lawlessness. The Ministry of Information's latest decisions highlight its intention to close down a number of independent and partisan newspapers on the pretense that these newspapers are inconsistent with the laws and regulations established by the Ministry.

The Ministry might be right in its argumentation with regard to inconsistency with the Press & Publication Law, but it is also clear that the Ministry of Information exercises censorship and use a double standard on press organs. Many newspapers are facing legal prosecution from various courts as a result of publication problems.

The following remarks can be made about the legal status of Yemeni press: some newspapers were awarded licenses although neither they nor their own-

ers have the proper qualifications to be newspapers or publishers. The Press Law should then be applied on all newspapers without any bias or prejudice. Moreover, the funds allocated by Ministry Information to the newspapers do not exceed YR 5,000 a month per newspaper. In fact, such a situation is not encouraging nor promising, as the gov-

ernment by this way

undermines the concept of establishing an institutional press.

It is also clear that the Ministry of Information, as a guardian of the national unity and the country's sovereignty, files complaints and accusations against the different newspapers. Unfortunately, these accusations are sometimes groundless and only aimed at prosecuting the press and its journalists. The government should instead establish a court in charge of press issues since a journalist is not a criminal to be referred to a criminal court chaired by a judge who know nothing of press regulations. The situation of press can be improved if the existing newspapers can become independent and free of any affiliation through finding self-supporting avenues. In the same time, the government must allocate sufficient funds for the existing newspapers and promptly adopt the 'journalists cadre' (a draft law to increase the payroll of journalists).

Newspapers can indeed be a main contributor to development, stability, and prosperity in our nation. Why then does the government not allocate a small part of the enormous funds available for national security to support the journal-

We are not asking for the closure of the Ministry of Information. The Ministry of Interior would then assume the duties of the former which, for sure, would be more catastrophic. We are requesting again the enforcement of the Press Law in order to improve the journalists' conditions and create a real press able to change the current stagnant situation of Yemeni press.

The threats of the Ministry of Information to close down newspapers pretexting their illegality is an illogical argumentation, as the Ministry has not taken any concrete action against the defamation campaign started by some newspapers against some personalities. So why closing down newspapers for not being illegal? Yemeni press is currently going through a dark tunnel and the Ministry of Information is partly responsible for this alarming situation. Freedom of press is not a lie for media consumption as democracy and freedom are unalienable rights which reflect the degree of development of any nation. A rise in the violations perpetrated against press is observed in our country. One question comes out:

Is Yemeni press prone to closure?

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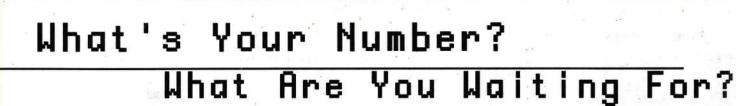
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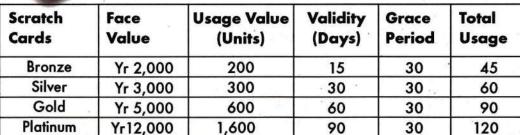

hough this week's local newspapers have tackled a variety of themes in their editorials and articles, emphasis has been put on matters related to judicial reform, local councils, president Saleh's latest interview to Al-Jazeera TV. channel and the conference against racism held in Durban, in South Africa and the U.S. role in hampering any mention of zionism as equal to racism.

Saut Ash-Shoura weekly 2 September 2001

Nassr Al-Shara'bi says in his article on structural reform in the judiciary system that the decision taken by the supreme judiciary council that sacked 20 judges from their posts and pensioned 108 others, has aroused questions on reforming the sids that carry out reform of the judiciary structure and putting an end to wrong practices.

It is to be noted that some measures taken by the supreme judiciary council regarding appointments, and transferring of judges in courts and prosecution have taken into account the re-arrangement of individuals situations at the expense of reforming the judicial system and development of its machinery. Some specialists and experts in this domain see that reaching at extensive judiciary reform should begin by straightening the practical course of the judiciary supreme council . As for the ministry of justice, its reform begins by ending its control over judicial work and implement its administrative tasks in service of justice apparatuses. The writer maintains that problems facing the Yemeni judiciary needs paying more attention to qualifying the staff of courts and prosecution. It also needs introduction of modern technology and focusing on criminal evidence during investigation. Reforming the judiciary system necessitates the promulgation of a new judiciary law clearly explaining authorities and jurisdiction of those in charge of implementing it based on judiciary independence and rightful implementation of judiciary laws and rules.



Al-Ayyam newspaper 3 September 2001

Sheikh Ali Mohammed Thabet confirms in his article that a local government system with wide-range authorities is a political, administrative and legal one dictated by the nature of tense situation in the governorates embodied by administrative corruption, security absence and failure of projects. It is also demonstrated in weakness of services sector and imbalance of basic development.

Local councils have come into existence in most of governorates, despite various obstacles, as a national democratic achievement to carry out a host of requirements such as popular participation in in power through election of their representatives in districts and governorates councils in the process of transferring to administrative decentralization. It is worth mentioning that through following up of activities of local councils during the past four months there appears a number of facts: - Local government system is an original part of modern democratic state enabling it to perform a significant role to encounter issues and requisites of the governorates provided that the central authority interacted positively with

-Whatever the political circumstances are, local councils reflect their popular identity due to their affiliation with the popular base.

-Local government system growth is connected to self factors represented by the level of their members and their efficiency in tackling issues and tasks assigned to them, related to the nature and peculiarities of their regions and role of their society.

The elected local councils in governorates and districts have shown that their administrative structure is either not existing or incomplete in more than 70% of the country's districts. That has made the prime minister express inability to transfer authorities to the decentralization system in those districts. Such state of affairs keeps those councils in a situation of postponement and ineffectiveness.

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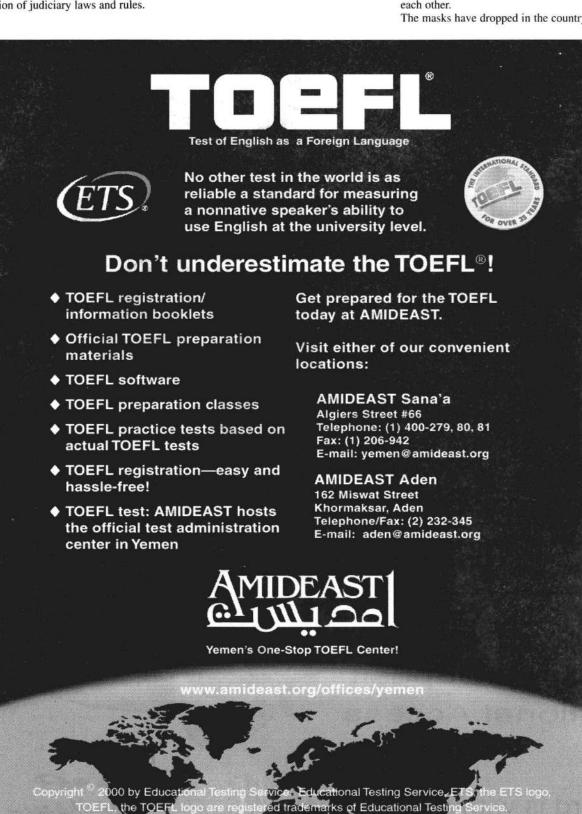

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Palestinians Slam Israel for Imposing Collective Punishment

GAZA—The Palestinian National Authority (PNA) slammed Israel on Thursday for imposing collective sanctions on the Palestinian people through closure and embargo.

The punitive measures which have nothing to do with security consideration have pushed half of the Palestinian population below the poverty line, Palestinian Minister of Planning and International Cooperation Nabil Shaath told reporters in Gaza.

"The closure has led to short-term impact, such as poverty and unemployment, and long-term impact, including the deterioration of infrastructure, and trade and economic crises in Palestine," Shaath said.

Citing a recent U.N. report on the serious social impact of the Israeli blockade, he added that the loss of the Palestinian gross national product has hit 2.5 billion U.S. dollars, at a daily rate of 11 million dollars.

Daily losses of Palestinians working inside Israel were estimated at 2.5 million dollars, according to the

The Israeli closure is causing the disruption of Palestinian agriculture, industry, real estate, tourism and transport, Shaath said.

"The per capita income is two dollars a day, and this is the poverty line in Palestine due to the Israeliimposed prices for Palestinian citizens," he said.

The closure has also affected the

PNA resources. "The financial aid mainly comes via Israeli ports and the Israeli authorities collect it and impose sales tax on all such items. The tax goes against the Israeli and the international laws,"he said.

With the number of poor Palestinians rising by 400,000 in the past 11 months of violence, 82 percent of the Palestinians has drastically reduced their daily expenses. In addition, 55 percent of the Palestinians have stopped paying arrears, 42 percent run out of their savings, 40 percent borrowed in order to survive, 18 percent sold their furniture and jewellery and 48 percent received donations, he

DURBAN-Slavery, slave trade, including the trans-Atlantic slave trade, are appalling tragedies in the history of humanity, the World Conference Against Racism (WCAR) declaration regarding slavery said on

Slavery is a crime against humanity "not only because of their abhorrent barbarism but also in terms of their magnitude, organized nature and especially their negation of the essence of victims", said the declaration.

Africans and people of African descent, Asians and people of Asian descent and indigenous peoples are victims of these acts and

continue to be victims of the consequences of slavery and slave trade, which are among the major sources and manifestations of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance. it added.

"The WCAR, aware of the moral obligation on the part of all concerned states, calls on these states to take appropriate and effective measures to halt and reverse the lasting consequences of those practices," the declaration said

"The WCAR recognizes the efforts of developing countries, in particular, the commitment and the determination of

Unfortunately, many factors worked together to hinder the achievement of a real revolution desired by the population and not only by a small group of people.

Among these factors, the revolution was followed by a state of instability during the 1970s, a proof that the

Yemenis were ready to destroy their own work and achievements. - We make a revolution then destroy it.

- We make unity then punish it. We have good intentions but we are choosing misleading avenues to achieve our objective.

Unity was a dream that all Yemenis desired to realize a long time ago but it was never brought to the negotiations table before 1972. It finally was achieved in 1990. I claim that I was one of the motivated people who brought the unity issue on the negotiations table between the former South and North Yemens.

Q: 10 years after unity was achieved, many people have become disenchanted. What are the problems which could endanger the continuation of the nation's unity?

A: As I said before, Yemen has a unique rule: "Achieve success then damage it by your own wrong doing!" Believe me that this is a reality. Before we damaged our revolution and now we are hurting our unity.

I lived long in the southern part of the country. I taught in many rural regions there, such as Abyan, Lahj and Zinjubar. Wherever I was, I never felt to be out of Sana'a. Many current important leaders used to be my pupils during my years of teaching from the 1950s to the 1980s. Most Yemenis feel being aliens in their own country and, after unity, some citizens became of second rank in their own country. Expatriation is indeed spreading like

These people are called citizens but conduct a life as expatriates.

It can be dangerous when the majority is complaining and cry out of pain. If the government policies continue

O: Regarding the editors in chief of Al-Shoura newspaper and the instability reigning due to the frequent change of its chief editors, what is the main problem shaking the newspaper?

A: In Fact, the late Abdullah Sa'ad was the emperor of Al-Shoura and was not the culprit of the People's Power syndicate party.

When a new trend appeared inside the syndicate to make Al-Shoura an institutional entity, Abdullah Sa'ad could not bear with the new environment and chose to retire. The problem occurred while the newspaper began looking for an editor in chief to replace Abdullah Sa'ad. The search focused on member of the party to choose a speaker of the party for the newspaper. Dr. Muhammed AbdullMalik is the supervisor of the AlShora nowadays while efforts are continuing to rehabilitate administration of the newspaper and find the appropriate man.

Q: Why the party leaders cannot return home?

A: Frankly speaking Mr. Ibraheem Al-Wazeer is very busy with several Islamic activities all over the country. Moreover, his health is declining. There is no obstacles hindering the return of the other leaders in Yemen. In fact, they are visiting the country from time to time.

Final WCAR Documents on Middle East Adopted

DURBAN-The final text on the situation in the Middle East, which is included in the World Conference Against Racism (WCAR) declaration and program of action, was adopted here on Saturday.

According to the text, the WCAR expressed its concern about the plight of the Palestinian people under foreign occupation.

"We recognize the inalienable right of the Palestinian people to self-determination and to the establishment of an independent state and we recognize the right to security for all states in the region, including Israel, and call upon all states to support the peace process and bring it to an early conclusion," the declaration said.

"We call for a just, comprehensive and lasting peace in the region in which all peoples shall co-exist and enjoy equality, justice and internationally recognized human rights and security," it added.

"We believe that all conflicts and disputes should be resolved through peaceful means and political dialogue. We call on all parties involved in such conflicts to exercise restraint and to respect human rights and international humanitarian law," the program of

"As for the situation in the Middle East, we call for the end of violence and the swift resumption of negotiations, respect for international human rights and humanitarian law, respect

for the principle of self-determination and the end of all suffering, thus allowing Israel and the Palestinians to resume the peace process, and to develop and prosper in security and freedom," the program of action added.

Palestinians Set Three Conditions for Arafat-Peres Meeting

GAZA—The Palestinian National Authority (PNA) on Thursday set three conditions for a possible meeting between Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat and Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres.

'In order to hold such a meeting. Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon must give a full and clear authorization to Peres," Palestinian Minister of Planning and International Cooperation Nabil Shaath told a press conference in Gaza.

Besides, "there must be a good arrangement for the meeting and an obvious evidence that the proposed meeting will deal with not only security issues, but also political ones," Shaath said.

He accused Sharon of being the major obstacle to the meeting.

"It is obvious that Sharon's latest statements and actions have raised concerns of Arafat over the feasibility of this meeting," The Palestinian minister said, adding that "when Sharon said that he felt satisfied that this meeting was not held, how can Arafat expect that he (Sharon) is willing to authorize

2 Fatah Members Assassinated in Israeli Missile Attack in West Bank

GAZA-The Israeli army assassinated two Palestinians in the West Bank city of Tulekarm on Thursday afternoon. Palestinian security sources said an Israeli chopper fired several missiles at a jeep which carried the two Palestinians at the entrance of Tulekarm, and killed them on the spot. The killed, Omar Sabah and Mustafa Anbar, were identified as members of the Palestinian mainstream movement Fatah led by Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, the sources added.

More than 700 people, mostly Palestinians, were killed in the over 11 months Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

TOKYO-Japanese police in Kanangawa prefecture on Thursday arrested three U.S. Navy sailors from a warship in Yokosuka, southwest of Tokyo, on suspicion of beating up a taxi driver and stealing 8,000 yen, Japan's Kyodo news services reported. The three sailors, Erskin Reese, Seamen Jason Smith and Joel Lopez, allegedly stole a bag of cash from a taxi driver Wednesday afternoon as they got out of his taxi in Yokosuka, the report said.

The discussions will also focus on integrated management of water resources, water for energy, environment conservation and poverty alleviation, dams and development, women and water and the price of electricity in South Asian countries, among other issues, it added

The meeting will be jointly organized by Global Water Partnership, Nepal Water Partnership with the support from South Asia Technical Advisory Committee.

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Yemen Red Sea Islands

n the last issue, we dealt with some Yemeni islands located in Hajjah such as Al-Ashek Al-Sagheer (the Little lover), Thu Harab, Al-Rafae and

Al-Barri, Sana, Al-Esht, and Baklan Island. In this issue, we will deal with one of the most important islands in Hodeidah governorate, that is Kamaran, Zukar, and Hunaish Archipelago. Kamaran Island is adjacent to the Al-Saleef Region. It includes a number of small islands, such as Othman, Zamer, Al-Jabal, Rash, and Okban

Climate in Kamaran

The Island is formed by atolls and coral reefs. The low central lands can be cultivated. In the southern part of the island, palm trees are widely grown. The people there depend on livestock and agriculture, particularly in the rainy seasons. The second northern half of the Island is mainly a plain and a sandy land. This part is also characterized by the growing of mangrove tees which cover almost 30 square kilometers. This part of the island becomes a pasture for camels during the dry season and is considered to be a haven for gazelles and a shelter for the colony of birds living there perma-



From an administrative point of view, the island is administrated by a Local Council and is attached to Hodeidah governorate. The island covers about 61 square kilometer and it is 12 kilometer long. The population of the island counts 5,000 people and, among of them, 2000 people are nomads.

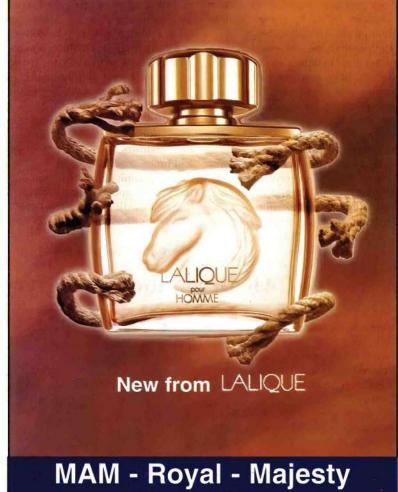

women, they play an active role in traditional and craftwork industry such as dresses, home-made caps, potteries, earthen wares and dress sewing. The inhabitants of the island are also active in organizing symposiums, setting up committees, or forming sports teams. For instance, the Kamaran Youth Club is one of the second rank football team. The Club also publishes a cultural magazine called Sout Al-Shabab (the Voice of Youth).

In the past, it was one of the most important centers in fishing. The island holds also a very strategic location and consequently the government has recently carried out projects such as rehabliltation of the airport in order to make the island more attractive for tourism. The health services are very low and of poor quality. Health facilities need to be repaired and maintained and the lack of specialist cadres must soon be tackled. In Kamaran, a center for motherhood and childhood was opened in 2000 for a total cost of YR 5 million financed by the German Technical Cooperation Agency (GTZ).

Education in Kamaran is also very low and only five schools can be found in the different parts of the island. Furthermore, the inhabitants have complained bitterly about the unavailability of means of transportation, the poorly maintained ways of communication, school canteens, the prevailing mentality for some fathers not to let girls go to schools, the lack of qualifications among teachers, and water shortages. In short, suffering is the prevailing factor among the inhabitants of the Kamaran.



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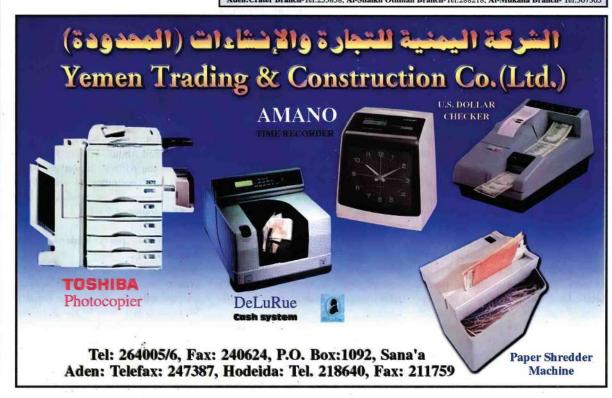
